THE FATE OF COMBINATIONS.

During our paper money era a number of combinations came into being for the purpose of controlling prices and taxing the community. They were quite successful during that exceptional period. But there seems to be some law operating in human society which works against any device or arrangement by which an exceptional profit is charged for any description of human labor. Political economists have pointed out that any business which pays more than a fair rate of interest is tolerably sure, in time, to come to grief, because it provokes rivalries, encourages extravagance and waste, and in time the exceptionally profitable business becomes exceptionally unprofitable. A marked instance of this change is shown in the famous coal combination. The anthracite region comprises only a small patch upon the surface of the map of Pennsylvania. Some five railroads and transportation companies have access to this limited area of country, and all the conditions seem to exist for a combination which would put the business entirely in the hands of the corporations which own the mines and control the transportation. Then there was much to be said in favor of some such combination, and indeed the companies were partly forced into it, for they had an exceptionally large demand during the winter season and a small demand during the summer season. This led to fluctuations in prices which were ruinous to any regular industry. The price of coal varied so greatly that foresight was out of the question, and the business became a mere gambling operation. All these points were very clearly stated in the address to the public by Mr. Franklin B. Gowan, President of the Philadelphia and Reading Railroad. He headed this combination, and his argument seemed irrefutable that it was best for all concerned that the railroad companies should own the mines, dictate the prices paid for labor and fix the rate that should be paid for coal. But unfortunately the only interests represented in the councils of this combination were those of the companies themselves, and the temptation to fix a high rate and maintain it, was too great to be resisted. The combination of capitalists fought the combinations of working-men and beat them. They succeeded in reducing the

price of labor to the lowest possible limit. They have also succeeded for several years past in keeping up the price of coal at far higher rates than those which obtained during the war and up to 1871. But evidently something ails this combination. All the four railroads have been losing money; their stocks are falling in the market with great rapidity. Only one of the four operating roads is known to be paying expenses. The Delaware and Lackawanna, the Consolidation Coal, the Reading, the New Jersey Central and every other company, saving alone that owned by the Pennsylvania Coal Co., have passed their dividends, and have lost heavily by the failure of small coal operators to meet their engagements with them. Their stocks have decreased 20 per cent on the market, though they have succeeded in keeping up the price of coal. This has led to bitter complaint from manufacturers, who say that in these hard times, when everything was needed to help manufacturing industry, a figure was put on coal which made the starting of the furnaces in the iron working region out of the question.

In fact, any associated enterprise which involves more than one business is in very great danger of coming to grief. Mining is one business by itself, and railroading is quite another. The tendency of all industry in modern times is towards this specialization of functions, and not towards their consolidation. The same men who are energetic and wise in railroad matters would very likely be found at fault in their judgment in dealing with mines and other allied industries. It is now announced that ten great india-rubber manufacturers of the country have entered into a combination for five years, for the purpose of preventing any competition in the prices of rubber goods. This corporation proposes to fix its price, not to deviate, and each of the ten companies to be confined, as far as possible, to its own local trade. It is safe to say that, as in the case of the coal combination, this monopoly will in the same way be broken up. It is an unnatural state of affairs, and however prosperous it may seem at the beginning, is sure to develop inefficiency and waste, just so far as the profits exceed a fair interest upon the money invested. We judge the day cannot be very far distant when the great sewing-machine combination will also come to grief. The managers indeed have admitted for some time past that the business as a whole did not show a profit. As is well understood, the whole sewing-machine business of this country is virtually a part of one great combination. These consolidated companies not only manufacture the various machines, but they wholesale, job and retail them. In other words, the makers of the machines have endeavored to get rid of the intermediaries with the public which other trades find so indispensable. If the theory of the coal companies, the sewing-machine people and the india-rubber com-

bination is correct, then society is all at fault in recognizing the usefulness of the wholesaler, the jobber, the retailer and the broker, and the proper way to conduct business would be to convert everything into a monopoly. We refer to these matters, because it is doubtful whether we can ever have a real revival of business until these great and unwholesome combinations are broken up. If the consumers had a voice in the councils of these combinations there might be some hope for them; but it is asking too much of human nature to suppose that people who have a monopoly of any description of goods should not endeavor to profit by it to the very utmost. The end of the coal combination cannot be very far off. The india-rubber combination is tolerably sure to come to grief in time, and the condition of the sewing-machine industry will not become wholesome until free competition takes the place of the present unnatural alliance between rival companies, and their practical conspiracy against the sewing women of America.

