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ST. BARTHOLOMEW'S EPISCOPAL CHURCH.

SINCE the erection of the splendid synagogue of El Emanuel, on Fifth avenue, no place of public worship has been constructed in this city more pleasing and satisfactory, as a specimen of ecclesiastical architecture, than the new Episcopal church of Saint Bartholomew, now rapidly approaching completion, and situated at the south-west corner of 44th street and Madison avenue. This elegant structure occupies—with the handsome little rectory adjoining—a frontage on Madison avenue of 100 feet, runs back from the avenue 145 feet on 44th street, and is 58 feet high to the top of the groined interior, with a capacity of one thousand sittings. It has been very rapidly erected, for a building of such solidity of construction and elaborateness of ornamentation, having been commenced in June of last year, and expected to be completed in the coming November.

The design is in what might, in general terms, be called the Byzantine style of architecture, but the architects have so closely adhered to the peculiar branch of it illustrated by the Cathedral of Pisa and other works of that character, that it may more properly be classified as Pisan Romanesque. Nothing can exceed the care and beauty with which the architects have carried out the minutest details of this somewhat peculiar but fascinating form of ecclesiastical architecture, both as to the exterior and interior. The frontage is one perfect fret-work of little arched recesses and windows, resting on small columns with floriated capitals, and adorned with rare carvings, especially one in high-relief over the entrance doorway, illustrative of the history of Saint Bartholomew. No less than five different stones enter into the composition of the front, all introduced and arranged so as to form the most pleasing contrasts and combinations of color. In this the design is eminently successful, and shows great practical skill in the knowledge of material on the part of the designers. New Jersey freestone forms what may be called the groundwork of the composition, and this is interveined throughout the plain surfaces or ornamental parts, according to their best mode of applica-

tion, with Pottsdam freestone, Cleveland freestone, Schenectady blue-stone, and Pennsylvania serpentine.

In outline and proportions, the whole frontage toward Madison avenue is very grand and imposing, and, with the Leviathan Grand Central Depot right in front of it, and so many other first-class buildings in the immediate neighborhood, gives to that portion of the city a palatial appearance scarcely to be seen elsewhere in New York. Where there is so much to admire, it is not pleasant to find material for fault-finding, but we must take decided exception to the termination of the otherwise beautiful tower at the north-east angle of the building. There is no such crucial test of the delicacy of taste, feeling, and artistic tact in an architect as planning a perfectly graceful termination to a tower or steeple. To lead the eye gracefully away, from base to pinnacle, strictly confining all obtruding projections within that rigid pyramidal outline which is the essence of architectural grace, requires the utmost delicacy of touch on the part of the artist. This is where Sir Christopher Wren showed his wonderful power of composition, in the thousand and one spires he scattered over the surface of London, all differing, but all tapering away in such elegant gradation, no matter how elaborate the various parts, that the whole looked as if they had been made from two rigid straight lines meeting in an apex, and the eye is charmed with the universal symmetry, even when forced to condemn any intervening parts in detail. In St. Bartholomew's church, the whole frontage may be pronounced absolutely perfect, tower and all, until we reach that stage of the latter where an open octagonal turret, formed of a wooden and slated dome resting on slender columns, is placed upon the square portion of the tower, sloping away at the angles to receive it. It is in the slope of this dome, still more in the yet smaller turret placed on the top of it, and forming a termination to the whole composition with its little spiral covering, that we find the outline very defective. The lower dome might pass, if redeemed by the other little terminal turret placed upon it; but the latter, instead of tapering away gradually to nothing, actually projects and overhangs just where it ought to recede, producing a most uncouth effect. The most unpractised eye will find a ready illustration of what we mean by contrasting the mode in which this tower is terminated with that of the terminal turret to the synagogue of El Emanuel close by, at the corner of 43d street and Fifth avenue; literally the same idea, but far more ably treated.

