THE Washington correspondents have very generally refused to notice the fact, that Wheeler \& Wilson are endeavoring to get Congress to extend their sewing-machine patents, so that the present monopoly may be kept up. The average cost of sewing machines is $\$ 20$; and the average price $\$ 60$. No new sewing machine is now permitted to be made, as the old companies have formed a ring to stop all improvements under new patents. Congress will, of course, extend their old patents, thus checking improvement, adding to the swollen profits of a baneful monopoly, and robbing poor women. Every dollar paid over $\$ 30$ for a sewing machine is pure plunder.

## MARKET REVIEW

BRICKS.-With navigation in better condition, there has been an opportunity to obtain supplies a little more freely, and in somewhat larger quantities, but in no case was there an appearance of an overstock, and frequently the demand far exceeded the ability of buyers to meet it, the market, of course, retaining a very strong tone under the circum-
stances. The more open weather while it increases the prostances. The more open weather while it increases the proby this means opens a larger quantity of stock, also enables the pushing forward of building operations, and thus the consumption grows to the suppiy, and the demand proves sufficient to make an outlet for pretty much all the cargocs coming to hand. The retall dealers still find it impossible to accumulate stock; all the purchases made now being for immediate and positive use. Manufacturers, as a rule, continue very indifferent about selling, and send in word that they will stop shipments the moment signs of weakness are developed on good stock, feeling confident that every brick, at all desirable in quality will be wanted before new crop can become available. It is natural to suppose that ruling

DRAIN AND SEWIER PIPE.-The market for domestic vitritied pipe is at the moment quite dull, and withont many features of interest, prices remaining much the same little nominal. With the frost in the ground, consumption naturally is slow, and as navigation does not freely open, and freight tariffs are high, the small dealers are unwilling to stock themselves. Manufacturers, however, seem to think the prospect most encouraging for the coming season, and look forward to a first-rate business. truthfully, however, and at the risk of still being called the bear organ of the lumber trade; we find nothing better to cover the general markel than dull and nominally unchanged, so far as the present business is concerned. There is a demand, of course, and a movement of stock with probably a trife larger aggregate among a few dealers than two or three weeks ago, but buyers cannot be called plenty by any means, and are in all cases adhering closely to a system of wants. Values vary a trife according to circumstances - as to quantities of goods handled, time of payment, etc., but for ta general range our former figures may be retained. The stocks in yard are fair, and will admit of any ordinary selection, except on common pine, and well seasoned black walnut, both of which are very scarce and held for extreme figures. The above covers the present, but the future seems to be a little more encouraging, and hopes are entertained that the spring trade proper will open well.