RAILROAD TO PITTSBURGH.

The project for a new air-line railroad between New York and Pittsburgh is rapidly assuming shape. By direct communication with that point ninety miles could be saved on all western bound freight. Such a road, if it repaid simply the interest on the money invested, and the management were under restraint as to combinations with other lines, and restricted from charging exorbitant rates, would be of immense benefit to the trade of New York City. We have no faith, however, in organizations for such a road, which are similar to other railroad schemes. Such a line should be built either by the city of New York or by the States through which the line will run. It would reduce freights from the West at least one-half, and would be a perpetual restraint upon the roads which centre in New York. Such a road would restore to New York all the business which has been drawn away from it by the efforts of the people of Baltimore, Boston and Philadelphia. The projectors of this contemplated road may as well understand that it is idle to get up an organization for the purpose of being bought out, or to be built by the extravagant issue of bonds, or any of the older methods of manipulating stocks for the benefit of individuals rather than of the community. New York urgently needs such a road. Its construction and proper management would add 20 per cent. to the price of every lot on New York Island. It would pay our property-holders alone to build such a road and run it entirely in the interests of this city, without any reference to profits; but we do not see any means by which this can be accomplished; and we suppose that if such a road is projected it

will be used simply "to strike" the New York Central, the Pennsylvania Central and the Baltimore and Ohio roads, and in the end cheat New York of a direct communication with the West. But really one of the most absolute needs of the metropolis is the construction of an air-line between New York and Pittsburgh, connecting at that point with the systems of railroads which run West, Northwest and Southwest.

THE past week will long be a noticeable one in the mercantile history of New York as having brought together a larger congregation of buyers of drygoods in this city than was ever before known at one time. The occasion of this gathering of representative merchants of the country was the announcement made about ten days ago by two of the selling agents of a number of the largest cotton goods manufacturing corporations in the Eastern States, that they would offer for sale their entire surplus product on Tuesday and Friday respectively of the present week. The sale of Tuesday by Messrs. Wright, Bliss & Fabyan originally contemplated a peremptory sale of 6,000 packages, and at the time the circulars were issued it was currently reported that it was with extreme difficulty that the number of packages could be got together, but before the sale commenced Mr. Bliss announced that on making up their schedules they found that they would be able to offer 8,000 packages, which number, however, was only equal to about three or four weeks' production of their factories. The sale then commenced, and as it progressed the fact was demonstrated that the only trouble with the drygoods trade is one of price, as at a concession of from five to ten per cent. the goods brought eager buyers, who would have readily taken double the quantity offered. The encouraging part of this sale and the one of Thursday is that the prices obtained were mutually satisfactory to sellers and buyers. With the present low price of cotton the manufacturers can sell even at these prices at a fair profit, as it must be remembered that there never has been a time in this country when cotton goods could be manufactured as cheap as the present. Everything now is in favor of the manufacturer—low prices of cotton, low rate of wages, capacity for turning out quantity, which by the way has increased something like 300 per cent., while population has in the same time advanced only about 30 per cent., so that whoever compares present prices of these goods with those ruling before the war will find, to his cost, should he be a purchaser, that the manufacturer, by the aid of the various improvements in machinery made within the last fifteen years, can afford to sell goods at from 15 per cent. to 40 per cent. below ante war prices. This fact is shown by comparing the prices of print cloths, which are now sold in open market at about 25 per cent. less than those ruling in 1860.