The interior of St. Bartholomew's church is no less satisfactory than the exterior. The effect, on entering, is gorgeous and imposing. Beautiful polished columns, of Aberdeen and

Peterhead granite imported from Scotland, separate the lofty nave from the aisles on either side, surmounted by richly carved and gilded floriated capitals, while the whole vaulted roof and surface walls are ablaze with polychromatic decoration of well-contrasted colors mingled with gold. Many of the side windows are already filled with rich memorial windows of stained glass, presented by various members of the congregation, utterly devoid of that vulgar transparent green and yellow and orange glare so common in our churches, but executed by various New York artists in such fitting designs and brilliant but subdued rubies and other rich colors, that some might pass for the works of the famed Willement or Wailes of England. The organ, too, forms a very striking feature of the interior. It is said to be one of Odell's best manufacture, and fills up the whole space of the eastern end with a grand device. It is being painted in variegated colors to suit the rest of the interior, and will look splendid when completed. The whole cost of this structure, inclusive of the rectory, is not expected to exceed \$240,000. Messrs. Renwick & Sands are the architects, Duke & More the builders, Moran & Armstrong the masons, and Hugh & J. Young the stone-cutters.

GOSSIP.

WE extract the following from a circular sheet sent around to merchants by one of the largest Commercial Agencies in the United States. The letter is dated St. Paul, Minn., Sep. 28, 1872, and reads as follows:

"On my return from New York I found money very close here. That none of our Banks were discounting anything. Also, that Country Merchants and small Country Dealers were paying little or nothing; and that our Jobbers were often very hard up. I have been at some pains to ascertain the causes of this state of things, and am satisfied they are substantially these:

"First.—The Banks here, and at some other places, have been furnishing for some three months about all the cash consumed in carrying forward the various lines of the Northern Pacific Railroad, so that that Company now owes directly and indirectly to St. Paul, not less than *Six Hundred Thousand Dollars*—a large sum for our people to carry. The Road is now 'hard up,' the sale of its Bonds having been seriously damaged.

"Second.—The wheat crop was late and large. The recent 'Wheat Corner' has been followed by a collapse, and wheat dealers have not as yet fairly recovered their equilibrium, and the number of buyers on the various roads is so few that the price is down, and farmers are not selling much, therefore not paying their debts. The depressing effect of this state of affairs upon the Country Merchants is seriously felt by our Jobbers.

"We are in a vexatious situation, and many may require time to turn themselves, notwithstanding our State is in good shape, and really able to pay all her debts in full."

The Commissioners, in the matter of the extension of Eleventh avenue, have discovered that the avenue had been laid out previously and ground dedicated for it by a number of property-holders, as shown by several deeds, and they have determined to reduce the awards accordingly. This is resisted by some persons, who assert that their titles are free from such encumbrances, and they claim they are en-

tituled to the full award; others admit the dedication, but claim that since the old avenue was to be but 100 feet wide, and the new one will be 150, compensation is due them for the extra 25 feet taken on each side. A number of arguments were listened to at the last sitting of the Commissioners, and one week was given to those who were unprepared, in which to file their papers with the Corporation Counsel.

MARKET REVIEW.

BRICK.—The market for the week has ruled quiet, but as the close of the season approaches nearer dealers show an inclination to stock their yards, yet seem to await more advantageous terms than can be now procured. Some, however, have already commenced to accumulate stock. Cargoes as yet are arriving quite freely. A rumor was current on change during the week of a concerted movement to advance the prices, but at the close no such action had been taken, although it was understood that some yard men had refused to recede from an advance they had asked. The market closed firm at our quotations, as follows: Haverstraw Bay brick, \$8.50@9 per M.; Up-rivers and Jerseys, \$7.50@8 do; pale in good demand at \$5.75@6.50 do. Fronts, Croton, \$12@16 per M.; and Philadelphia, \$40@45 do from yard.

DOORS, SASH, BLINDS.—Dealers report a good business doing, a better actual demand existing than is usual at this time of the year. There is some complaint, however, of difficulty in making collections, attributed not so much to scarcity of money as an indisposition on the part of a certain class of consumers to pay their legitimate bills. A rumor is afloat of a movement in the trade to protect themselves against such customers.

Prices rule very steady at the quotations we present in our prices current, but discounts are made to first-class buyers.

LATH.—The business for the week has been rather meagre, but quotations have ruled firm at \$2.50 per M for Eastern.

LIME.—The market has been more active than was noted last week, no surplus of Rockland remaining in stock. We quote Bald Mountain, Fort Ann, Glenns Falls, and Rockland at \$1.25 per barrel for common and \$1.50 for finishing.

