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
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
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

THE EIGHTEENTH WARD BROOKLYN SEWER. THE Eighteenth and Twenty - first Ward

sewer bill, as amended, providing \$500,000 for the construction of the work, has finally passed the Senate, and goes, with a numerous budget of other bills passed for the special benefit of Brooklyn, to the Governor for his signature. This bill has been strongly opposed by several land-owners of the Eighteenth Ward, who happen to be possessed of the identical land on which is located the stagnant water that is supposed to be the main cause of the miasmatic fevers which continually prevail in that district. There has been quite a fight in regard to this improvement, and the advocates of the bill have thus far beaten their opponents at all points, for the simple reason that common sense and experience indicate that no person can live and be healthy in the immediate vicinity of these stagnant pools. It is only about a year ago that most of the men who opposed this improvement for fear of a little extra taxation, reaped a rich harvest by the sale of hundreds of lots that had hitherto been comparatively useless, and in almost every instance they were disposed of to mechanics and others, who purchased with the intention of building a home. Those who did build are now sorry for it, and their empty houses attest the truth of this assertion. There are houses now in the Eighteenth Ward that would rent readily for eight hundred to one thousand dollars per year if these objectionable swamps were thoroughly drained. As it is, there are plenty of them that cost at least from seven to ten thousand dollars to build, that can be hired at the present time at the rate of three and four hundred dollars per year. The leading opponents of the bill are men who own land, but never improve it; they keep it until they can obtain a good price, then let it go, but never spend a dollar in building except to patch up their own dilapidated, old-fashioned farm-houses. Those who are in favor of the projected sewer are all of them people who have bought land for the purpose of improving it; and thousands of their dollars are piled up in bricks and mortar, lumber and labor; but they find that their houses are untenantable through the existence of these stinking pools. The men who compose the Eighteenth and Twenty-first Ward Improvement Association are, as a body, men of ukase of the president of some Trades Union

business and integrity; there may be (as we have heard it asserted) some few scalawags amongst them, and there is no doubt that, like every hungry crow, they smell the carcass; but they can't get their beaks in, as the contract is to be given to the lowest bidder; and if Mr. Frank Swift or any other man will do it for \$200,000, there is no way in the world whereby any more than that amount can be drawn out of the fund, no matter if \$10,000,000 had been appropriated. If Mr. Devyr, who so sorrowfully laments the destruction of his salt meadows, will take into consideration the fact that they are too close to the city to be useful for farming purposes, and don't form a very inviting prospect from the front stoop of a dwelling, he may alter his determination about seeing the Governor; and, since it appears to be his forte to "spy into abuse," let him make up his mind to stay at home and watch those whom he thinks will bear more watching than himself.

LABOR.

This market shows no exception to the condition of stagnation and irregularity prevailing in all branches of industry, and is slowly but surely falling to a level commensurate with the decline in all food, raiment, rent, materials, and even the luxuries of life. The supply of skilled labor is fully equal to the demand, while of unskilled there is an excess; and no regular ratio of wages appears to be in vogue at present, the rate depending largely upon the necessities of the contracting parties. All strikes, or attempts at strikes, in resistance of the change to the new order of things, have proved dead failures; and the power of workmen to "corner" capital and force an inflated value not only upon their own worth, but upon whatever they may produce, is among the things of the past. From the commencement of the bricklayers' movement, two years ago, we have always insisted that the management of the Trades Unions as a rule was unstable, and the course adopted in regard thereto pernicious, and conducive of more evil than good to all concerned. At the outset we were almost alone in our position; but the ideas then advanced in these columns have been gradually adopted by the press and the public, and within the week we find the following remarks embodied in an able article on strikes, in one of our city dailies:

"If there is one evil more pregnant than another with baneful consequences, it is this insane crusade of labor against capital. In this city to-day there are thousands of mechanics eating the bread of idleness-not of their own choice, but compelled to it by the

or other. It is truly said that in union there is strength; but in these labor unions we discover nothing but weakness in the present and symptoms of ultimate ruin in the future. It is the wall against which the legitimate industry of the country beats, and is thrown back upon itself, deprived of all scope or power of expansion, closing up all the sources of industrial education to the growing population of this teeming city.