In the article on Gold and Silver, last week, the last line in the third column, first page, "ashes of such a size would be imposing," should have been the last line of the third column, second page, which would have made the sentence read properly as follows: "The workmanship is so good that the uninitiated forget that a pile of barrels or ashes of such a size would be imposing. I hope," etc.

MARKET REVIEW.

REAL ESTATE MARKET.

The entire interest of the past week was centred in the announcement of the Messrs. Muller that they would sell at public auction, by order of the assignees of Mr. John D. Phillips, valuable lots on the Boulevard, Madison, St. Nicholas, Second, and Tenth avenues, and also on various streets from Seventy-third up to One Hundred and Seventieth street. The attendance at the Exchange Salesroom on Thursday, the day fixed for the sale, was moderately large, but the room was not so uncomfortably crowded as it has been at noted public sales even since the panic set in. From the very outset, when the words "upset price" were uttered by order of the assignees, a general shrug of shoulders at once denoted that indifference, or rather unwillingness, to purchase had taken hold of the minds of would-be buyers. This proved true to the very end. Notwithstanding repeated efforts on the part of both the Messrs. Muller to draw the least possible bid from the crowd facing their stand, no response was had—aye, not even a single attempt at response—during the three-quarters of an hour that the auctioneers did all they could do to enlist the attention and the pockets of those present. First they offered the block lying between Ninety-sixth street, Ninth avenue, Ninety-fifth street and Tenth avenue, containing fifty-two lots. They announced that the Mutual Life Insurance Company held a mortgage on this block amounting to \$80,000. They proposed to sell the lots on Ninety-sixth street (a hundred-foot street) first at an upset price of \$2,000 for each lot. No response came to that offer. Neither did any come to the upset price of \$1,700 for the Ninety-fifth street lots. New tactics were then put into play. The auctioneers offered to sell the block entire, taking as a first bid \$95,000, or \$15,000 over the mortgage. This worked no better, and when, subsequently, the upset-price policy was abandoned, with a proviso, however, that the assignees reserved the right to withdraw the property, quite a number of those present left the room, and it was evident that the would-be buyers were masters of the market, and that they declined to listen to any terms imposed upon them by the would-be sellers. This block being at last abandoned, the same tactics were brought into play with lots on St. Nicholas avenue and One Hundred and Nineteenth street; also with the lots on Madison avenue and Eighty-fifth street, but with no better success. From one parcel the auctioneers went to other parcels with an energy and zeal deserving of better results; but the spirit of those present was broken down, and it was clearly evident that not a single lot, not even the Crosby street property, could be disposed of so long as the mortgages had to be protected. The auctioneer at last adjourned the sale *sine die*, all those present being satisfied that if there had been no restraint several parcels would have been sold. There were any number of capitalists on the floor, as Mr. Muller himself saw and acknowledged, correctly stating that their "bank accounts were overflowing," but Mr. Muller must have also felt that those gentlemen did not desire to invest in that class of speculative property unless at their own "bed-rock prices." To say that the men there present were not able to carry such a load of property is perfectly ridiculous. They were the very men anxious to find a bottom for the real estate market better than the few skirmishers who here and there pick up a lot or two and endeavor to speculate with them. The property was none too heavy for several of those present in the room, but they appreciated their own strength as masters of the situation, would listen to no assignees' "terms," and refused to surrender their cash. Bottom has therefore not been found yet in the Real Estate Market, and it will not be until sellers look at the situation as complacently as did the manufacturers, who instituted the recent great drygoods sales. When holders or owners of real estate once make up their mind to that—and come it must, as surely it will within the next six months—fair and honorable competition, encouraged by increased building, which is going on all around us, will show that property in New York has not gone to the dogs, and will soon reassert itself in the estimation of capitalists. From all sides we hear encouraging reports of proposed building operations, and it only needs this fact to be well known and appreciated when even unimproved property will somewhat revive from its present lethargy.

