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LIFE INSURANCE GAMBLING.]

AFTER proving conclusively that life insurance rates were twenty per cent. higher than they should be, the Mutual backs down from its proposal to adopt an honest rate and agrees to continue to please its customers for the benefit of the small semi-bankrupt concerns which are its rivals. This action is very remarkable from a business point of view. A. T. Stewart, for instance, is enabled by his immense capital and the admirable organization of his business to sell his goods twenty per cent. cheaper than any of his feeble rivals in the dry-goods trade, making a good profit where they would net a loss. Now suppose these rivals, instead of going out of the business, in the proper course of trade, should combine, and rush into print to denounce the great establishment which offered to serve the community by cheapening necessary articles of wear. Such action would be preposterous, and Mr. Stewart would be justified in paying no heed to the clamor. As a matter of fact his house is full of employés who tried to be his rivals, but, not being able to sell as cheaply as he, they failed. The struggle for life, the weakest going to the wall, is a law of nature and obtains in trade and society as well as in the organic world about us.

Let it be understood then, hereafter, that all who deal with the Mutual and allied companies pay, according to their own actuaries and officers, twenty per cent. more than is necessary. Of course the real loss to the customers of these companies is very much greater. Indeed, as a matter of fact, the life insurance companies take three dollars out of the community for every one they return to the heirs of their customers.

There is many a true word said in jest, and though the above came to us unsigned, we have no doubt it is from an officer of one of the Life companies who is aware of the fraudulent character of the whole business. It is indeed the meanest and most treacherous kind of gambling, in which the companies play with stocked cards and loaded dice; their victims in every case being the widows and orphans of the poor and struggling.

Of course we do not wish to be understood as impugning the characters of all who are engaged in life insurance. No doubt the great majority of officers and managers mean to be as honest as the law allows and circumstances permit, but the whole conception and conduct of the business is necessarily demoralizing. The individual stakes his money and his life against a certain sum to be paid his heirs. No sentimental considerations can make anything out of this but gambling in its most horrible and offensive form. The players on both sides take their chances with the odds heavily in favor of the "bank." Indeed, the companies which represent the latter, even the best of them, play a "skinning" game. Morrissey and Chamberlain give twice the show to their customers that the Mutual and Equitable do to theirs.

Of course this villainous business will go on until the ruin which follows all fraud supervenes. In marvelling at the wealth of the officers of these companies, we must bear in mind that the same Providence which created foxes also ordained geese.

A CORRECTION.—An architectural friend, to whose opinions we attach the highest value, has drawn our attention to an error in the remarks we recently made concerning the new Collegiate Reformed Protestant Dutch Church; in which we stated that the mullions of the windows are of wood, whereas they are of stone. He also thinks that the natural tendency of those remarks is to bring discredit upon the talents and capacity of the architect of the building.

The error which we made respecting the windows we have much pleasure in rectifying, and have only to add, that if the remarks merited the interpretation imputed to them, nothing could have been farther from our thought and intention. So far were we, indeed, from wishing to attribute any lack of capacity or talent to the architect—of this church—that we distinctly said, one reason why the peculiarities to which we objected in this building were to be more than usually regretted, was because

every portion of it showed an amount of skill and study in the designer which could easily have afforded to dispense with the prevailing fashion of striving after meretricious novelty. Among the many wretched platitudes with which downright ignorance has defaced the city, under the pretended name of Gothic architecture, it is so refreshing to meet with a building which, as in this case, exhibits thorough knowledge, motive, and earnest thought in the designer, that we should be very sorry to do it injustice. With all its peculiarities, it is so immeasurably superior to the generality of churches hitherto erected in New York, that the author of it may be fairly ranked among the very few architects in our midst to whom we can look for anything like progress in art. With all the boldness, earnestness of thought, originality and inventive faculty which it exhibits, this edifice has failed in being a perfect model of Gothic architecture only because the designer of it allowed his love of eccentricity to misapply, in manifold instances, the very beauties of which he has been evidently so diligent and successful a student.

THE METROPOLITAN MUSEUM OF NEW YORK.