"If the consequent suffering from idleness could only be confined to the instigators of these strikes, all would be well, and the public would hear very little of them; but, unfortunately, the evil is wide-spread, and affects the wives and families of industrious and well-intentioned men, who are first induced to join the Union, and ever after are the slaves of the men who usurp the control of these organizations."

This is merely a repetition of what the RECORD has time upon time asserted; and we hope the feeling of opposition to the "Unions" as now conducted may spread until they are entirely abolished, or become as they were originally organized-merely benevolent socie-

ANSWERS TO CORRESPONDENTS.

"G. W. G."-To entitle a landlord to dispossess, for nonpayment of rent, he must show: 1. That rent has become due pursuant to the agreement under which the premises are held. 2. That payment of such rent has been demanded after it became due. 3. That default has been made in payment of such rent, and that it remains unpaid; and a default in payment is omitting to pay the rent, the whole rent, at the time it became due. 4. That tenant holds over without the permission of the landlord.

MARKET REVIEW.

BRICKS.—Taken as a whole, the market is in a very dull condition; and though prices have not changed to any decided extent since our last, there is a want of strength noticeable throughout, and in one way and another buyers are gaining some little advantage nearly every day. The aggregate demand, if anything, is larger; but this is more than counteracted by the increased supplies, and the available accumulation has continually exceeded the outlet. Even the choice grades have been found to come forward insufficient; quantities to meet all calls, and former extremes cannot now be realized, except in a small way, from buvers who have a partiality for some particular maker's tock running fine as to color and general appearance. The best

cargoes are going into yard in this city to some extent, but the majority of buyers are from near-by points ont of town, and two or three vessels are making pretty regular trips to markets on Long Island Sound. The common and inferior grades have met with a little more inquiry, partly from local sources, and a portion of the late accumulation on pier has been disposed of; but there is considerable still afloat, and the arrivals pretty steady. It is many years since trade has been so dull at this spason, and present prospects do not indicate a very early increase, causing some holders to feel rather more anxiety about working off their supplies, though as yet the only signs of desire to force business is the throwing out of scouts by some of the receivers, to watch the street corners for desirable enstomers who may happen to approach the principal wholesale sales dock. We quote at about \$7.50@\$8.25 per M for the inferior and common grades; \$8.50@\$9.00 do. for good to prime, with the latter figure an average top rate, except when a special cargo is picked out, and then prices range \$25@.50e. per M higher, according to circumstances. The prospects of fine weather, as thus far indicated this Spring, make it pretty certain that manufacturers who feel so disposed will be enabled to commence work by May lst, or thereabouts; but unless trade improves greatly it is hardly to be expected that the production will be very heavy for several weeks. A great many who went into the business of brickmaking last year are understood to have withdrawn this season, and that the older and more experienced manufacturers will have control of the supplies. New Jersey hards, as compared with the supply, are active; but there is so very few parcels now left that the market is getting into rather a nominal condition, and prices are regulated pretty much according to the indusences of the hour. CEMENT.—For Rosendale the market, of course, is reported steady, as the combination of manufacturers have resolved upon \$2 per bid, and this will be adhered to until circumstances force a change. The business doing is fair, considering the generally dull season, and there appears to be no accumulation of unsold supplies in first hands; but the market very plainly shows a want of strength, and could hardly offer an outlet for any increased offering at present. To our city dealers the sales are very few and far between, and the shipping call is the main dependence of sellers. Southern buyers are the principal operators, but orders are commencing to drop in from the Eastward to some extent, and a better trade in the latter direction is hoped for ere long. The facilities for production and transportation from the mills are equal to last year, and the cost of preparation no greater, but the present business prospect not quite so encouraging for manufacturers. The Coplay cement, previously referred to, meets with a farr market, and receivers keep their supplies pretty well sold up. We note exports of 100 bbls cement to Peru.

