MARKET REVIEW.

MARKET REVIEW. BRICKS.—The market for North River hards has shown just a trifle more firmness during the week under review, but the change has not been very decided, and the general position is far from encouraging. The demand does not appear to have greatly improved, and the little advantage obtained by the selling interest is mainly the result of fall-ing off in supplies, which has enabled receivers to work down a good proportion of the old accumulation, and to keep current arrivals well sold up. Naturally at this season the stocks in yard at the points of production begin to be exhausted, and some manufacturers are dis-posed to hold back for a few days the remaining parcels, but this policy cannot work any great advantage to holders this year, as the demand is too small and the new crop too mear at hand to permit of more than a temporary running up of values. Buyers from neighboring cities are still the most liberal operators, the sales making for delivery on this island being only for such parcels as are wanted for immediate consumption by some ot the large builders and contractors, or cargoes that can be broken up in small parcels and resold at once by the jobbing dealers. The quality is on the average poor, but now and then a prime parcel is found and can be sold at extreme rates. Accord-ing to reports of sales §9 per M may still be considered about a top price, but \$605.05 has been obtained for rather poorer quality than last week, and nothing but the most inferior parcels now run as low as \$7 per M. Mann-facturers are at work on the new crop, and some receivers tell us they expect the first cargoes at hand in about ten spiply is so small at present that the market may be considered to a great extent mominal. For pale brick there has been a little more demand, but of a generally irregular and uncertain character, and the market is weak still. The supply is not large, and there is every prospect that for some little time arrivals must be small; but very few buyers w

production are somewhat uncertain, and manufacturers appear inclined to work rather cautionsly. CEMENT.—The market for Rosendale is without any improvement, and the previously noted feeling of depres-sion appears to be gaining ground. The only inquiry mov-ing stock directly out of market is on small export orders, and for coastwise shipment—principally Southern; and there is a constant accumulation of unsold supplies at this point. A great many agents report trade brisk, and assert as an evidence of the statement, that they have sold out all the parcels received; but a little closer inquiry reveals the fact that, instead of effecting sales in the ordinary way, they have by dint of hard coaxing induced dealers to make room for stock, with the understanding that a price is to be fixed at some future day. The quotation current is still \$2 per bbl, but sales have been made at \$1.90 per bbl, delivered here, and the probabilities are that the majority of manufacturers will soon adopt the latter figure. As usual when any indications of a decline provail, we hear stories of an intention to stop the production; thus we pre-dict manufacturers will continue work, provided an outlet is offered for their goods, at figures even lower than are now hoped for. Two years ago the rute throughout the greater portion of the scason was below the present level, and the cost of labor, freight, and the production, gene-rally more expensive, and there is no reason why sales should not now be made as cheap as then. LIME.—The recent very liberal arrivals of Eastern have all been disposed of without effecting any change in prices, but this is more the result of good management on 'he part of receivers than of an increase of the demand. By care-fully, working around and getting a dealer here and ano-ther there to engage a cargo, nearly everything was sold before arrival, and what there was unsold being mostly lump, and principally sought after just now, was sold out within a day or two. We therefore continue to quote at \$1.25 per bbl for common, and \$1.75 do. for lump, with a few poor lots of common sold as low as \$1.20 per bbl. But though old rates are sustained, and the market nomi-nully steady, we have good reason for stating that the sell-ing interest consider themselves quite lucky in getting out without a break, and, in fact, this is what they had mado up their minds to expect, and with nearly all dealers very few additional arrivals of new stock would certainly cause lower rates. Manufacturers, however, are producing very little stock at present, and with most of the regular vessels at this end of the route it is resonable to expect that we shall have a lull in the arrivals for some time to come. A few dealers will occasionally report "a fair trade all things considered," but nothing approaches activity, nor does anything at the moment indicate that there is likely to be an early increase in the attendance of buyers. Goods suited to building operations are particularly dull, the main cull on even the small amounts moving being for manufacturing purposes or small domestic shipping orders. Prices irregular and nominal, and depend much upon the quantity of goods taken, the status of buyers, &c. In some cases a scarcity of desirable goods is reported, which would be re-placed to a moderate extent if stock could be secured immediately; but, as a rule, there is not much inclination to contract largely for future delivery until the probable turn of the market is more fully developed, especially as the majority of the trade have set their minds on a lower range of values. In a wholesale way there has been rather more activity with a few buyers to secure certain goods for early future delivery. Taking the general range, values remain much been made, the turn has been rather in buyers' favor. For goods coming to hand coastwiss, sellers appear dis-posed, as a rule, to allow easy terms, and to effect quick sales, but the supplies rule delivery. Out-of-town buyers have been induced to take a portion of the surplas, and a few cargoes have gone into local yards; but, as a rule, out-city dealers have probably never shown a more indifferent tone, and in many instances refuse even to make a bid. Sup-plies are wanted to some extent for ordinary jobbing necessities, but large purchases seem to be entirely ignored in view of the doubtful prospects for the future, and the very general impression that prices must decline. It is not at all improbable that a lower range of values may be established, but hardly to the extent that some of the trade imagine, as a decline in prices will have the effect to reduce shipments. Manufacturers have undoubtedly a large stock of logs on hand, and intend sawing pretty freely, but they have also made considerable money during the past five or six years, and will feel independent enough to hold back stock that does not give them a margin for cost and expenses at least. According to recent sales, anything now exceeding §10 per M has to be considerable better than the ordinary run of cargoes, and fair to good schedules sell at \$17(2018 per M, with common lots still lower. 