THIS excellent institution—still so young that many New Yorkers are probably not even aware of its establishment among us—bids fair, by the energy and judgment displayed at the commencement of its management, to speedily compete with some of its most renowned European contemporaries. A purchase has recently been made of General di Cernola's celebrated collection, which excites no little envious comment among our cousins across the water. It appears that this same collection had been previously offered to the British Museum at a price far below its actual value; but, either through misapprehension of its preciousness or mistaken economy, the offer was neglected which has been so wisely accepted by the managers of our Museum. Now that the oversight is past redemption, the authorities of the British Museum are severely censured by the press for their remissness, and the London *Athenaeum*, while congratulating New York upon its great bargain, confesses that the English have lost what they should have bought at any reasonable price. So far has this censure gone, that Mr. Newton, of the British Museum, is actually about to publish what may be called an apology for the action of the Museum authorities. The *Athenaeum*, in commenting upon this rare collection of antiquities, thus describes them:

"There are many specimens of Greek glass, such as lachrymatories, jars, vases, bottles, etc. Although rarely remarkable for size, these ex-

amples are interesting on account of the variety of their forms and their typical character. Of course they are for the most part of the Roman period, although many must be referred to that of the Hellenic dominion in Cyprus, and not a few are archaic Greek. Although belonging to a well-known class of antiquities, they are curious, because during their centuries of interment certain chemical agents have acted on the surface of the glass itself, and produced an iridescence of the most lovely description. This change in the surface of the glass is by no means difficult to account for, but its charm is magical. Some examples are more resplendent than opals, and the tints of others are extremely rare and exquisite; others of the vessels retain morsels of ointment, to hold which they were placed in the tombs. One characteristic of the glass which has been exposed to the agents to which we have referred is, that its surface scales off; and as this happens over and over again, many of the vessels are reduced to the tenuity of eggshell porcelain; others are still thinner.

"Besides the works in glass, we have a large number of vases. In some of them the patterns, painted in black and red on the dark cream-colored earthenware of which the vessels are formed, show their great antiquity. These patterns are a frequent characteristic of archaic design, and they were no doubt adapted from those in vogue with weavers of textile fabrics and baskets. On account of certain inscriptions, declared to be Phoenician, they are said to be due to the people of Tyre, those early possessors of Cyprus. Other fictile works are decorated with figures of ships. There is on one a very curious representation of a galley. Some amphoræ bear inscriptions of Phoenician origin. There are three large jars, painted with the Egyptian lotus pattern, and what may be called textile ornaments. Several specimens of earthenware, pateræ, etc., are evidently Egyptian. They have an opaque, dull green glaze, and are enriched with Nilotic designs, e.g., the lotus in a radial arrangement, figures, and what look like hieroglyphics. There is a curious male figure seated in a chair.

"A bronze patera, of high antiquity and archaic character, has figures on it representing the worship of Venus, with the altar, and vases on the altar, priests, musicians with double pipes, a lyre, and a timbrel. These figures are executed in *repoussé*, and are in perfect preservation. There is also, in the same material, a fragment of a vase of considerable size, with figures of animals on the rim, and a few weapons, pins, and brooches. The objects in gold are neither numerous nor of a rare kind. Among them are a pair of large hairpins of solid gold, about nine inches long, having pods of the poppy for their heads, and a strip of beaten gold looking like part of a belt or decoration for furniture, with an archaic variety of the honeysuckle ornament, and a few rings, brooches, ear-rings, and simple fibulae."

The managers of the Museum of New York are certainly to be congratulated upon this successful termination of their negotiations. The collection of General di Cernola is recognized among antiquaries as one of the most remarkable in existence; and among other objects of the rarest value the statues from Golgor are pronounced perfectly unique. What these an-

tiqe treasures actually cost we are not at present informed, but it is at least satisfactory to know that they have been obtained at a price which is recognized among connoisseurs as far below their market value, and at what the *Athenaeum* is pleased to call "a great bargain."

GOSSIP.

THE Long Island farmers are again agitating the question of a market place in Brooklyn, where they may dispose of their truck, and obviate the present necessity of crossing the East River. It seems that Mayor Powell has taken up their battle, and there is fair prospect of success.

The probable result of the suit to obtain possession of the estate and millions of the late Madame Juncl, is, that when the lawyers get their share, and the successful litigant has made up his balance-sheet, he will wonder wherefore he has fought the battle.

