THE FUTURE OF WESTCHESTER COUNTY.

THE great inconveniences resulting from the Horse Epidemic will have the effect of proving more conclusively than ever the absolute necessity of steam-transit through the city, in lieu of the present unwieldy and uncertain system of horse-cars. Although there is little yet to show for it, there can be no doubt that we seem at present nearer the desired consummation than we ever were previously. Since the positive assurances given by Mr. Vanderbilt that the works on the Underground Railroad would be carried out without delay, public hope has been considerably revived, for it was universally felt that the enterprise was in the hands of one who usually succeeds in whatever he undertakes to perform. But apart from this, there are other lines of speedy transit which give fair promise of being shortly under weigh. One of these is "The Central Underground," which has its charter still intact and is only temporarily suspended by the selfish jealousies of interested speculators; the other is "The New York Elevated Railway," the only one which has hitherto given us even a foretaste of the good to be derived from a more rapid locomotion than that to which we have been hitherto subjected. This road has really been doing essential service, noiselessly and unostentatiously, while others have been engaged in only asking how it was to be done. It now forms connection with and transfers passengers regularly to the Hudson River Railroad; so that people living at Yonkers, in Westchester County, can reach the City Hall in one hour's time. This line can, however, only be looked upon at present as a sort of useful experiment. It was built so hurriedly, and much more lightly than it need have been, that it seems just now too frail for anything like heavy and continuous

traffic; but there is no reason why it should not be so remodelled and reconstructed as to render it a permanent rapid-transit line of the city, as it has certainly been the boldest pioneer.

But, whether sooner or later, whenever one or more of these rapid modes of conveyance by steam shall become an established fact to our citizens, there can be no calculating the extent of the revolution that will be made among the dwellings of whole masses of our population, nor can any limit be put to the advantages that Westchester County must necessarily derive from such a change. It is the natural outlet for our pent-up thousands, who cannot afford to hold property at the rates it has assumed in New York. Every square foot of unoccupied land on Manhattan Island is already so enhanced in value, owing to the improvements already consummated or known to be in contemplation, that investors have long since been holding it at prices beyond the reach of people of small means. Many of these, unable to find their natural relief north of Manhattan Island, owing to the lack of easy communication, have been driven to seek homes in New Jersey and on Long Island; preferring all the inconveniences and delays of depending on ferries—which in winter are often serious—to the daily annoyance and loss of time in going long distances upon our inadequate horse-cars. Time was when they seemed to have no other alternative, but that time has already changed, and the change is daily becoming more rapid. When the City Hall, or its immediate neighborhood, was the business centre of the city, our overflowing population was glad to avail itself of the cheap lands and easy transportation afforded them across our rivers, when they could, within a few minutes' walk from their places of business, reach the ferries. But now the centre of the retail business is above Union Square, and is gradually reaching further northward, and those who have their daily occupations above Union Square find themselves cut off from the facilities of the down-town ferries. To many thousands employed above Union Square it is easier to go to the Grand Central Depot, and thence into Westchester County, than it is to take stages and cars down to the ferries to convey them across to their homes in New Jersey or Long Island. To this upper portion of our population Westchester County is therefore, even now, the most accessible; but when steam transit is fairly established, when the blissful time arrives that a worker down town can take his seat in a warm and well-appointed carriage and be whirled to his home in Yonkers or Tarrytown in about the same time that it now takes him to reach his residence in Twentieth or Thirtieth street, half-frozen and fatigued by standing clinging to the straps of a horse-car, he will, together with the

thousands who now dwell in New Jersey and Long Island, in whatever part of the city they may be employed, naturally turn their eyes northward, and prefer homes in the equally accessible and more favored climate of Westchester County; especially when they can thus be altogether independent of ferries. The building of the East River bridge may modify this result on the Eastern shore, but to the dwellers of New Jersey the change seems inevitable.

Although this would appear the natural and certain movement of our population in future, the County lands in Westchester have hitherto not been largely dealt in by speculators. At the same time the utmost activity has been shown in individual places, among towns and villages along the different lines of railroads, and in some instances the value of property has risen very rapidly. In Yonkers, for instance, there are lots of 25 feet by 100 feet which a very few years ago were not worth more than 500 dollars, which can now readily command from \$3,000 to \$3,500 each. Perfectly aware of the future before it, Westchester County is already one net-work of railways, either actually completed or to be shortly constructed, opening up new and rich districts through to Connecticut and Massachusetts, and concentrating a flood of travel and trade into what will form not long hence the upper part of the City of New York. All public improvements there are also being carried out with this end in view. Broad avenues and drives are being laid out in every direction, which are destined to be but continuations or connections of the magnificent avenues and boulevards of New York City, when these little villages, now in their very infancy, shall be part and parcel of one great Metropolis. So rapidly does improvement march with us, when fairly begun, that had we now but one or two lines of rapid transit in operation, it is not too much to say that many now living would yet live to see an entirely new city located beyond the northernmost point of Manhattan Island and connected with it; a city so large in extent that on the map it would look like the wide-spreading branches of some huge tree, of which Manhattan Island would represent the sturdy trunk.