LUMBER.—The business at the yards continues good, much the same demand existing as was noted in our last edition. Advises from the West report an attempt on the part of boat owners to utilize the recent disasters by storm on the lakes, to their own aggrandizement, and an attempt was made to still further advance the enormous freights. The result was a rebellion on the part of the lumber shippers who demurred to any further increase of rates. Again come reports of a decline in some of the Western marts, which, however, cannot influence figures here at this time of the year, although it may be favorable to lower prices next spring, if the decline continues. As we have previously reported, there is too little good lumber convenient to this market to give hope for any change in quotations favorable to dealers this season.

Eastern spruce continues weak and without demand at \$17@20.

From the Saginaw Courier, Oct. 9:—

The lumber market during the past week has not been very active, and, in fact, shows considerable signs of weakness. This is accounted for principally by high freights, which have ruled for some time past, and the scarcity of barges. The late gale has been especially disastrous. A large number of barges have been lost or disabled, and this takes away a great many million feet of the carrying capacity for the balance of the season. Under this state of affairs, lumber has been accumulating on the docks, and, although there is a strong outside demand, buyers are deterred from buying, from the fact that the chances for transportation are slim, and the further fact that by holding off a short time stocks will have so largely accumulated that a decline will be necessitated. As a rule, the supply of logs is good, and a large proportion of the mills are assured of a stock so long as they choose to run. Log running is progressing favorably on all the streams. Cass river, which will raft about 100,000,000 feet, will close out this week. Prices for lumber may be quoted at from \$7, \$14, and \$35 to \$7.25, \$14.50, and \$36. The last named figures are for special cases and the better class of lumber. The lower figures may be considered nearer the market.

The shipments for the past month show a slight increase over the corresponding month last year, but for the season to date, we are about 44,000,000 feet behind last season. Below we give a comparative statement of shipments from East Saginaw and Bay City for September.

In this connection it might be stated that the rail shipments in lumber are unusually large, much larger than last year, which, if added to the above, would very nearly, if not quite, equalize the shipments of last year.

We learn that all the logs within the limits of the Cass River Boom, were in the pockets last night. They will be sorted and rafted during the present week, and delivered to owners by the last of next week, thus closing the business of the Boom Company for the season.

In regard to lumbering on the Muskegon, the *News and Reporter* says:—

Our lumbermen are sending all the men they can get to the pines as early in the season, on account of the scarcity of hands. Yet we have no fears that logging the coming winter will be anywhere near as extensive as last season, from the fact that nearly 1,500,000 feet of logs are now hung up on the tributaries which cannot be sawed this fall, while the mills at the present time are sure of a larger stock than they can cut during the few remaining weeks. There are over 40,000 logs at the mouth of the river (every five logs, on an average, will cut 1,000 feet), aside from the large amount in the store rooms. The big drive is near Newago, and contains about 70,000,000 feet.

The high water makes great activity among the lumbermen. Log runners are out in large forces, and the logs for several days have been coming down the river in great numbers.

From the Weekly Herald, Dubuque, Iowa, Oct. 9:—

The past week has developed nothing of special interest to dealers or buyers of lumber. A rise of 30 inches is reported on the Chippewa river, the only tributary favored with a swell and logs running to the mills. The Wisconsin is still low and sending out small fleets from the lower mills. No rise of any general benefit is expected this fall, with the season of navigation only a few more weeks to run. Cars are in ample supply, with a slight falling off in the demand for them.

The Iowa Central and Milwaukee & St. Paul roads have settled their differences and restored tariff rates on lumber to their former standard.

Receipts last week were for home dealers, what little lumber is running goes below, where Chippewa sells at \$17 @17.50 above, and \$17.50@18 below the Rapids. Knapp, Stout & Co. had 2 feets, containing 2,500,000 feet go by last week, and expect another 1,500,000 feet to-day, also for lower river markets. This firm added 500,000 to yard stocks. Weston, Burch & Co. look for a fleet to-day from the lower Wisconsin. Ingram, K. & Day are also expecting a raft from the Chippewa in tow of the Clyde.

Sales for the week were 100,000 of Shaw's lumber to Lum-

bert & Co. for \$16.50, the only transaction afloat. Clark & Scott closed out the balance of their fleet, 300,000 Wisconsin, at Hannibal, for \$1 per M.