The tax-payers and property-owners of the lower towns of Westchester County are considerably exercised over the action of the Committee on Equalizing Assessments. It seems that the assessed valuation of the upper towns has been reduced, and that of the towns nearer New York advanced in a corresponding ratio. It is not because that has been done, but because it has been overdone that complaint has been made. It might be instructive for the aggrieved to inquire whether the dictators of the changed valuations are not themselves holders of a goodly share of the property benefited. It is a gratifying fact to all the property owners in New York, and the lower part of Westchester county, that the scheme for rapid transit by way of the Fourth avenue if likely to be prosecuted to a successful issue. The work of excavation has already been begun, and with the coming of milder weather, we may expect to see the enterprise pushed forward still more rapidly.

The opening of a street railroad through Twenty-third street is the latest and best indication of the advance of business to the upper parts of the island.

The work on the new east side Croton main is now progressing day and night, Sundays not excepted.

Brooklyn's Reform Committee of One Hundred, like the New York Committee of Seventy, failed to get their proposed city charter through the Legislature last winter, and have now resolved to bring it up again, but it is feared that a breach has been made in the party ranks, and a split made in the representative Albany delegation, in consequence of the appointment of a new United States District Attorney.

The various Street Commissions have been unusually busy during the past week in hearing the objections and complaints of property-owners. The most prominent are the Western Boulevard, and the Eleventh Avenue Extension.

At a regular meeting of the Park Commissioners on Wednesday, Controller Green offered resolutions to the effect that the suggestions made some time ago by William R. Martin, concerning the appointment of a single Commission for street extensions, should be taken into consideration by the Board, and that it should proceed to take such action as would bring about that result. It was finally decided to consider the matter at a special meeting.

The average citizen very rightly objects to apings wine by living in the mud, and consequently the residents of 155th street are in no wise pleased with the contractors who have abandoned the work of opening the street. The contractors began the work last summer, and promised to complete it by the first of December. Now all labor has ceased, and aside from the mud-wallowing of those who live in the vicinity, owners complain that they cannot rent their vacant houses.

MARKETS.

BRICK.—In the ordinary course of things the brick market should be at the lowest ebb of dullness at this time. We are fairly entered upon the holiday season and deep into winter, and there should be less requirement for anything in the building material line than we are able to note, in the case of bricks this week. Of course, the supply arriving does not pour in as during the summer months, but such boats as have not been laid up are well employed for warding cargoes from the Haverstraw kilns, which find ready purchasers on arrival, at a strong and advanced rate. From above the Highlands, whence come the quality rated as "Up-rivers," no brick are being received, the river in that vicinity being too much blocked with ice to render navigation at all certain. So the Haverstraw Bay brick have almost a clear monopoly, which accounts for the position they hold in the market now. The better quality of "hards" have been sold as high as \$10.50 per M.; intermediate qualities running as low as \$9.50 do, at which rate a cargo of rough brick was sold. We have not heard of any receipts of Pale, but quote nominally at \$5.25@5.75 per M. Franks are unchanged: Crotons, \$12@16 per M., and Philadelphia, \$40@45 from yard.

LATH.—There has been but a small receipt of lath since our last report, and the stocks remain very low, while the inquiry has not abated one jot. Cargoes are wanted, and unless the market is relieved prices will be advanced far beyond what they are now. Sales have already been made at \$2.75, but we quote at \$2.60@2.75 per M.

LIME.—Several cargoes of Rockland arrived this week, which have partially satisfied the wants of buyers, but being all taken up on arrival, leaves the market without any practical relief, as more is needed and would find ready buyers. The up-river men have ceased forwarding since the canals closed, as is usual, and consequently no more will be received by them. However, what they have on stock now in the city will keep them along for a while; when exhausted, no fresh supplies from that source will probably be received until spring; certainly no great quantity will be forwarded. No change has been made in quotations, and it is deemed very improbable now whether any will occur. We quote:—Fort Ann, Bald Mountain, Glenn's Falls and Rockland common at \$1.50 per bbl.; finishing do., \$1.75 do.

LUMBER.—There has been a steady, fair business doing for the past week, in the main. There are a few yards where the report is not quite so favorable, but the majority of them feel well satisfied with what they have been doing, everything considered. We have but two alterations to call attention to in our quotations: spruce plank, it will be seen, we quote from \$50@55, instead of \$55@60, as before; this is not a decline, as the plank which are quoted at the lower figure are narrower by one inch than those sold under the higher quotations. Early last spring we noted the fact that the new crop would be cut nine inch, instead of ten inch, as heretofore. Good cherry has been advanced to \$80@100, being scarce and difficult to obtain.

Eastern Spruce holds to our quotations and is yet wanted, and arriving slowly. We quote at \$16@18.50.