MARKET REVIEW.

BRICK.—The market has continued dull through the past week, very few sales having been made of any class of stock. But as dealers under strong inducement might have acceded to concessions on former prices, it is thought that much more business would have been transacted if the means of removing purchases had not been so effectually checked, as it was by the sudden disabling of draught horses by the prevailing epidemic. In fact, this obstruction to local transportation has had its effects on every branch of the building material interest, which, being composed chiefly of bulky invoices, cannot be removed by any less powerful agency than horse-power. But, while the market is a little weak, we adhere to the quotations of last week, except in the case of pale brick, which have really experienced the slight decline noticed. We quote: Haverstraw Bay brick, \$8.50@7 per M.; Up-rivers and Jerseys, \$7.50@8 do.; Pale, \$5.50@5.75 do.; Croton Fronts, \$12@16 do.; Philadelphia, \$40@45 do from yard.

LATH.—There has been little improvement in the market to note. However, sales have been made at a decline of 25¢ below our recent quotations, and we quote Eastern at \$2.25.

LIME.—The market generally is very quiet. Dealers are pretty well stocked, so there is very little needed. In fact, no great quantity is reaching here from any point, and there is very little likelihood that the market will be gorged. We continue our quotations for Bald Mountain, Fort Ann, Glenn's Falls, and Rockland, at \$1.35 per barrel, for common, and \$1.75 for dry for finishing.

LUMBER.—The business at the yards is again reported good. In fact, at some of them it is impossible to fill orders promptly for want of draught animals; instances are even reported where deliveries that should have been made a week since are yet incomplete.

The following despatch, published in the *Evening Post*, October 30th, has created no little wonderment here; but it is evident that the correspondent transmitting it must have become confused in his facts:

"The attention of the Secretary of the Treasury having been called to the fact that certain importers of clapboards construe the law imposing a duty of two dollars per thousand as authorizing the importation of all such boards where the length exceeds four feet, a decision has been given by the Secretary, in which he says that the law only permits the importation of boards of four feet in length at the rate of duty prescribed, and that where the boards exceed four feet there must be a proportionate increase of duty."

The tone of the market here continues firm at our quotations. Eastern Spruce rules very steady at \$17@21, which range includes all specifications.

Three dollars per car to be added when transferred which charge follows the shingles.

From the St. Louis Times, Oct. 28:—

Trade in lumber continues good and the demand for dry has been in excess of the supply. The stocks of green in yards are also light and the receipts by river have been only moderate. The tendency of both dry and green lumber is to firmness, and without a rise is had in the upper rivers, higher prices are anticipated. Shingles and lath show no change, being in good request at last week's prices.

From the Saginaw Courier:—

The absence of the customary fleet of vessels has the effect to check business somewhat, and to render those whose occupation is gone during the suspension of navigation, a trifle murky; but there is no let up in the grooves of business; Preparations are being made to put in a fair stock of logs, which, when held over, will give an ample supply next season. There is "back-bone" now in the lumbering business.

A careful estimate of the logs put in last winter on streams where there was not sufficient water to start them, of logs started and hung up, and of logs run, which will be held over in the booms, makes the aggregate of logs which will be carried over for the next year's sawing, 40,000,000 feet. The lumber reported as carried over mainly, and not as "on hand sold," is held by the manufacturers.

From Bell & Forsyth's Circular, Quebec, Oct. 18:—

We have few sales to report, notwithstanding that the money market is easier, and that the arrivals from sea this autumn have been fully up to the average. The statement rendered by the supervisor of Cutters shows a great fall off in the quantity of square timber measured compared with preceding years.

WHITE PINE.—Owing to the unfavorable accounts from Great Britain, purchasers are unwilling to come up to the prices demanded by the manufacturers, and consequently transactions have been very limited during the past fortnight. Rafts have changed hands at 26 1/2c to 27c for 66 to 68 ft, average 16 1/2 to 17 inch girth, and at 10 1/2 to 11 1/2 for 50 to 52 ft, 14 1/2 to 15 inch girth, according to quality and manufacturer.

RED PINE.—Is inquired for, none offering, except with white pine rafts.

OAK.—Sales of Canada at 45 to 46c.

ELM.—Exceedingly scarce; no small average to market.

SAVES.—In good demand.

DEALS.—Firm at quotations.

From the Boston Commercial Bulletin:—

The improvement noted in the lumber market during the last two weeks still continues, and the amount of business transactions seems to grow larger with each succeeding week, notwithstanding the absence of any speculative feeling in the market.

There have been numerous arrivals of Eastern lumber during the week, part of which was ordered, thereby not influencing the market. There have been sales of cargoes of spruce at \$15.00 @ \$16.00, and a few lots not so desirable at a lower price. Hemlock boards are selling at \$14.00 @ \$15.00, and the demand is good. There is no abundance of laths, and quoted prices are readily obtained. There is a good demand for pine shipping boards, which are in rather short supply. Shingles and clapboards still rule dull, with ample stocks for future wants.

