

.... REAL ESTATE.

The market for city property remains quiet but firm, the only noticeable feature being, that the present class of investors is composed of our most substantial and wealthy citizens, and sales of from one to three hundred thousand dollars taken by a single person are of frequent occurrence. The uneasy feeling which is now prevailing among stock and grain operators, and the great uncertainty in regard to the standing of many parties whose credit until recently never has been questioned, has caused many capitalists, who heretofore have employed their balances in discounting commercial paper and making loans on stocks, to turn their attention to investments of a more substantial character

hence the inquiry for large blocks of real estate. It is getting to be understood that as history is always repeating itself, that no exception can be made to real estate; and those who are fortunate enough to now hold desirable pieces of real property in New York, or any of the surrounding cities, can certainly reckon upon the time when the value will be enhanced as much above the present prices as are those of many pieces of London and Paris property now above the prices ruling here. The Dyckman estate, which was disposed of last fall by the veteran auctioneer, James M. Miller, and which realized nearly \$650,000, was bought by the then owner, twenty-five years ago, for \$11,500, and to-day the property would be reasonable at \$1,000,000. With such examples as this in one's mind, how can any person fail to see the advantages of investing in real estate? There is no doubt but that twenty-five years hence this same property will realize an amount which, if named to-day, would only provoke laughter.

THE EQUITABLE LIFE INSURANCE BUILDING.

This large and imposing granite edifice, for some time past in course of erection at the corner of Cedar street and Broadway, is now sufficiently developed to warrant a few words of notice. We allude only to the exterior, for, while the interior is already enough advanced to satisfy the visitor that, with its ponderous walls from 5 feet to 8 feet thick, and arched brick and iron floors from basement to roof, it will be one of the most massive and secure edifices ever reared in this city, it is altogether too unfinished to come at present within the range of artistic criticism.

The building covers a space of 88 feet on Broadway, by 136 feet on Cedar street. Some idea of its colossal proportions may be gleaned from the fact that the whole length of the façade on Broadway is occupied by only five, and that on Cedar street by only nine openings-where, in ordinarily constructed buildings, half as many more if not double the number of openings would have been introduced. To produce this effect-a very telling, but really false one-recourse has been had to a sort of architectural legerdemain, not without example among the best standards of classical architecture, by which two distinct stories in height assume the treatment and appearance of only one. The building may be described as being divided vertically into three bold and distinct parts: the first floor comprising one, the second and third floors another, and the fourth and fifth floors another; the whole having the appearance of a gigantic three-story building, with basement and attic. On the first floor on Broadway is the large central door-way, formed of two clustered Doric columns on each side, surmounted by a plain pediment of good proportions, and innocent of all decoration, except a sickly-looking urn at each end. On each side of the door-way are two very large windows, separated by massive and handsome rusticated piers. Under these windows light and access are had to the basements below. The second vertical compartment, comprising the second and third floors, has five windows, separated by attached double Ionic columns;

and the third compartment, comprising the fourth and fifth floors, is treated in the same way, but with Corinthian or rather Composite Columns. We use the names of these Classical orders as the nearest approximation, although it is hardly fair where such liberties have been taken with them. The windows are divided in their length by wooden transoms, which mark the intersection of the floors; the lower portion of a window lighting one story and the upper portion another. The upper story is crowned by a heavy cornice, very simple in detail, but bold and well-proportioned, and the whole is surmounted by a lofty attic, also of granite, with circular-headed pediment over its central window, and circular-headed dormers emerging from the steep Mansard roof covered with cut slates. The roof is very artistically managed, and from a distance, ascending or descending Broadway, presents a rich and splendid outline. The Cedar street front is treated in the same manner as that of Broadway.

There are sundry vagaries of detail-apparently just now an epidemic among our architects-which mar this building, as they do pre-eminently that of the new Young Men's Christian Association, and others we could mention. We mean the poor conceit of cutting columns in two by unmeaning bands, breaking the plain abacus of capitals uncouthly into circles, for the mere sake of introducing useless rosettes and other petty ornaments, &c. -Louis Quatorze abortions that are good enough, perhaps, for a black-walnut bed-post, but are altogether too trivial for enduring granite. These defects are, however, apparent only to the more exacting eye of a rigid architectural student, and are altogether lost in the general effect of the building, which is grand and excellent. Indeed we know of no edifice hitherto erected in New York which so boldly rests its claim to admiration upon the simple dignity of large and true proportions, without the aid of ornamentation, and which, in this respect, is so completely successful.

