

#### STATEN ISLAND.

GREAT activity prevails in a quiet, unostentatious way in transfers of real estate on the island. Hundreds of acres have changed hands this year, which will probably never be dealt with again except in the shape of dock and building lots. We learn from the County Clerk's office that the deeds left for record average between five and six every business day. Of these a considerable portion are of property at or near the north-west point of the island, opposite Elizabeth. The feasibility and necessity for a bridge or tunnel at that point, enabling the railroad system of the country to debouch upon New York Bay across Staten Island, appear to be generally acknowledged, and the early realization of such a project is regarded as almost certain.

These symptoms should spur the Staten Islanders into combined action to prepare and digest measures for legislative action next winter. A well-digested system of improvement for the island is manifestly necessary, and can only be had by combined action and influence. Something in the way of a general convention to discuss and prepare measures (if properly and harmoniously conducted, as there is no reason to doubt it would be) could scarcely fail to be attended with great public and individual benefit.

It matters not what the special claims and beauties of particular locations may be, they will not command full market value, as compared with other common locations on railroad routes twice as far from the city, until the great drawback of comparative inaccessibility in equal time is removed.

The railroads terminating or connecting at Elizabeth, by extending a branch across the north shore of Staten Island, could reach depots on the harbor by a shorter route than that now taken, and those depots would be nearer the ocean and more convenient for foreign commerce. But all these routes are needed, and neither would prejudice the other, as all would have business to their full capacity.

THE report of Dr. Harris, Sanitary Superintendent of the Board of Health, reveals the

very gratifying fact that the past summer has been one of the healthiest on record. During the quarter ending October 1st, there occurred 7,390 deaths against 8,415 during 1868. The wards and districts of the city in which there has been the greatest improvement in the care and ventilation of crowded tenemeut houses are the regions in which this decrease of mortality has chiefly occurred.

For example, in the Twentieth Ward there were but 18 deaths to 80,000 inhabitants, last week, and in the Sixteenth there were 16 deaths to upward of 50,000, while in the wretched tenements of the Fourth Ward there were 10 deaths in about 18,000. There were only 5 deaths in the Fifteenth Ward, with its nearly 30,000 inhabitants. The death-rate in New York last week was equal to 22.72 in the 1,000, annually, on estimated population of 1,000,000, and in Brooklyn it was 21.62 on estimated population of 370,000.

QUITE a large number of very elegant buildings are now going up in various parts of the city. The appearance of Broadway at the close of the season will be vastly improved in consequence of the many marble and iron-front buildings, which are taking the place of the old, narrow, and dingy-looking brick fronts. The fact is highly creditable to many of our capitalists, that so much interest is taken by them in the adornment of our principal streets. as shown by the magnificent character of the dwellings and places of business erected at various points. The growth of large cities is one of the distinguishing features of modern civilization, and it is physically impossible to build more houses than will be required.

#### MARKET REVIEW.

BRICKS.—North River hard brick have continued in good steady request throughout the week under review, and with less liberal arrivals the market has been well supgood steady request throughout the week under review, and with less liberal arrivals the market has been well supported of late, showing a few symptoms of buoyancy, though no actual advance has as yet taken place. The comparative ease with which the stock arriving is disposed of, however, encourages many manufacturers in the belief that the advantage lies with the selling interest, and there is an evident intention to force higher values if possible at an early day, the large number of yards already closed for the season being cited as a strong supporting point for the movement. As an offset to this, on the other hand, it is claimed that there is an immense accumulation of brick at the yards, that a great many kilns are still in a situation to continue the production up to the actual setting in of winter weather, should the state of the market warrant it, and that with the large number of persons who have this year been engaged in making stock it will be almost impossible to secure a combination of operators for a rise sufficiently strong to prevent a material increase of the supplies offering whenever values are advanced one or two points. Add to this the fact that though the current demand is unquestionably good, it does not exceed and sometimes barely equals the amount of goods coming in from day to day, and can easily be supplied by jobbers from stock already piled up here, should they choose to resist an advance, and it appears to us that an attempt to establish higher prices just now would be ill timed, and only temporarily successful at ieast. The call is of course largely from local buyers, but we hear of several very desirable orders at hand and in course of execution on Eastern account. Few if any complaints are made as to qualty, which keeps up to the very fine average of the past sirable orders at hand and in course of execution on East-ern account. Few if any complaints are made as to qual-ity, which keeps up to the very fine average of the past season. We quote at \$6.50@\$\$ per M for common to good, and \$8.50@\$\$ do for prime to choice. New Jersey hards are selling with freedom to regular customers, and we hear of no cargoes going begging for a market. Prices range at about \$6.657 per M. Pale brick have been rath-er slow of late, and though no accumulation of unsold stock is reported, receivers experience greater difficulty in hunt-ing up customers than heretofore. We quote at \$4.654.50