FOREIGN WOODS.—The general wholesale market is still quite unsettled, with scarcely any trade doing on home account, and no indications that the attendance of buyers is likely to greatly increase. In some instances our city jobbers are looking around the market for small lots of desirable quality, but as they are not pressed for the goods, no purchases of importance are made, unless liberal concessions are granted, and most importers refuse to accept this alternative. Mahogany is still somewhat scarce, a large proportion of recent arrivals having either been bought by exporters or reshipped on owners' account to Europe, though, if willing to pay for it, an anxious buyer could undoubtedly make up any reasonable selection required. Other styles are in fair supply, in some cases plenty, and not much wanted. Cedar, in particular, is neglected by a great many manufacturers who were formerly large consumers, the ease with which stock of domestic growth can be worked up, and the lower cost, causing an indifferent feeling in regard to the foreign wood. The sales making from yard are also moderate, and mostly of the smallest possible retail character; though we learn of a few very fair invoices recently made up for shipment into near-by country towns, and one or two lots for Southern cities. Retailers appear inclined to bring their prices down to as low a level as possible, and in some instances can undersell the wholesale market. The only exports reported are 200 logs cedar, valued at \$810, to Liverpool.

GLASS.—Recently dealers and importers in foreign window glass were somewhat encouraged by the appearance of a few mail orders, and some buyers in person from the interior. The orders, however, were far from extensive; and the buyers, after looking around a short time, concluded to wait a while before purchasing largely, and it seems impossible to infuse anything like continued activity into the market. The local manufacturing interests are taking a little from day to day, but merely in quantities sufficient to meet special calls, and, aside from this, there appears to be nothing wanted. Arrivals have in the meantime continued free, and the accumulation of supplies goes on almost unchecked, with the assortment now quite full, even of good first-class stock, and easily available when actually wanted, notwithstanding reports to the contrary, though holders

are, of course, pushing forward and getting rid of old stained goods whenever an opportunity occurs. About 60 per cent off foreign list is the highest price on French, and from this the rate runs down to 60 and 5, 60 and 10, and 70 per cent off. English stock has met with some little inper cent off. English stock has met with some little in-quiry, but to sell easily importers were obliged to allow buyers many advantages, and the market is without partic-ularly encouraging features. American window glass is plenty and cheap, but very dull, the ordinary buyers holding an ample supply for all wants, and a fresh demand apparently being despaired of. LATH.—The market appears to have undergone no important variation since the writing of our last report. Very few parcels have arrived and, aside from the stock piled out, wholesale dealers have had but little to offer, though, so far as the general demand was concerned, there has been plenty to meet all outlets. Most of the lath here awaiting a market are of good quality, and held on a limit of \$2.25 per M, and this figure is sometimes obtained from out-of-town sources or from local distributors who have a special order to fill; but, as a rule, buyers continue to manifest a generally indifferent tone, and it would be simply impossible to effect large sales above \$2.15 at the best. Manufacturers have become disgusted with the condition of the market, and wherever possible have suspended shipments, with the hope that by forcing a scarcity a higher range of values may result. The success of this movement is extremely problematical at the moment; but, considering the supply already in the hands of dealers, and the unusually small consumptive demand, buyers are not likely to be very ladly "cornered" for many weeks to come. The cargo sales reported for the week ending as we close embrace some 900.000, at \$2.15@.2.5 per M. LIME .- Producers and their agents here have again IAME.—ITOURCES and their agents here have again managed to prevent free arrivals of Eastern stock, and no accumulation in first hands has taken place; but there is no increase of the inquiry, and buyers generally manifest quite an indifferent feeling. Some few dealers, to be sure, could take a little of either grade and resell slowly at a light protake a little of either grade and resell slowly at a light profit, but they would not purchase in excess of positive wants
during the next few weeks, and when cargoes are disposed
of it is no unusual occurrence for them to be divided between two or three yards. The quotations made public are
without change, and we still call common §1.25, and lump
§1.75 per bbl; but these figures are nerely nominal, and it
is hinted that in a quiet way more favorable terms have
been accepted. At the kilns there is said to be a fair amount