By this prevailing characteristic of overpowering proportions, it dwarfs all surrounding objectsa feature in itself sufficient to impart a certain majesty, for the absence of which no amount of mere decoration can compensate in civic architecture. Precisely as the previously much-lauded Herald Building was, on the erection of the Park Bank, by the force of contrast instantaneously transformed into a dull conglomeration of little marble pigeon-holes, so this granite giant of the Equitable Insurance Company has made the adjoining New York Life Insurance Building, with its infinity of vertical lines and invisible narrow little openings, so utterly insignificant that, from a short distance up or down street, it presents no more artistic appearance than a blank sheet of ruled foolscap paper. But dignity and intrinsic excellence combined. however overshadowed, can never be destroyed by contrast with mere surpassing size. Nothing proves this better than the beautiful American Exchange Bank on the opposite corner of Cedar street, which, although much smaller than the Equitable Insurance Building, instinctively draws the artisti72 eve to its manifold beauties of form and richne 80 of invention, and would do so, though its oversha41 dowing neighbor were of twice its colossal dimensions.

MARKET REVIEW.

BRICKS.—On North River hard brick there has been a rather more favorable market for the selling interest since our last issue, and goods have changed hands at a slight advance. Taking the general range of values, no alteration can be made in figures, inferior parcels still occasionally selling at only about \$6.56@\$7 per M, and the best not realizing above \$9: but on qualities previously quoted at \$7.50@\$\$.50, there is an improvement of fully 25c. per M, and some few lots have sold at equal to 50c. advance. The change is to be attributed mainly to the smaller arrivals, the storm early in the week detaining a number of vessels, and manufacturers now commencing to hold back stock to some extent, though this movement is not by any means general, as, notwithstanding the reported closing of a great many yards, there is known to be enough producers still at work who will not agree to suspend shipments, to counteract in a great measure the efforts of those who would if possible corner the market. The current demand from builders is somewhat less active than a few weeks, but still may be considered good; and in addition to this there has of late been rather more call from jobbing dealers, who begin slowly to store away for winter use any desirable parcels they may happen to secure. The trade with Eastern towns continues to some extent, but is not brisk, and only when a tip-top cargo is available are shipments ventured upon. We are informed that a great many green brick were destroyed by the recent storms, but as these, even if uninjured, could not have been put in merchantable condition in time for this year's market, the effect will not be perceptible until next spring, probably not then, owing to the immense supplies already accumulated. New Jersey hards are in demand and firm at \$6 @\$7 per M, and a few prinne lots have slightly exceeded the latter figure. Receivers manage 'o work off most of the pale brick coming in, but the inquiry can only be called moderately active, and a 450@\$\$560 to Jersey. Croton fronts of the

CEMENT.—There is still quite an unsettled tone to the market for Rosendale, with no important advantage gained by either the buying or selling interest since our fast. Operators for an advance find it impossible to effect the combination necessary to insure success in their contemplated movement and are fain to accept the rate current throughout the season; while those manufacturers who have pretty freely over-run their orders are seeking customers for the stock on hand, and offering inducements amounting virtually to a slight decline, though nothing greater than they would have taken a couple of weeks ago. A few small shipping orders are in course of execution, but the moderate inquiry is mainly on local account, and seldom in excess of the immediate wants of jobbers. We quote at \$1.90 per bbl. delivered at Rondout; and \$2 per bbl. delivered here. Shipments of 60 bbls to Danish West Indies.

FOREIGN WOODS.—The general wholesale market has continued to be devoid of anything like activity, and though the small stocks have received few additions, the supply as compared with the demand is found to be abundant, cedar excepted of course. Of the latter, it is intimated that an effort will be made to bring forward more stock within a few weeks, though how it is to be managed is not very clearly set forth. Cigar-box makers in the meantime find a very good substitute, both as to color and working qualities, in the cheaper grades of mahogany, large amounts of which are being disposed of to

the class of manufacturers above referred to, and for common boxes, sycamore and white wood are still meeting with considerable favor. Importers, as a rule, are insisting upon previous extreme figures, clauming that the cost of goods laid down here warrants no concessions, but desirable cash buyers would undoubtedly be treated with much consideration. The more settled condition of foreign exchange has induced a few shippers to look around the market for any parerls that will answer to meet back orders still on hand, but we hear of no large purchases or any additional inquiries from abroad. A few parcels have gone to the interior, and one or two lots to coastwise circs, but this trade is small for the season. From yard very little stock is going out beyond an ordinary jobbing trade. Exports to Liverpool of 14 logs satinwood valued at \$134. GLASS.—There appears to be some little irregularity in the market for foreign window glass, a portion of the trade reporting business as quite good, a few say it is very active, and others asserting that for the season there is scarcely anything doing, and that the general position is less promising than recent appearances seemed to indicate would be the case. Allowing, however, for the prostrating effect of the late gold flurry upon all commercial relations, and for the small-sized stock of glass now collected here, the outlet may be considered fair, and all prime grades are likely to do well. The call from the West does not increase as yet, but parties doing a Southern trade are in receipt of a fair share of orders of a desirable character. The local and near-by country demand is rather on the increase, though requiring only small invoices. We find that prices vary somewhat, according to the standing of customers and the quantity of goods purchased, but the average rates of discount are 40@50 per cent. off on English, and 55 per cent. off on French. The latest reported imports are 517 packages glass, valued at \$2,405; and 167 plates, valued at \$23,607. American glass continues in fair request, but the new stock is coming forward in liberal quantities, and supplies accumulate. Most agents have abandoned the foreign list and returned to the old one, from which they are selling 55 per cent. off.