In connection with this subject we take pleasure in

giving an important item of news which reaches us from sources entitled to credit and respect that within a week or ten days ground will be broken on the southeast corner of Fifty-fifth street and Fifth avenue for the erection of a grand hotel, to be called The Langham, and to have a frontage of 125 feet on the avenue and 230 feet on the street. The property is owned by Col. Hamersly, who, with a clear foresight as to the future of New York, assists in lining our leading thoroughfare with prominent buildings.

On the southeast corner of Madison avenue and Sixty-eighth street Mr. Robert McCafferty has just begun the erection of five fine buildings, which will show that there is to be no longer a sameness or monotony in our architecture. The Alderman is a good reader of THE RECORD, and he has determined to follow some of the advice given in these columns. The corner house, to be of Philadelphia brick, will have an entrance on Sixty-eighth street; the house adjoining, 18x55x82, will be of Dorchester or other stone; the next house, 17 feet front, will be brown stone, with a bow window; the next, 20 feet front, will be of stone; and the last or fifth house, 23 feet front, will be of Baltimore brick. We shall recur to these buildings again hereafter, and only desire to state now that the last two have already been sold, and that Mr. McCafferty deserves the thanks of the community for relieving us just once of a little monotony in our architecture.

BUILDING MATERIAL MARKET.

BRICK.—The situation is far from encouraging or cheerful, and the selling interest in some cases seems to feel a little down in the mouth at the want of decidedly hopeful features in the lookout as at present shown. The careful hand-to-mouth policy of buyers in itself has a tendency to give business a dragging, listless tone, and the consumption fails as yet to swell to the aggregate expected. Old supplies are under fair control; and, in view of the combination formed among manufacturers, it is thought that most of this year's production will also be held well in hand. There are, however, some "outsiders," and they are not likely to carry stocks to any great length of time when a profit can be seen or money is scarce. The cost of the production, too, is likely to be somewhat diminished this season, which must give buyers a slightly increased advantage. At the date of our last report the accumulation had been worked down pretty low; but the demand was not brisk enough to keep it so, and the supply in first hands soon began to swell again. During the greater portion of the present week there has been more or less of a surplus at all times offering—sometimes twenty or thirty cargoes unsold at once—and this kept rates easy, though no serious break occurred. Buyers certainly are not offering the outlet for stock expected, and there is an occasional expression of belief that the consumption is not to be as large as promised a short time ago. On quotations we find the general range for Haverstraws going from \$6.50 for, now and then, a fancy cargo down to \$5 for poor and washed lots, but the bulk of the sales is in the neighborhood of \$5.75@6 $\frac{3}{4}$ M. One lot of new "Bays" came to hand from a small kiln and brought \$5.75. It contained some very good stock, but the average was not quite as even as could be desired. "Up River" continue to range at about \$4.75@5.50, but not many above \$5.25. Pales were less sought after throughout, and the market rather slackened off somewhat, closing with \$3 an extreme and \$2.50 about the general rate. Fronts are not quick of sale, but meet with some demand. For the leading brands of Crotons, such as keep up the standard of quality, former quotations are obtained, and from one yard we learn of some 3@400,000 sold for this city and the Eastward. Philadelphia and Trenton moderately active and steady. Baltimore have sold to some extent in small lots, and negotiations are now pending on one or two quite respectable orders, the superior quality and low price of this grade appearing at last to receive proper appreciation. We quote: Pale, per M. \$2.50@3; Hards, Up-river, \$4.75@5.50; Haverstraw Bay, \$5.50@6.50; Fronts, Croton-brown, \$10; dark, \$11; red, \$12; Philadelphia, \$23@27; Baltimore, \$34@38. Yard prices, delivery included, \$2@3 higher on ordinary, and \$5@6 on fronts.