The recent advance in yard rates checked transactions somewhat, but buyers have become reconciled and trade is increasing. Stocks are reduced and much broken with prospects of dealers closing in for the winter with a lighter supply than ever before.

From the St. Louis Times, Oct. 9:—

Receipts by river for the week have been moderately good, and consist of some 3,000,000 feet, mainly Chippewa in raft. Sales of the latter at \$18 for mill-run were reported, and the demand still continues greater than the supply. But few more rafts can arrive this season, and it becomes daily more patent that we are again going to be left all round with light stock for spring trade. Under this prospect lumber in yards has risen \$1 per M on common grades, and must inevitably rise still higher when the wholesale market becomes bare of offerings.

From the Chicago Times, Oct. 9:—

The recent equinoctial gales that visited this lake proved very disastrous to the lumber fleet, and, as many vessels were temporarily disabled, owners took advantage of the diminished amount of vessel room to advance rates on both lumber and grain freights. Lumber dealers complained that the rates were exorbitant, but they were obliged to charter vessels, and the figures demanded were reluctantly paid. We quote:—

Manistee, \$4.75; Ludington, \$4.50; Pentwater, \$4; Menomonee, \$6.00; Muskegon, \$3.75@4; Whitehall, \$4; Grand River, \$3.50@3.75; Green Bay, \$6; Oconto, \$7.50.

Our receipts of lumber during the past week have been very large, and an easy feeling was developed, as buyers were generally in light attendance at the Franklin street exchange, and indifferent about purchasing, most of the city docks being crowded. Concessions were frequently granted during the early part of the week, and toward the close, a decline of 25c on joist and scantling, and 25@50c on common strips and boards occurred. This decline was not at first acknowledged by sellers, and only two or three firms had the honesty to fairly report their sales. This dodge of our lumber dealers is an old game, and, as it has not succeeded in any single instance in deceiving parties in the interior, it is difficult to imagine why any seller should be so foolish as to continue to withhold his sales whenever the market declines. The fluctuations in prices for all grades of lumber are promptly noted by us, so that it makes comparatively little difference to our readers in the country whether the daily transactions are recorded or not. The movement last week was largely confined to common grades of lumber, and sales were chiefly on local account.

On yesterday the receipts were light, and another quiet day was experienced, less than a dozen cargoes changing hands. Prices closed as follows:—

There were about 25 or 30 cargoes on sale to-day, and consisted almost entirely of strips and boards, there being only one or two cargoes of piece stuff. There was fair attendance of country and city buyers, and some 20 cargoes changed hands, although only one sale was recorded on the sales book. Dealers insist that prices are no lower. Joists and scantling quotable at \$12.25; strips and boards at \$12.50@20; shingles at \$8.10@3.20; lath at \$8.25@3.37 1/2, closing with about 6 cargoes unsold.

Cargo brig Pilgrim, from Muskegon, 125,000 Norway strips and boards at \$16, sold by Ryan, Young & Co.

In the yards trade was good and prices ruled steady.

From the Troy Weekly Times, Oct. 12:—

During the past week the lumber market was fairly active. Receipts continued large and shipments were quite brisk. Sales were somewhat restricted, on account of the stringency in the money market, but this did not seem materially to affect prices. The stock on hand in the yards is ample for the season, and a fine assortment of all kinds of desirable lumber is now offered. This market at present affords as good inducements for purchasers as any in the country, and good bargains are now attainable. Prices remain without change.

From the Boston Commercial Bulletin, Oct. 12:—

The lumber market has shown considerable improvement during the week, compared with the moderate activity which has ruled for some time past. Dealers are encouraged, and the general opinion seems to be one of satisfaction at the healthy condition of the market.

There is as yet no change in the condition of building operations in the suburbs, and a mournful dullness prevails, in marked contrast with the activity of last year. Nearly all of these houses were mortgaged, and the tightness of the money market has had a disastrous effect on any further operations in that line.

Retail dealers seem to have become imbued with new life, and their purchases during the week to replenish their stocks have been quite large. These supplies were needed to satisfy the moderate demand from parties building for their own accommodation. Such sales have increased in

volume, and are, on the whole, vastly more satisfactory than doubtful sales to speculators.