LABOR.—Taking all the various branches of labor directly connected with the building interest, we find a generally harmonious feeling; between employer, and employee, and at this late season it is safe to predict no important change during the balance of the year at least. The supply of most kinds of labor is fully equal to, if not in excess of the demand, and mechanics are anxious to obtain and retain steady work with the approach of winter. At a recent meeting of the Workingmen's Union, considerable fuss was made over the fact that the work on the new Post-Office was not conducted in strict accordance with the eight-hour law, and the result was a strike of the laborers engaged in digging out the lower end of the Park. The "strike," however, lasted only about half an lour, the disaffected workmen finding so many others standing ready to take their places, that they deemed it advisable to recommence operations on the old terms, as a peremptory discharge of the strikers and the engaging of new lands would have been the result of an attempt to protract the movement. With the approach of the full elections, the politicians are beginning to exhibit considerable interest—read or feigned—in the welfare of the various tradeunions; and the workmen themselves in some cases propose taking an active part in the canvass to secure, if pussible, the election of two or three members who will properly represent them in the next Legislature. This is a very proper move, and if they will discard the offers of dishonest party hacks and select from their own association men in whom they can rely, to state fairly and dispassionately the grievances for which they seek redross, the subject will undoubtedly receive all the attention it merits from either body of the Legislature. The working men of Europe have recently been assembled in an International association of all such union

trade-unions are the first and most natural form of organi-zation towards which workingmen have resorted for protection, and must resort so long as the present system continues; and that such organization is beyond doubt the best means of imparting that knowledge of order, dis-cipline, and that strict regard for the interests of the whole body, which are indispensable conditions to the success of co-operative production.

4. That this congress urges on the trade-unions to make parts of their future policy the demand from the state of a national compulsory and unsectarian system of education, which must precede any great social or political reforms; and is the guarantee by which such reforms can be ren-dered permanent and beneficial.

A small political meeting of workingmen was held at Cooper Institute on Tucsday evening last, but nothing new or interesting presented, the resolutions and speeches being made up with the usual fault-finding in regard to the administration of State and national laws, and the stereotyped threats to sweep into everlasting oblivion existing political parties, as well as such laws on the statute books as happen to prevent workingmen from doing just about as they please with employers' money and property.

LATH.—The supply has been moderate since our last report; and with demand enough to take all the offerings, receivers have managed to sustain the market very well. Buyers, however, are not remarkably plenty or very anx-

lous, and all purchases have been based solely upon inmediate and positive wants. Dealers find the fresh call
from consumers too light to warrant them in laying in
stock to a very liberal extent at current rates, and of late
few bids have exceeded \$2.75. The recent freshets in Maine
have also had rather a depressing effect upon trade here,
in view of the probably immediate resumption of the production, and the consequent increase of supplies within a
week or two. Some mills have possibly been carried away,
and others temporarily injured, by the sudden and immense
rise of water; but there will be enough left to turn out all
the stock required, particularly if manufacturers feel hopeful of obtaining anything like \$3.00 per M for their lath.
The selling interest at this point continues nominally firm,
but are free operators, on spot or to arrive, when they
are not asked to accept concessions. Sales for the week
under review of 2,150,000 at \$3.00 per M, part to arrive.