The dealers in Northern lime are still confined in their operations to such parcels as may have been left over "up the river" during the winter, and these they are selling fairly at about the above rates. LUMBER.—Now and then a small country order or a call for a job parcel on city account appears to constitute the bulk of the Lusiness doing at the yards; and the general condition of the market can be summed up in the oft repeated expression, "dull, and nominally unchanged," with every feature worthy of note nearly or quite written threadbare. At this season of the year it is expected that some complaints will be made of a searcity of the most desirable grades of both pine and the hard woods, but nothing of the kind has as yet developed itself, and the invoices called for appear to be made up without great difficulty. Values continue quite unsettled, and a fixed basis of quotations is next to impossible, though buyers have a decided advantage; and it is quite refreshing to observe the coolness with which an old and desirable customer can walk into a yard, rummage around amongst the stock, pick out such little parcels as will be convenient for him to use immediately, and then without a blush offer figures not only considerably below the quoted rates, but at a reduction from owners' "lowest terms," with the probability that in nine cases out of ten the bid will finally be accepted rather than the sale should be lost. The condition of affairs "up the river" is still treated with the most supreme indifference, and thouth some of the parcels left can be bought pretty low, our dealers have become so very fastidious as to quality that it is almost an impossibility to induce any of them to purchase for the present. Wholesale dealers also fail to furnish anything that can be called news. Some few have been a little busy of late in delivering on contract or searching out a place for undesirable cargoes: but there is no genuine life to the haraket, and the

and dealers within a reasonable distance of the city are constantly being drummed up to induce them to offer an outlet for the unsold cargoes. The damage by the late freshets in Maine is somewhat doubtful as yet, though by those who have carefully sifted the telegraphic advices it is thought that details by mail will show a somewhat more favorable report. We continue to quote nominally at about \$17 per M for inferior schedules, to \$20 per M for prime do; and though sales are occasionally reported at something higher, they are in many cases merely for effect, and include lots of extra lengths, &c., ordered on contract weeks ago. White pine continues very slow, the demand covering only small odd parcels on home account, with an occasional export order for the West-India ports. For future delivery the movement is still moderate, and we can learn of no import-ant contracts having been closed. Local manufacturers have taken a trifle more stock within a day or two, but do not operate with freedom or beyond positive wants. We quote at about \$20@\$23 per M for common boards; \$24@\$25 for good do; and \$21@\$28 per M for choice. Pickets, as usual at this season, are in quite active demand for distribution in the interior to farmers who are repairing fences, &c., and, with a continued small supply, the market ruies very firm at full former figures—say \$10@\$1 per M for 3/-inch. Piling has met with only a light call, and mostly in a retail way as required for immediate use; and, though the former general runge of prices remains, the advantage is almost entirely with the buyer. We quote at 6@7c. per foot; very choice in size and length, 7%c. do. Yellow Pine has arrived to a considerable extent within a week or ten days: but the bulk of the receipts came in on contract, and the market has not been very abundantly supplied with available stock. Still there was plenty for the extremely moderate demand, and the very abundantly supplied with available stock. Still there was plenty for the extremely moderate demand, and the general tone of the position is dull and heavy, with sellers melined to fence off any parcel that may remain on hand for a few days, in order to prevent an accumulation. We quote at \$50@ \$31 for the best specifications, but common grades sell at all sorts of figures within a range of \$24@, \$29 per M. Black Walnut logs have met with some demand for European shipment, and sales were made, but the particulars are not allowed to be published. For Eastern No. 1 shingles there is a little demand, and a few parcels could be sold without difficulty at \$4.75@ \$5 per M, but the market does not want an abundant supply. We quote at 31 for new sheathing; 18@184; for old do, cleaned, and 24@25 for yellow metal. American Ingot Copper has declined fully ½c per lb, which is what we predicted a week ago; this has produced a lively demand, and we have to note more activity than for several weeks, in fact, months past. There has been considerable done for export on a gold basis, and the speculative feeling has been brick; the market was in such a position thata decline would have to take place to produce a demand. Scotch Pig Iron has been quite active, and an advance in prices readily obtained; still buyers operate with considerable caution, and restrict their operations to necessary requirements. PAINTS AND OILS.—The wholesale trade in all descriptions of paints remains in the same dull state as noted for several weeks past, and prices for the present must be regarded as nominal and but of little interest. The offerings continue liberal, and there is even more anxiety to sell than at the date of our last. No revival in business is looked for until after the opening of navigation, whilch is near at hand. The usual Spring and Summer demand may then be expected, and our market assume its usual activity. At present there is no new enterprise or work in progress, the consumptive demand is light, and what business doing is confined to small lots as will supply those working on repairs. There has been a decided improvement in the demand for American linseed oil; the offerings have been less liberal, and prices advanced. The general tone of the market at the close is firm, and a further appreciation is looked for. We quote at 87@88c. for casks, and 89@90c. for bbls. Exports for the week, 40 packages paint, valued at \$854. at \$854.

