## HARKET REVIEW

BRICKS.-The market for North River hards has continued pretty firm, and at times during a period of temporary scarcity somewhat higher rates were obtained, though
in a regular wholesale way it would probably be hardly in a regular wholesale way it would probably be hardly
correct to quote a positive advance established. Buyers thus far have been found for pretty much everything offering, but we find that dealers, though still distributing fairly, have commenced to find stocks accumulating somewhat, and are not quite so anxious to purchnse. This is especially the case with those who are obliged to allow brick to remain on pier, for want of better accommodations, as the
additional charges for wharfage, etc., add materially to the additional charges for wharfage, etc., add materially to the cost. The city consumption of brick has been fair, but
builders do not appear in any great hurry to finish up work builders do not appear in any great hurry to finish up work
in hand, and are only busy when the weather is in every in hand, and are only busy when the weather is in every as $\$ 10$, and a few at $\$ 9.75$, but $\$ 9.00$ is about a fair quotaas $\$ 10$, and a few at $\$ 9.65$, but $\$ 9.00$ is about a fair quotadinary to good cargoes. The first few cargoes of the new crop came in last week, as noted by us, and were received by Messrs. Wm. R. Knapp \& Son, with sales at $\$ 9 @ 9.75$ per M, the quality as a rule good, though some were rain washed, and naturally sold a little low. The arrivals have duction is now becoming guite general. From the points of production we learn that everything thus far has proved satisfactory, with the exception of labor, and this is not only very high, but very scarce. Even the most ordinary laborers being difficult to obtain, notwithstanding the country has been thoroughly searched, including many of the Cinadian towns. With what help they have secured, manufacturers are urging the production to their full capacity, as it is almost cercain that the moment the hay and grain harvest commences, workmen will leave in large numbers to accept the more liberal terms offered by farmers. Pale lrick appear a little slow, and prices are without any important change, but on the whole the position is pretty firm and scllers confident in present rates for many weeks to as brick-makers require about all the stock they have on hand to wall up the kilns, only occasional small odd lots come to market and even with a light demand, dealers are $\$ 6060$ nor $M$. Complaints outnumber praises on the market for Croton Fronts, and in the absence of any but a matail movement, values are somewhat nominal. On the whole, however, the nominal figures may still be placed at about \$11@14, per M, according to color. Philadelphia Fronts in fair demand from dealers, ind steady at \$28@30 per M at this city, delivered on pier.

CEMENT.-The demand has been good, rather better, if anything, than at the date of onr last, and manufacturers feel more encouraged in consequence. Many of the city
dealers who have been selling from old stocks are now closed out, and others nearly so, and they desire to replenish, -which increases an outlet heretofore quite small for the season, and from cuuntry points there is also a larger as cost of freight modified . From the Eastern cities the orders are running well, and some invoices have been hurried through by steamer in order to quicken the delivery. For the production of various kinds of pipe-water and sewer --a considerable amount of stock win be used, and some vers fair contracts have already been made. We are also
infurmed that the promises of a call from California are
first-rate this year, the large amounts prevailing, accumulated there, having about all been sold out and the market
brought into such shape, that cement can now be handed pretty liberally and leave a respectable margin for profit. The amount produced will naturally be guided by the demand, but as a rule manufacturers have made their preparations for a full season's work, and expect to burn the faciliaties for transportation have been abundant, the scarcity of coal offering, leaving a great many vessels, barges, etc., unemployed and quite willing to accept any freight on fair terms. As we close the general market quotation is $\$ 1.75$ per bbl., but some of the manufacturers are said to have caught up on their orders, and willing to make special contracts for large amounts at 5@10c. per bbl. off the regular rate. For foreign cements the demand is each year improving and this Spring the business has been large. The supplies coming to hand, however, have also materially increased, and all calls have thus far been more than met, indeed in some cases prices have declined, especially
on Roman and Portland. These two grades are largely on Roman and Portland. These two grades are largely used in the composition of the new patent paving blocks,
tilea, etc., and the wants of the market have been a little over-estimated, causing the present slight accumulation of stock, but holders are confident and refrain from pressure. The whole sale quotations are $\$ 7 @ 7.50$ per bbl. on Roman, and $\$ 8 @ 8.50$ do. on Portland, with job lots about $\$ 1.00$ per bbl. higher. For "Keenes" there is about the average and $\$ 16$ do. for fine. This last named grade is used mainly for stucco work, imitation marble, etc.

LABOR.-As we close it is reported that a strike is contemplated by the bricklayers for an increase of 50c per day, years ago having worn off. Success this season is mont dacidedly doubtful, but we hope that builders, contractors, and employers of all kinds will at once form an association and protect themselves at all hazard. LATH.-The demand is neither active nor general, and the market without exciting features; but still, buyers have been plenty enough at nearly all times since our last, to keep the market clear of stock and enable sellers to infuse a pretty a strong tone. A portion of the call was from out of town, and mostly from local sources, and as before, embraced dealers operating to the extent of their most
positive wants and no further, where they could possibly positive wants and no further, where they could possibly
avoid it. The consumption seems likely to prove very avoid it. The consumption seems likely to prove very
good for the season; but will be slow, as the condition of good for the season ; but will be slow, as the condition of
the real estate market at present offers no inducement to the real estate market at present offers no inducement to
hurry buildings to completion. A scarcity of vessels, and hurry buildings to completion. A scarcity of vessels, and an appearance of scarcity on lath, but manufacturers are not as idle as they would have it appear, and a sharp call not as idie as beye wonld have it appear, and a sharp call could con bein to incriense through the necessity of realiz ing upon an accumulated production. Prices have slowly worked upward and as equal to about 15 c per M., with sales of $2,000,000$ lath at $\$ 2.50$ per M, partigere and part to arrive.

LIME.-The market developes no really new features, and the whole position is unsettled. Dealers, when they run almost out of lime, will come in and take a cargo or two, but nothing more than they are likely to use in a short time, as they feel in constant dread of some sudden and it is cected change in value, almost certain to accumulate in yard. Receivould a large stock all they can to protect the interests of their friends on both sides, but, like other markets this season it is difficult to calculate upon an even balance. The tendency, however, is a little stronger in buyer's favor, for while a small supply has only kept prices steady, it is quite certain that any liberal offering would necessitate a further reduction in cost in order to sell. The State Lime is still irregular, with now and then a sale 5@10c. per bbl. off quoted figures. but the Eastern can