At a meeting of the directors of the Company a rebate of 11 cents per M. feet of logs handled was voted to owners whose logs passed through the Company's boom.

The same paper says:—

The horse disease which swept over the country recently, has, no doubt, worked greater injury to the lumbermen than many are aware of. In conversation with some of them we learn that their operations this fall have been greatly retarded by the laying up of their teams by the epizoot. One firm informs us that he is already loser to the extent of at least \$6,000 by it, and another states his loss at \$2,500. We are pleased to state that the disease has abated.

The Saginaw Weekly Courier of last week says:—

We observe that the Muskegon lumbermen are inaugurating a movement for self-protection, by stop selling their lumber in the Chicago lumber market, and compelling Chicago dealers to buy the lumber at the mill dock. The only thing strange in this proposition is the fact that it has not been carried into effect at an earlier date, and we presume that this measure at this time is forced upon the lumbermen as an actual necessity. The abuses of the Chicago market have got beyond endurance, and self-protection demanded an immediate and radical reform in the manner of marketing lumber. Under the present system the bulk of the West shore lumber is consigned to lumber brokers, doing business on the Chicago Lumber Exchange, who, in a majority of cases, sell it with little regard to quality, and an equal disregard for the interest of the shipper.

From another source we learn that the lumbermen charge the Chicago brokers with indifference to their interest, and in instances with knavery, in conspiring to raise freights on lumber, and to bear the market in the interest of yard men, with whom they are in collusion, and otherwise to countenance schemes to defraud the shippers of lumber.

The following is from the Saginaw Courier, Dec. 14:—

One hundred thousand feet of logs have been cut in the piney of R. H. Mason, in Maple Grove Township, and 50,000 feet hauled into the mill for cutting.

Our lumbermen, says the Grand Rapids Democrat, will put in all the logs they can get their fingers on this winter. Wonderley & Co., of the Empire gang mill, have already

contracted for 17,000,000 feet. This mill will be kept running during the winter.

From the Chicago Tribune, Dec. 16:—

A good business was again done in the yards on Saturday, as on previous days of the week. Buyers were in fair attendance, and the movement was chiefly confined to inquiry account. Joists, scantling, and common descriptions of building material were chiefly called for. Common dresel flooring and siding also had liberal sales. Prices were steady and unchanged.

From the St. Louis Globe, Dec. 12:—

The same cause which has affected, to a greater or less extent, during the past week, every department of trade has been seen in connection with this market. The impossibility of handling large quantities, and the extreme difficulty experienced in moving small lots, has caused the usual buyers to stand out of the market. Where any prices were offered for lots at the depots, they were much below recent values. Yellow pine has been in large receipt, and prices have been maintained only with great difficulty. The river business above being at an end for the season, trade on the levee has been the dullest of any. White pine in the latter place is quite nominal, and no sales are reported. Business at the yards has, of course, been greatly affected, though not so severely as at the depots, and prices are steady.

Trade is generally brisk at this season of the year; but consumers laid in such large stocks during last summer, that as yet there is no large demand. The prices are as follows:—

From the Troy Times:—

With the closing of canal and river navigation, naturally comes the close of the lumber business. Shipping was kept up briskly the past week, and many barges were loaded and got off in a hurry. The last shipment was made on Monday afternoon, but it is doubtful if the barge can get through. The past season has been full of vicissitudes and interruption, and has resulted in rather a poor year's business. First there was the long delay in the opening of the canals, then came the labor strikes, then high freights, then the Presidential election, and a stringent money market, then the "epizootic," all of which causes combined have more or less hurt the business and disturbed the ordinary course of trade.

The aggregate amount of business done the past year is probably in excess of the previous year, but the cost of doing business has been greater and the profits will be less. The amount of lumber now on hand to be wintered is estimated at from 35,000,000 to 40,000,000 feet, and although

the amount is greater than it was last winter, is not above the average quantity. The stock is very well distributed, and embraces all the various kinds of lumber in fair proportions. There is, however, a scarcity of good pine boards and clear lumber. But this want can be met by next spring, if railroading is resorted to.

More lumber was the past year shipped through direct from manufacturing points to purchasers down the river than ever before, and consequently the dealers were kept so well supplied through the part of the season, that they rarely were obliged to come to this market to get their supplies, and hence stock accumulated here through the summer and early fall to an unusual extent. Later in the season it was in demand, but instead of being sold and turned into cash at this time, there will ensue from four to six months time before it will be paid for. This late trade is never considered as desirable as the early trade, which this year was almost entirely monopolized by the manufacturer.