LIME.—The general demand for Rockland lime has not been very heavy; but a few dealers can always be found willing to make room for this class of stock, and receivers have experienced no difficulty in placing the moderate arrivals—particularly when the cargoes contained a large proportion of common, the grade now most sought after by consumers. Prices remain as before, and nominally sleady at \$1.65 for common, and \$1.75 do. for lump. The production is understood to be fair, and rather on the increase, most of the kilns recently destroyed having been rebuilt, and a larger supply is predicted within a few weeks. It is probable, however, that the receipts in future will be regulated in a great measure by the current price, as manufacturers have formed a combination, through which they will be enabled to control the production and the shipments. The reported arrivals here during the week were sixteen cargoes. The Northern limes are reported as in good demand, and sold ahead of production in many instances, at the full ruiling values on Fastern, with not much stock coming in just now, owing to difficulties on the canals. LUMBER.—At the retail yards we find business still quite dull as a general rule, though a few dealers speak a little more cheerfully than last week, and in one or two cases we are told that an examination of books reveals a trade nearly if not quite equal to the corresponding period last year. The demand, however, comes in rather an unsatisfactory shape, calling for only small invoices, and with every evidence that buyers of all kinds are determined to confine their operations solely to immediate and positive necessities. Manufacturers, in particular, are chary of their orders, and a great many have not as yet laid in any winter stock. Prices remain as previously quoted, and are steady on all grades, with coarse stock as before standing in the most favorable position for the selling in terest, and the probabilities are that these would advance somewhat on any important increase of the demand. The receipts have been moderate from all points, but quite an extended trip among the yards short rather a larger accumulation than we had anticipated, and in some instances no more additions will be made this fall. At Albany matters have been considerably unsertided of late, the freshet scriously interfering with the regular course of trade. A large amount of lumber piled along the river bank was swept yavay, one firm alone losing nearly a million feet, and dealers were temporarily driven out of their offices in the district by the sudden rise of water. Business, however, is again getting into shape, and is pretty active at full rates, especially on hemlock and spruce, and desirable grades of coarse pine. The arrivals have been small, but previous to the storm a very good-sized stock had collected, and this is now being worked down to meet the early at the same time making room for the probable rush of stock when the canals are again in working order.

From private advices we learn that the damage to the Maine lumbermen by the late storm was not so great as at first supposed. Some mills were unroofed, a few logs floated away, and in one or two instances damagements.

Maine lumbermen by the late storm was not so great as at first supposed. Some mills were unroofed, a few logs floated away, and in one or two instances dams were injured, but the water in nearly all streams has now subsided to an ordinary level, and saws are running as before the drought. We will not be likely to feel the effects of the increased production in this direction, however, for some little time to come, as it will require a week or two to make up cargoes for shipment. Along the coast the hurricane created sad havoc with the vessels; large numbers of which were stranded and some entirely lost with all on board. This will detain considerable stock affoat for this port, and cause temporary scarcity of freight room, though enough vessels have weathered the storm and are now dropping in to meet the present unoderate demand. Prices on most goods remain as before.

Manufacturers of domestic white lead have reduced their rates somewhat, and on a few other grades buyers have rather more advantage, though there is no general weakness. Jobbers continue in receipt of a fair number of orders from regular customers, and are realizing former rates. Linseed oil continues very dull and in rather an unsettled condition. Some crushers insist upon extreme rates, and refuse to offer their stocks, but others are to be found selling at 16.2c. below the nominal market value, and outside operators will do even better with first-class buyers. The underste prevailing inquiry is solely on local and near-by interior account. We quete nominally at 98c.@\$1.01 in casks; and \$1.00@\$1.03 in bbls, from crushers hands. Outside lots 96@98c. Very little if any white could now be rechased below \$4.50 per ton, and the best grades are hew at \$5.00 do. Arrivals have been moderate and all on contract, none that we could learn of to city manufacturers. Blue lump is neglected and without any fixed market value. Calcined, without showing any great amount of activity, is meeting with rather more demand, and the market has a better tone. There is no change to note in prices, however, as buyers appear to be operating only in view of immediate necessities, and manufacturers are willing to show all the favors possible in order to increase the outlet for goods, or even keep the present one open. PLUMBING MATERIALS.—The market is in a generally favorable condition and the volume of business fair. There is not much call for export or for California shipment, but the Southern trade is clearly increasing, and Western orders in some instances are quite liberal. On small invoices there is also a pretty large amount of stock going out to the near-by interior towns, and the local distribution is about equal to the ordinary average. A few standard articles have become a little scarce, but the assortment is not very badly broken. Brass and copper goods show no change in price, the weakness in the crude material having been either to a great extent discounted, or too slight of late to affect the manufactured stock. Plumbers iron ware, sinks, waste pipe, &c., remain steady at 20 per cent. off list. Wrought iron pipes are fairly active at an average discount of 42½ per cent., some dealers allowing 45 per cent, and others refusing to exceed the 40 per cent originally agreed upon. The competition between manufacturers keeps lead pipe low and most of the sales have lately been made at 9c, with sheet at the same rate, and bar 8%c. net cash.

SPIRITS TURPENTINE.—Since our last published report prices have reached a very high figure, wholesale lots changing hands at 48c., but exporters not coming forward with any freedom, the home trade reducing their orders to the smallest possible limit; and the surply increasing, the market at the present writing has suddenly fillen off, and closes weak. TO DIVIDE THE CITY OF NEW YORK INTO CONVENIENT ELECTION DISTRICTS, PURSUANT TO SECTION EIGHT, ARTICLE THREE, TITLE THREE, OF ACT OF THE LEGIS-LATHRE PASSED APRIL FIVE, EIGHTEEN HUNDRED AND FORTY-TWO.

(Containing all Amendments to August 1, 1869.)