Of Eastern lumber there have been but few arrivals, owing partly to the lack of freighting facilities and to the prevalence of head winds. The market, however, is amply supplied. Spruce continues in steady demand, prices firm. Shipments to New York and other Southern ports are constantly making, to satisfy the demand from those places. Wide spruce planks is in fair demand. The best qualities of shingles are improving. The higher grades of clapboards are a little scarce, and some inquiry is noted. Hemlock boards are stiffer. There is no overstock of laths in the market, large quantities having been shipped to other markets.

The mills at the East are all busy, orders for dimension being quite plenty. Freights are scarce, and high, which adds to the cost of Eastern lumber, and causes an accumulation of supplies at the shipping points.

From the Savannah Republican, Oct. 11:—

Receipts of timber for the past week have been very light, all taken up on arrival at about our quotations. An active inquiry still exists for vessels for South America and coastwise. We quote:—

Mill timber, \$7@9; shipping do, 600 ft average, \$6@9; 700 ft average, \$9@10.50; 800 ft average, \$10.50@11.50; 900 ft average, \$11@13; 1,000 ft average, \$14@15.

LUMBER—active. Orders are plenty. We quote: Ordinary sizes, \$18@21; difficult sizes, \$21@26; flooring boards, \$21@22; ship stuff, \$20@24, according to sizes.

Vessels are in demand for lumber cargoes, but none are disengaged.

From the Charleston News, Oct. 11:—

The market for timber and lumber is quiet. We quote: Timber for milling purposes from \$6@10; shipping do, \$10@15; bright do, good merchantable, from city mills, cut to size, from \$18@22 per M, by the cargo: lumber, per rail, \$13@15; river lumber, \$11@13; dressed lumber, \$22@25. From the New Orleans Price Current, Oct. 12:—

The trade is extremely dull for this season of the year. There is very little arriving, but the stock is ample for the limited demand. Shipments to foreign ports are being made direct from the mills.

We note the following vessels loading at Pascagoula, to wit: brig Raven, with 225,000 ft, and brig James Miller, with 210,000 for New York; brig Julia E. Haskell, with 225,000 for Boston, and brig William Welsh, with 300,000 for Philadelphia.

Cargo lots are quoted at \$14@15 per M for inch boards: \$12@14 for scantling; \$13@14 for rough weatherboards; and \$16@18 for dressed. Rough flooring is selling at \$15@18 and dressed, \$22@25.50; dressed ceiling, \$18@20; Cypress, \$20@25; common shingles, \$3.50@4, and laths, \$2.50 for lake and \$2.75 for Pensacola. General orders for rough and dressed lumber are filled at \$4 per M on cargo prices.

METALS.—Ingot copper, with a demand yet limited, has rather more strength than recently noted, because of reported advances abroad; yet our quotations at 32 1/2@32 3/4 cents for lake, and 29 1/2@30c for English pig are a shade lower than last week. Manufactured is steady as follows: Yellow metal, new sheathing and bronze, 27c; yellow metal bolts, 22c; copper new sheathing, 49c; bolts and braziers, 45c. Scotch pig iron is quiet, but full prices are asked, although the figures for such lots as have passed hands show not only a perceptible decline, but an unsteadiness on the part of sellers, which really makes quotations nominal. Our prices current will show the variation. American, too, is quiet, the only movement being confined to some of the Lehigh companies that were behind hand with orders. New English rails are weakening at \$72@74 gold, with sales reported as low as \$70 cash. Old English rails are quiet at \$46@47 gold. Scrap unchanged, with more offering from first hands; small sales at \$45@46 from dock and \$50 from yard. Refined bar is yet steady and unchanged, although quotations had declined three-tenths of one per cent. in Philadelphia. During the early part of the week there was considerable movement in foreign pig lead, but at the close it had subsided and the market was quiet. Holders standing firm for \$6.55@6.62 1/2 gold, for ordinary, with small sales reported at \$6.40 gold. Manufactured quoted still as heretofore: Bar, 9 1/2c; sheet and pipe, 11c; tin-lined pipe, 16 1/2c, less 10 per cent. to the trade. Neither pig nor sheet tin has improved a bit, and our quotations are nominal. We quote Banca at 38c; Straits 33 1/2c; and English, 33 1/2c per lb, all gold. Sheet zinc we quote at 10@10 1/2c.

2. The arrangement of tar-paper or its equivalent be-tween adjoining blocks of concrete, substantially as and for the purpose set forth.

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
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