CEMENT.—On domestic the selling interest still appears to speak in fairly cheerful tone, and "a good business" is the common report. This, however, is only by comparison with the amount available, the reduced and cautious production alone preventing an accumulation, and buyers in reality showing no great amount of interest or handling as many good as heretofore. Shipping wants have fallen off somewhat, and the local consumption is slow in common with all other styles of material. Prices remain as before, and we quote at \$1.10 on the "Creek" and \$1.20 per bbl. delivered here. Foreign in very good average demand, and the offerings made from first hands are about all disposed of. There is, however, an absence of anything like positive strength to the market, and importers cannot find buyers willing to pay any better rates even for small lots. We quote, from Pier and yard and according to brand, as follows: Portland, \$3.50@4.25; Roman, \$3.50@5; Keene, \$8@8.50 for coarse, and \$12@12.50 for fine; Martin's, \$7@7.50 for coarse, and \$11@11.50 for fine; La Forge, Portland, \$4.10@4.25; and Lime of Teil, \$2.85@3.

DORS, SASH AND BLINDS.—The volume of business in this branch of manufacture has been fairish since the spring season set in, but without unusual animation, and just now is comparatively dull. The local consumption amounts to almost nothing, and the distribution is dependent almost exclusively on shipping orders. From a few near-by points these have come in at times to a pretty full extent, and there is a promise that more stock will be wanted during the summer. Exporters buy slowly and cautiously, and only upon positive orders, as the foreign markets, like our own, are consuming moderately, and offer little inducement for forwarding goods freely. Our principal manufacturers, however, seem to feel hopeful that they will obtain a proportionate share of any revival in the demand for building material, and especially as the cost of goods has been figured down this spring to a very low basis.

GLASS.—For French window glass the demand is fair, and some of the trade think it is improving. The market, however, lacks a good, solid, healthy tone, and values rule more or less irregular, dealers regulating the cost according to their own necessities, prompt cash buyers in many instances gaining many favors. About 60 and 20@60 and 25 per cent. may still be quoted. American is moderately active at former rates. English is dull and nominally unchanged.

HARDWARE.—The market does not improve on any description of stock, and we have little of interest to advise. A few small and irregular orders come to hand, but the amounts going out afford no relief, and dealers generally complain of the condition of business. The only change of importance since our last is a reduction on the price of strap and things, the discount now standing at 60 per cent.

LATH.—The consumption is still slow and uncertain on local account, and does not improve much at depend-

ent points, leaving the market in a more or less dull and stupid condition. Even in a time of a good, healthy trade, dealers are not greatly inclined to anticipate their wants at this season, and of course, under the ruling condition of affairs, keep their purchases down closer to actual necessities than ever. Small and half cargoes, therefore, are much in fashion, though even of these only a very few are wanted, and one or two full arrivals extra would be more than the market could bear. Even as it is, the feeling is weak, and though \$1.70 has been obtained on the peddling business done it is a figure above the average bid, and probably higher than would be insisted upon from customers willing to operate with any freedom.

LIME.—The arrivals do not greatly increase, but when receivers get any stock or are notified of any coming they are ready sellers, and evidently do not want to see an accumulation take place. The demand is moderate from all quarters, and no one seems to think there are signs of early increase, the general tone of the market ruling dull and tame. Indeed, there is reason to believe that values are really lower. We have no authority for changing our figures, and all the agents quote nominally as before, yet in several instances there is an assumption of ignorance in regard to the true value of stock, accompanied by an intimation that possibly the "other man" has reduced his prices somewhat. Buyers, too, have adopted the mysterious air, in one or two cases with a laughable display of importance, and as retail sales have been made pretty low, there is little doubt that supplies have been or can be obtained on easier terms. At all events, while no acknowledgment of reduced cost is made, we would advise buyers to gauge their bids somewhat off, or common at least, of both Rockland and North River. We quote: Rockland at 90c. for common and \$1.25 for finishing; North River, 80c. for common, and \$1.25 for finishing.

