MARKET REVIEW.

BRICK.—The market continues dull, and as a result prices have declined fifty cents per M on all grades. There are few brick in the market that will command a higher figure than we quote. We quote: Haverstraw Bay brick \$7@8.50; Up-rivers and Jerseys, \$6.50@7; pale, \$5. Fronts are steady at \$12@16 for Crotons, and \$40@45 for Philadelphia from yard.

FOREIGN WOODS.—For mahogany there is a good demand, and with a limited supply prices rule strong. Cedar is in moderate supply, but meets too with considerable demand. The stock of rosewood is very full, and the finer qualities meet with ready sale, while for the inferior there is but moderate inquiry, and prices are weaker as references to our prices current will show.

LATH.—Sales have been a good deal subordinated to a limited supply for the week, and under a good inquiry prices have been very firm at \$2.50 for Eastern, with a tendency upward.

LIME.—The market holds steady, with a better feeling prevailing, with quotations as follows: Port Ann, Glenn's Falls, Bald Mountain, and Rockland, \$1.35 for common, and \$1.75 for finishing.

LUMBER.—Pine has advanced to \$65. That the price must be increased has been inevitable for some time, but dealers have procrastinated making the change until it was no longer possible to put lumber into yard here at the quotations that have been ruling for this market, and only when events indicated too strongly that all hope of a more favorable condition would not be experienced this year. The most favorable views taken of the situation show no possibility of lower prices this season, and the advanced rates not only will be fully sustained, but may even be still further enhanced.

The principal causes which led to the rise, were the loss of time occasioned by the stoppage of the mills during the four weeks' strike, in a season already shortened by early droughts, involving a curtailment of stock. The unusual absorption of lumber at Chicago, the unprecedentedly high rates of lake freights, and the inadequacy of transport capacity.

Had no other obstacle presented itself, the increase of lake freights as high as \$5.75, would have been sufficient to advance prices here, unless enormous stocks had held here. But even at the enormous rates freights had reached, it was at no time easy to secure transportation; and since the shipment of grain has begun, and the best boats have engaged in carrying it, inferior vessels only have been left to transport lumber, and it is not easy to secure any number of charters even of them. An additional expense for insurance is incurred by shipping on such transports at this season of the year; as the storms prevailing on the lakes makes the risks extra hazardous, and so if the vessels should be secured at a discount on ruling rates, it would be more than counterbalanced by the increased premium for insurance.
The quantity of dry pine in this market now is at best

but limited; business is possibly good, and bids fair to become better. Eastern Spruce is only moderately active at \$16 @ 19 for all qualities.

From Saginaw Courier, Aug. 30:—The tug Wave has already towed 17,000,000 feet of logs this season from the Au Gres river for the Keystone Company.

A correspondent from Au Gres writes that heavy rains have prevailed on that river, but not enough rain has fallen to start the logs. The oat crop in Au Gres township is reported very heavy.

From the Green Bay Advocate:—The recent rains have had the effect of raising the streams to such an extent that a large portion of the logs hung up last spring are coming down. On the Menomence a full force of men were at work last week, with a good prospect of getting the drive out of Little River. We also learn that the logs of the N. Ludington Co. in Twin Creeks, will probably be got out. John Mulligan informs us that he has got his drives of about 3,000,000 feet out of Gravelly Brook into the Peshtigo, and that it will come down all right. On the Oconto, it is estimated that there were from 50 to 60,000,000 feet hung up last spring, and that from 25 to 30,000,000 will now be got out. These logs are owned by nearly all the mill firms on the river, and, but for these rains, the mills would have had to shut down. On the Little Suamico, A. C. Conn & Co. had about 10,000,000 feet hung up. They got some down last Thursday, and were driving again Saturday. They expected to have 3,000,000 feet out by Saturday night. Peters will probably get all his, and Chase & Dickey enough to last through the season. On the big Suamico we are informed that the logs are moving handsomely. Lamb, Watson & Co. will get enough to last them through, and Weed & Co. are all right.

The Flint Globe says: The continuously low stage of water in the Flint River has compelled our mill men to dam the stream in order to get their logs down. For some time the supply of logs has been eked out by flooding from

the Geneseeville mills dam. The Boom Company have now purchased the site of the Witherbee dam, including three acres of land, just above the Irish road bridge, in Richfield township. It will be some time before it will be completed. In the mean time, the supply here is short, and most of the mills are running on short time only a part of the machinery. There are above the dam, now building, about 6,000,000 feet of logs, and below something more than 9,000,000. There are as many as the mill can cut if they can be got down. The dam, though a heavy tax on the company now, will prove a valuable piece of property hereafter.

