OUR MARKET REPORTS.

WE present this week, in the regular market column, our usual yearly statistics of exports and imports, and domestic receipts. Experience has enabled us to improve somewhat over former years, and our compilation includes much valuable information which can be found in no other publication. On lumber our figures are perfect, so far as the outward foreign move-

ment is concerned, but it is simply impossible to give the correct receipts, and we have therefore done the best we could. From the Provinces we have an account of 20,915,159 feet; from the Maine coast 96,625,000 feet, and from the Southern coast 46,724,128, making a total of 164,264,287 feet, without including a single cargo from the North River canal boats and barges, of which no record can be obtained. We also include the movement on staves, cooperage stock, in a detailed form never given before. Our figures on brick, cement, lath, etc., are all interesting and repay perusal even by those not directly connected with the markets for the goods named.

TAX TITLES.-INTERESTING TO PROPERTY HOLDERS.-Supreme Court-Chambers.-Before Judge Brady. In the matter of the petition of Patrick Callaghan .- Two lots, to which Mr. Callaghan held the title in fee, were taken by the Commissioners of Estimate and Assessment for the Morning Side Park. The value of the one was fixed at \$8,000; of the other at \$2,700. Mr. Wesley Smith held a tax lease on one lot for 1,000 years, and on the other for 900 years, bought at a tax sale in 1865 for \$3.71 and \$1.23 respectively. The Commissioners, therefore, awarded for one lot \$7,999 to Mr. Smith, and \$1 to Mr. Callaghan, and in the other, \$2,699 to Mr. Smith, and \$1 to Mr. Callaghan. This report was confirmed, and Mr. Callaghan now moves to open the order of confirmation and send back the report for correction. He sets up in his affidavits that the proceedings under the tax sale were not regular, and therefore the tax lease was invalid, and that there were alterations made in the report of the Commissioners irregular in character and misleading the petitioner; that the whole award was first made to him, and afterwards, and after the abstract of the report had been deposited in the Street Commissioner's office, pursuant to public notice, the awards were changed, without any notice to him, and without any opportunity on his part to be heard.

On behalf of the city, Mr. D. J. Dean argued that the court was, so far as the Commissioners' report was concerned, functus officio, and that it could not open the report or send it back after once confirming it. The remedy of Mr. Callaghen, if he was injured, was by regular suit impleading Wesley Smith, in which, if necessary, the court might enjoin the payment of the money to Mr. Smith. To the Commissioners the lease of Mr. Smith was conclusive, and they could not go behind it.

Counsel for Mr. Smith said that they had not presented in full their answer to the petitioner's claim, as they thought that should be done in a different tribunal. They had simply presented the fact that they held the lease; that they had for years paid the taxes, and that no other owner had during those years appeared to claim the burdens.

An award of about \$4,000 was made by the Commissioners upon two lots in the same locality to P. H. Kingsland, upon tax leases for 1,000 years; Mr. Callaghan, who claims them as his property, being awarded but one dollar, and he seeks the same redress in that case. Affidavits on the part of Mr. Kingsland were read, denying the alleged illegality of the tax leases, and setting up that a Mrs. Curry had commenced suit against him, claiming that she owned the property. Mr. A. R. Lawrence, for Mr. Kingsland, argued that the report of the Commissioners, after confirmation by the court, was final and conclusive, and that Mr. Callaghan had mistaken his remedy; that the court would not, upon a collateral motion, decide that a legally executed paper, like the lease in question, was fraudulent. Decision against petitioner.

REAL ESTATE MARKET.

THERE seems to be generally a better feeling existing among the operators in real estate since the advent of the New Year, and considerable inquiry for improved property is reported by many brokers. The many sensational reports about the low prices of real estate, by one of the morning journals, has had the effect of furnishing a better attendance at the auction room, many being attracted there attendance at the auction room, many being attracted there waiting patiently all the week, have been compelled to admit that very few of those great bargains were to be had. The fact is, that there is no pressure at present to sell. During the summer of 1868, millions of dellars' worth of real estate changed hands, and was sold to parties who gave mortgages having from three to five years to run, and very many of these mortgages are about becoming due.

A reference to our table of recorded transactions below will show that the sales for March, 1868, exceed \$14,000,000, and for April and May, \$47,003,000, with June and July each

showing sales of over \$12.500,000. Undoubtedly during the spring and summer of this year there will be considerable shifting of mortgages, which may cause some little disturbance in the market: It behooves those who have mortgages falling due this year, to remember this fact and anticipate the renewal of their mortgages. In this connection it will be well to watch narrowly our list of fore-closure suits, which is a very good barometer of the pressure for money in real estate circles. For the last two or three weeks this list has been a light one, and indicates but little pressure. We recommend all interested to keep themselves well posted from the tables of the RECORD, and thus deal with facts, and form their own theories.

MARKET REVIEW.

BRICKS.-North River Hards have remained steady and uniform in price, but without activity, and the previously oted dull and dragging tone is still noticeable. Dealers are distributing very little stock from yard, and have enough supplies on hand to meet all calls, while contractors and builders generally who still have work under way are well provided for. The accumulation on hand unsold is not very large, probably about one-third as much as last year; the communication with up-river yards has been entirely shut off by the ice, and only a few lots have been worked through from the bay, and the offering from first hands was at all times moderate; but there was a corresponding shrinkage of the demand from all quarters, and the entire trouble reported by wholesale dealers is, that nobody wants brick at present. Considering the state of trade, present and prospective, there is likely to be nearly or quite enough stock to carry through until the new crop. We quote the poorest lots at about \$8 per M, and good to prime do at \$8.50@9 do. Of New Jersey styles the supply is small and desultory, and values a trifle nominal, though about \$7.50@8 per M is considered fair, now that North Rivers are coming in so slowly. The demand for Pale Brick is good, and the market continues to show a generally firm tone, with only a few really desirable lots available either in first or second hands. We quote at \$5.50@5.75 per M. Croton Fronts are still offered with comparative freedom, and meet with a very light demand, the market ruling nominal at \$10@15 per M. Philadelphia Fronts are dull, but steady, and from yard holders continue to obtain about \$32@35 per M.

FOREIGN WOODS.—The business is slow and uncertain in a wholesale way, the demand merely covering the positive and pressing wants of the regular trade, with now and then a small shipping order filled. Cedar remains scarce, and high for choice grades, but of other styles there is a fair accumulation with a tendency in some instances to increase. Importers and wholesale dealers refrain from any pressure to realize, and generally look for extreme figures, but quick buyers can occasionally obtain comparatively easy terms. At the retail yards there is a slight movement for immediate use by manufacturers, but no activity, and in a general way the market is dull.