From the Williamsport Gazette and Bulletin of Dec. 12:—

The shipments for the month of November only reach 20,185,260 feet against 27,928,843, for October, or a decrease of 7,753,583 feet. The following are the shipments:—

The last shipment made by canal was on the 26th November, when one boat was cleared. Many of the mills closed on the 30th, the cold weather having practically closed the business for the season. Prices however remain firm—the stock on hand is fully equal to the demand, and our lumbermen will hold on to their stock rather than yield to any pressure for an uncalculated diminution in prices.

LUMBERING ON THE ST. CROIX.

From the Stillwater Gazette of the 2d inst., we clip the following, touching lumbering operations on the upper St. Croix:—

Judging from present appearances the log cut on the upper St. Croix and its tributaries this winter will be very large. It seems as though every man who could get an axe and a pine tree, was going to try his fortune, while the heavier concerns expect to do a heavy winter's work. So far the weather has been favorable, the work being further advanced than it usually is at the first of January. The snow is sufficient for hauling, and the swamps are frozen over. The number of supply teams on the road are greater than ever before known, and come from all quarters. Some days the number of teams passing I've's stopping place will reach 125, and about one half as many pass by the Butternut lake. This year the supply teams are mostly drawn by four horses.

The Dubuque (Iowa) Herald, of Dec. 10, says:—

To say that trade is dull would be telling the plain truth, and as such we report the condition of the market, attributable mainly to the horse disease, which has cut off the retail demand not only here but also at all points west receiving supplies from this market. The close of the year generally brings a small demand but this season it is less than usual; however dealers are "biding their time," the Epizootic can't last always. There is some snow in the pines, enough to favor operations in logging, but the horse epidemic rages fearfully. Oxen are in use but they are not of much service on the road. Mr. Ingram, of I. K. & Day, just down from the Chippewa Valley, estimates that the horse disease will cut down the usual supply of lumber got out fully $\frac{1}{2}$. After the horses have recovered it will take from four to six weeks before they are able to perform the heavy work required of them, thereby running the season well into the winter before any amount of work is done.

With the above condition of affairs, dealers are firmer than usual, and would as leave hold as sell.

From the Boston Commercial Bulletin, Dec. 14:—

Business has been very fair during the week, the usual seasonal demand being quicker than usual, besides which the trade, caused by the fire, ruling quite as active, if not better than last week.

Eastern lumber has been received freely; the large fleet of vessels due here, which had been detained by head winds, arriving during the week. Most of these cargoes were sold to arrive, and there have been lively times at the retail yards, storing the accumulated purchases. Notwithstanding these numerous arrivals, the market is not overstocked, and prices are the same.

With the first flurry of snow came a lively demand for wooden structures, to cover the numerous piles of brick gathered from the rubble throughout the burned district. The kind of lumber suitable for that purpose has been in good demand, and cargoes which have an assortment of such stuff sell readily, while ordinary carriages move slower. The effect of this steady demand has been to reduce the stocks at the yards and hence, as we have said, the numerous arrivals of later do not overstock the market.

But few more cargoes of Eastern lumber are now due here, and the season is practically closed, so far as manufacturing on the large rivers is concerned. But still there are no fears of a scarcity of lumber here through the winter. For, during the past few years, there have been established a large number of mills, in various parts of New England situated on the railroads, with facilities for sawing and furnishing dimension spruce throughout the entire year, winter as well as summer. However, the expenses of handling logs and manufactured lumber over railroads, instead of through natural channels, by rivers and vessels, enhances the cost.

The supply of ordinary and small sizes of spruce and covering boards is ample until another season. The retail wharves are selling such stock at \$22 per M, delivered at reasonable distances; dry hemlock boards at \$20 per M, and sound pine covering boards at \$21@22. Large sized spruce, extra sizes and lengths have advanced. Pine lumber is firm.

In Western lumber there is no change to note in this mar-

ket. Throughout the West, there are active preparations for cutting logs, and it is estimated that with what are hung up, and what they will cut this winter, there will be at least as much to cut next season as at the beginning of this year.

In Southern lumber, there is plenty for all wants, and price, except for large and long timber, are unchanged. Freight have advanced, and operate against buyers.

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

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

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