The item of freights has a decided effect on the price of Eastern lumber. These rule higher than last season, and the prospects ahead are by no means in favor of lower rates. From Portland to Boston the charges have advanced 25c per M, and a vessel was chartered this week, from Portland to New York city, at \$8.37 per M, which is 12 cents higher than ever paid before. At all the shipping points there is

great accumulation of supplies, and no available means of bringing them to market.

Good dry Western are in short supply. The better quality of Chestnut finds ready sale. Michigan pine saps continue scarce.

Black Walnut is firm at \$85.00.

Beyond the usual seasonable demand there is nothing important in the market for Southern lumber. There is ample supply of boards and short timber. The demand for bridge building, and railroad and corporation use, is moderate. There are encouraging signs of a good fall trade, and orders for extra sizes for large vessels would command better prices than our quoted rates. Freights are still moderate.

From the Troy Weekly Times:—

During the past week a little improvement has been manifested in the lumber market, although there is still a great contrast with the activity which is usually incident to this season of the year. Receipts continue abundant, and the yards generally are supplied with a very good though not excessive stock of lumber. Sales run a little better than during the previous week, and shipments were fair. Only a short time remains to close the year's business, and a great rush is anticipated during the next month.

The trade is extremely dull for this season of the year. There is very little arriving, but the stock is ample for the limited demand. Shipments to foreign ports are being made direct from the mills.

We note the following vessels loading at Pascagoula, to—Bark Inn, with 250,000, and bark San Jacinto, with 400,000 ft for Havana; brigs Sarah and Emma, for Providence, with 225,000; brig Lizzie Beck, for Boston, with 225,000; schooner Island City, with 220,000, and brig Ocean Eagle, with 250,000, for New York.

Cargo lots are quoted at \$14@15 per M for inch boards; \$12@14 for scantling; \$15@14 for rough weatherboards; and \$16@15 for dressed. Rough flooring is selling at \$15 @18 and dressed, \$22@25.50; dressed ceiling, \$18@20; Cypress, \$20@25; common shingles, \$3.50@4, and laths, \$2.50 for lake and \$2.75 for Pensacola. General orders for rough and dressed lumber are filled at \$4 per M on cargo prices.

The stock of Oak staves on hand is large with a good demand, but few shipments are being made on account of the scarcity of tonnage. We quote extra pipe, culled, per 1,200, delivered alongside vessel, \$100; wine pipe, \$115@120; extra hhd, \$135@140; extra claret, \$100@105; extra bbl, \$60; extra keg, \$40@45.

METALS.—Ingot Copper is dull and dispirited and sales cannot be forced with a deduction from ruling quotations. We quote 32 cents per lb. New Sheathing is quoted as before at 43 cents; Bolts and Braziers 45 cents; Bronze and Yellow Metal Sheathing 27 do, and Yellow Metal Bolts, 22 do. Scotch Pig is more active than it has been and the market much stronger in tone because of the difficulties reigning among manufacturers on the other side which promises to reduce the production. Cottontail is without quotation; Gartscherie \$55 @ \$50 per ton; Glengarnock \$53 @ 51; Eglington \$52 @ \$52.50. American is more quiet but such sales as have been made have realized full prices. ALBANY LUMBER MARKET.

The Albany Argus, for the week ending October 20, 1872, reports as follows:—

The absorbing topic of the day is the horse disease. All branches of business are seriously inconvenienced by it and more serious results will follow if the spread of the disease among canal horses shall become general.

A more eventful business year cannot be recalled: the late opening of navigation; the difficulties of transportation by lake and river; labor strikes, money panic, the presidential election, and now the disease among the horses.

The lumber market has been and is suffering from all these, and, in addition, by a falling off in demand and curtailment of business.

Prices in the District remain unchanged, with fair business doing, but there is not the activity usual at the fall season. Still, there is time for an active trade before the close of navigation. Buyers may find their calculations upset by this unexpected difficulty with horses hindering the movement of lumber, and by an early closing of navigation.

The foreign shipping demand at New York, Philadelphia, and from other ports has improved within the last few days, owing to the shipping season, by way of the St. Lawrence, drawing to a close. The reports from these points continue favorable in the local demand; an increased activity being manifested. Chicago market also continues brisk, with improved prospects.

High freights and lack of vessels have interfered with shipments from Saginaw and Bay City, and the docks are crowded with lumber. To make sale holders are willing to make concessions, but if the lumber is to be carried over, holders propose to carry it themselves, rather than concede much in prices.

The receipts in the District have been fair and stocks continually well assured.

We have no figures of the canal receipts in addition to those furnished last week, the fourth canal week of the month not closing until Thursday next.

The receipts at Chicago so far this season are 1,035,819,000 feet.

The receipts at Oswego during the week are 5,546,000 ft. to Buffalo, 2,024,000 ft.