The Toledo Blade gives the quotations of finishing woods as follows:—Walnut (merchantable) dry, \$55; 2d and culls, \$28@30; merchantable green, \$55@58; 2d and culls, \$25 @28. Walnut timber, 5c; Vencer wood, 6@15c per foot; Oak split timber, \$22@25; Whitewood lumber, \$28@30; Butternut, \$35@40; Walnut flooring, \$55; Ash flooring, \$33.

From the St Louis Times, August 28:—Receipts by river have continued light during the past week, and prices of Chippewa in raft remain stiff, at \$16.50 to \$17 for mill run dimension, and \$17 to \$18 for middle run dimension strips and boards. Stocks of dry lumber in yards are vanishing rapidly under a good demand from both city and country, and for this reason prices of certain kinds have advanced slightly above last week's quotations. A general, and still further advance is anticipated soon, as the visible sources of supply seem to be dwindling away, and the large crop, expected early in the season, turns out to be scarcely adequate to the heavy demand from all quarters.

Relative to the condition of the lumber trade in the Saginaw valley, the Bay City Journal of Thursday says: "Lumber is still firm, but for the past week or two no advance in prices are reported. Within a week we have reported the sale of nearly 4,000,000 feet for \$7, \$14, \$25, but it must be remembered, in this connection, that it was mostly bought in large lots and on close figures for other parties. Manufacturers are holding lumber a little higher than the figures quoted above and in many instances lumber has been sold in small lots for as high as \$8, \$15, \$37, and \$42. A medium between the two prices quoted can be relied upon as the standard."

From the Boston Commercial Bulletin, Aug. 31:—

The lumber market presents no changes of importance since our last, and is generally quiet, except for desirable cargoes. Stocks are unusually light for the season, and if a good trade should spring up, prices would advance. The arrivals have not been large, either of Eastern or Western. This is proverbially the dull season, and although there is a moderate amount of building going on, there is a larger comparative demand for the country than in Boston and vicinity.

Western lumber is quiet and unchanged. Freights have advanced \$2@3 M. by lake and canal, and there is a better feeling amongst the trade generally, as there is every indication that prices must advance correspondingly. The stock at Albany is being rapidly reduced, and, in view of the fact that prices have touched bottom, dealers are inclined to anticipate their wants for Fall and Winter. Black walnut is scarce and prices are firm.

Southern lumber is in fair demand for timber and plank. Freights are high and shipments light. There is but little change in prices, though some grades are a shade higher.

The amount of logs cut in the State of Michigan last winter, was 2,515,000,000 feet, or 184,583,000 cubic feet, board measure. Of this amount 1,866,000,000 feet were put afloat in the log, and 3,500,000 carried by rail. The lumber is mostly pine, and is valued at from \$25,000,000 to \$45,000,000.

The Maine lumbermen predict that five years hence, at the present rate of destruction, the forests of this State will be wholly cleared of timber. The lumber crop this year is estimated at 700,000,000 feet. Of this amount the Penobscot lumbermen cut 226,000,000, and the Kennebec men over 100,000,000.

ALBANY LUMBER MARKET.

The Albany Argus for the week ending September 3, 1872, reports as follows:—

Our report of the past week is increased firmness in all of the lumber markets, New York included, with an advancing tendency in prices; the difficulty of moving lumber on the lakes and advanced rates of freight by water and rail. So great a scarcity of vessels to move property on the lakes has seldom been known. A Chicago letter of the 29th ult., remarks "that the vessel men seem perfectly demoralized in consequence of the pressing demand for vessels, and the high rates of freight and increased duties, make lumber cost more than the market will warrant. Owing to this difficulty, parties now make their purchases to depend on being able to move the lumber." The same letter expresses the opinion "that there is no great reason why lumber should not advance \$2@3 per M feet at once, and that it must in order to cover increased cost. It is difficult for Chicago yards to fill orders, and it is hurry burry all the time from one yard to another."

Some large sales are reported at Ottawa within the last few days at full prices. Any concession in prices on the part of manufacturers seems out of the question for the present.

A Bay City private letter of 30th ult. reports: "Lake freights are now \$5.25 firm, with fair prospect of going higher; there is still a large quantity ready to ship eastward, and barges are taken as fast as they come in, and twice the number would be taken at once. Prices of lumber are, if anything, firmer; uppers are scarce, with considerable call for them both from the east and from Chicago."

A complete assortment of all kinds of lumber can now be found in this market, and buyers who have been putting off their purchases find they have miscalculated. There has been a movement the past week to advance Michigan pine \$2 per M feet, and also to put up the prices of hemlock. The receipts of lumber at Chicago so far this season, are 720,552,000 feet against 631,401,000 feet to a corresponding date in 1871: the shipments, 242,222,000 feet against 384,411,000 feet in 1871.