PITCH.—A further slight concession may be noted since our last, owing to continued free arrivals, and a further addition to our stock. The business, however, has been wholly of a retail character. Exporters have operated very sparingly, indeed, their limits being further reduced, and the advance in freights against them. The early opening of navigation will no doubt produce a better demand from the interior, when full and better prices can be easily obtained. We quote at \$2.40(@2.50 for city; \$1.75@2.50 for Southern; and small lots, very choice, in a jobbing way from store, at \$2.62½(@2.75. Receipts for week, none; since January 1st, 1,536 bbls; same time last year, 1,212 bbls. Exports for week, 185 bbls; since January 1st, 1,734 bbls; same time last year, 1,666 bbls.

PLASTER PARIS.—The demand for lump on city account is still of the most moderate description, and indeed we do not learn of a single sale having thus far been effected from "up-river;" however, a number of manufacturers have made their appearance as buyers, and the cargoes contracted for commence to arrive. Prices unsettled, but the tendency weak. About \$4.25 per ton was obtained for a choice lot of white, but \$3.500 \$4.00 per ton is nearer the quotation, and sales are hinted at still lower. Vessels this spring are plenty, and freight cheap, and wholesale dealers quite willing to sell. For calcined the market remains dull and heavy, with scarcely any city demand, and but few shipping orders. The production under the circumstances is kept as low as possible, but manufacturers frequently find stock holding over even when working half time. Sales above \$2.00 are only in a job way for very choice, and some pretty good stock has changed hands at \$1.90 per hbl. Shippments of 300 bbls, plaster to Argentine Republic, 678 do. to Cuba, and 300 do. to San STONE.—Most of the greats for the leading building attack.

STONE.—Most of the agents for the leading building stone quarries of Connecticut, New Jersey, Ohio, &c., having received the first flurry of the Spring orders and forwarded them, now find customers rather scarce, and the prospects for a good summer's business are slim. Prices remain about as before, but some close figuring would be done to insure liberal sales. In blue-stone business is quite brisk, and the leading dealers appear to be pretty well satisfied with the stituation. Local market, both public and private, still rather drags, but shipments are making daily to Baltimore, Philadelphia, and near-by points in New Jersey and on Long Island Sound. There has been a little difficulty at the quarries in getting out stock, and transportation to river was poor, but no scarcity prevailed, and the prospects are improving.

improving.

SPIRITS TURPENTINE.—At the date of our last review our market was flat; this followed with a feeling of depression, which resulted in a decline of fully &c. per gallon. At the concession, however, we have had a very fair business, though mostly confined to small lots, as required by the trade. The export demand has abated; the stock, however, is not large, and the receipts proved moderate. At the close the market is weak. We quote at 45@46c. for merchantable and shipping order; 47@47½c. for New York bbls; 47%@48c. for small parcels, and retail lots from store in proportion. Receipts for week, 1,404 bbls; since January 1st, 17,088 bbls; and for same period last year, 15,287 bbls. Exports for week, 175 bbls; since January 1st, 6,019 bbls; and for same period last year, 1,528 bbls.

TAR.—The market soon after our last recovered, and since then we have had a firmer and a better feeling generally. The business of the week has proved large and satisfactory. The demand has been quite general. The export demand has been fair, closing firm. We quote at \$2.15½(@2.30 per bbl. for North County, as it runs; \$2.25 @2.30 per bbl. for Wilmington; and \$2.40@2.50 for rope, and occasionally \$2.75@3.25 for something very choice in a small way. Receipts for the week, 2,326 bbls; since January 1st, 35,637 bbls; for corresponding period last year, 33,605 bbls. Exports for week, 1,405 bbls; since January 1st, 5,652 bbls; and for corresponding period last year, 15,511 bbls.