per M for North River: \$4.50@\$5 do for Jersey, and 50c. higher for choice lots. Croton fronts are not very active, but still working off to some extent, and values are sustained, closing at \$16@\$18 per M, according to shade. Philadelphia fronts are moderately active and steady at former figures, viz.: \$30@\$35 per M by cargo at yard, and \$35@\$48 in job parcels. Shipments of 18,600 bricks to Cuba, and 20,000 to New Granada.

CEMENT.—The market for Rosendale remains in much the same position as last noted, the fresh orders footing up comparatively light, and both buyers and sellers operating with considerable caution, the former with a view to prevent, and the latter to establish an advance before fall purchases begin. Our local jobbers, however, have not as yet commenced to lay in much stock; in fact few if any take more than they can resell to immediate advantage, as it is found that though a few manufacturers are still grinding to complete deliveries on spring and summer contracts, others are awaiting new orders and meet them willingly at former rates. No danger of an advance, therefore, is apprehended until the leading companies are in a position to effect a thorough combination and control the bulk of the production, though we find a few leading buyers who express some doubt as to any such arrangement being entered into this year, in view of the full values already current. There is not much going forward to California at present, but a fair amount shipping coastwise. We quote at \$1.90 per bld delivered at Kondout, and \$2 do delivered here. In foreign styles there has been a very good business doing, particularly in the fine grades adapted to fancy stucce work, &c., and about former rates are obtained. A correspondent of the World, detained on the Delaware River be late freshet, writes as follows:

"The Delaware River rose eleven feet during Monday morning, and the destruction of property was beyond all calculation—especially in the lumber. While we stopped there one raft of black walnut, valued at \$7,000, went to pieces. Fifteen other rafts passed down the river at the same time. The lumbermen who had abandoned them above had come down here by railway, but had given up all hope of saving them. They considered that the rafts were sure to go to pieces. The total amount of lumber in sight upon the river must have been worth at least \$60,000 or \$70,000, and all of it doomed to destruction."

The recent severe storm reached the Maine lumber districts, and not only filled the streams, but caused such a freshet in some sections as to seriously damage many mills, and the complaint now is of too much instead of too little water. From Augusta, it is reported that every boom between there and Waterville was broken, and the logs running freely. The Kenebec River has never been so high since 1832. The Waterville toll bridge is carried away, and great damage has been done to the lumbering interests all along the line of the river. From Lewiston, we learn that the rise in the Androscoggin River at that point has been unprecedented and rapid. Several millions of logs have gone over the falls, belonging largely to S. R. Bearse & Co., and to the Lewiston Steam Mill Company.

TO DIVIDE THE CITY OF NEW YORK INTO CONVENIENT ELECTION DISTRICTS, PURSUANT TO SECTION EIGHT, ARTICLE THREE, TITLE THREE, OF ACT OF THE LEGIS-LATURE PASSED APRIL FIVE, EIGHTEEN HUNDRED AND FORTY-TWO.

(Containing all Amendments to August 1, 1869.)

The Mayor, Aldermen, and Commonally of the City of New York, in Common Council convened, do ordain as follows:



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
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
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