To the Sheriff of the County of New York Sir-Notice is hereby given that an Election to be held in this State, on the third Tuesday of May next (May 17), pursuant to the provisions, of chapter 86, laws of eighteen hundred and seventy (passed March twenty-second, eighteen hundred and seventy), entitled "An Act to provide for an election of a Chief Judge and Associate Judges of the Court of Appeals and Judges of the Court of Common Pleas of the City and County of New York," the following officers are to be elected, to wit:

A Chief Judge of the Courts of Appeals, and

Six Associate Judges of the Court of Appeals, whose terms of office, as provided in said act, and in the sixth article of the Constitution of the State of New York will commence on the first Monday of July, 1870, and terminate as provided in the said Constitution and in the eighth section of said act.

Also, three additional Judges of the Court of Common Pleas of the City and County of New York, whose terms of office, as provided in said act, and in the sixth article of the Constitution of the State of New York, will commence on the first Monday of July, 1870.

The attention of City Election Boards, Inspectors and Canvassers of Election and County Canvassers is respectfully directed to sections one, two, three, four, and five of chapter 86, laws of 1870, herewith printed, as to their duties under said act:

SECTION 1. A Chief Judge and six Associate Judges of the Court of Appeals shall be chosen by the electors of the State on the third Tuesday of May next, pursuant to the judiciary or sixth article of the Constitution. The names of all persons voted for at such election by any elector names of all persons voted for at such election by any elector shall be upon one hallot, which shall designate the person voted for as Chief Judge and the persons voted for as Associate Judges, and no elector shall vote for more than the Chief Judge and four of the Associate Judges. Such ballot shall be endorsed "Judiciary," and the Inspectors of Election shall provide a box. labelled, "Judiciary," in which the ballots shall be deposited. The person receiving the highest number of votes as Chief Judge and the ix persons receiving the highest number of votes for Associate Judges shall be deemed chosen at such election.

Judges shall be deemed chosen at such election.

SEC. 2. At the same election there shall be chosen by the electors of the City and County of New York, three additional Judges of the Court of Common Pleas of said city and county, as required by the said sixth article of the Constitution. The names of the persons voted for shall be upon one ballot, which shall be separate from the ballot mentioned in the preceding section, and shall be endorsed "Judiciary, Common Pleas," The inspectors shall keep a lox labelled, "Judiciary, Common Pleas," in which the ballots shall be deposited. The three persons receiving the highest number of votes shall be deemed chosen at such election. at such election.

SEC. 3. Notice of such election shall be given and published for not less than four weeks preceding the same. As to the Chief Judge and Associate Judges of the Court of Appeals, the notice shall be given as now required by law in reference to general elections, and as to Judges of the said Court of Common Pleas in New York, it shall be given as now required in reference to local elections in that city. No omission of notice shall invalidate any election provided for in this act.

SEC. 4. At such election the registry of votes, if any such registry of votes be required by the then existing law, prepared and used at the last preceding general or charter election, as the case may be, shall be used; but the Inspectors of Election shall meet in their several election districts on the Friday and Saturday preceding the election, to revise, correct, and complete, and shall revise, correct, and complete the said registry in the manner now required by law in reference to general and charter elections, if such registry be then required by law.

SEC 5. The Board of State Caparascars shall meet on the

by law in retience to general and charter accounts, a such registry be then required by law.

SEC. 5. The Board of State Canvassers shall meet on the second Tuesday of June next, to canvass the votes for Chief Judge and Associate Judges of the Court of Appeals, and shall thereupon proceed according to existing laws; and, except as in this act otherwise provided, all laws in force at the time in respect to the holding of elections, the qualifications of voters, the punishment for illegal voting, the canvassing and returning of the votes, and all laws prescribing the duties of inspectors, officers, and boards in reference to elections shall apply to the election authorized by this act, so far as the same shall be applicable thereto. Any vacancy in the office of inspector of election, in any election district in the State, shall be filled in the manner provided by law, on or before the day of such election.

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
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
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
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