LUMBER.—The general condition of our wholesale market is much the same as last recorded, all classes of goods selling slowly and in moderate quantities, and the main study of receivers being to prevent too great an accumulation. Occasionally there seems to be a faint indication of reviving demand, but disappointment is almost sure to follow, and this adds to the "blue" feelings of our dealers, most of whom are commencing to predict the necessity for struggling through another dull and unprofitable year. Some of our neighboring cities, and especially Brooklyn, there is reason to believe, will, as the season advances, call for a fair amount of building grades, but not beyond the most positive consumptive wants, as there is a strong and decided antipathy to piling up stocks, even at the ruling comparatively low cost. The wants of this city on building account cannot be calculated upon with any degree of certainty, but the present outlook affords no indication of much stock being wanted, and manufacturing and domestic shipping outlets are virtually contracted to small jobbing distribution. The export demand, too, is extremely flat, and has received further discouragement of late by the failure in some cases, and greatly reduced operations in others, of large houses who were in the habit of sending out a goodly proportion of lumber in exchange for imports. There is no desire to add to our supplies here under the circumstances, and even where dealers require a few special lots for assortments, they will not purchase except at inside figures, as we noted last week in referring to the Albany market. Yet there is danger that more lumber of some kinds will be offered than can readily be handled, and this may tend to still further depress values. Western lumbermen have changed their tune very decidedly since logs commenced running, and are now anxiously looking for customers, the more so that competition among the railroads and low freight charges afford them an opportunity they have not had for years. There is no unanimity of action in the search for a market, but representatives from all points come in to do the best they can, and in some cases are cutting pretty low. Just at present Chicago operators are trying their hand, but have not apparently met with great success, especially where there has been an attempt to undersell our dealers on any desirable outlet. There are, however, a great many buyers who can undoubtedly be secured by Western operators without causing any loss of custom to the Trade here, and who, no doubt, will be glad to handle lumber freely whenever they can get their paper in exchange. Indeed, this is pretty much all that can be given in a great many quarters, and the fact that our dealers have shown a singular want of appreciation for promises to pay will no doubt induce co-operation in the attempt to move lumber direct from points of production into consumers' hands. What the points of production are to realize in return, however, is a question of "time." Probably some of the parties who tried the plan last year could give a faint idea, through their experience, of what might be expected.

Eastern spruce still appears to be pretty well managed, and the market has been kept fairly clear of any great surplus of stock. A portion of the arrivals were specials, and the rands were about balanced by the demand, though buyers were not found waiting for supply, and now and then it required quite a little search to secure an outlet. Values remain about as before, but are not firm, and it is hinted that some schedules for special cuts have been accepted at pretty low rates. Some firm talk occasionally comes from points of production, but manufacturers will find that consumers don't care at all this season. We quote at \$12.50@14.50 7 $\frac{1}{2}$ M for rands, and \$15@16 for specials.

White pine has arrived to a limited extent on orders for a few special assortments, but the additions to the general stock are small and unimportant. The demand does not improve, and the market retains much the same old dull tone, with values nominally unchanged on all grades, though only barely steady. There are said to be one or two fair shipping orders here, but the hold-

ers in no way anxious to fill them at the moment. We quote at \$20 7 $\frac{1}{2}$ M for shippers, 10 inch and upwards; \$17@18 do. for do., 10 and 12 inch; and \$15@16 per box, 8 and 12 inch. Building timber \$25@30.

Yellow pine is without change. Some of the cargoes contracted for on orders a while ago are coming in, and now and then an odd sale can be made either in duplicate of present deliveries or on some new specification, but the demand is by no means active or general, and rands are still decidedly out of favor. Exporters display little interest, but a few agents have made sales on about the basis of our rates for Southern delivery. Yard stocks of yellow pine are fair, and in some cases flooring boards are available quite as low as from vessel. We quote random cargoes at \$18@20 7 $\frac{1}{2}$ M; ordered cargoes, \$21@25 do.; green flooring boards, \$23 do.; and dry do., \$25 do.; step plank, as step plank, at \$24@25 per M. Cargoes at the South, \$14@16 7 $\frac{1}{2}$ M.

Hardwoods remain nominally steady on wholesale lots, but there is no good test to values at the moment, owing to the slow and uncertain movement of supplies. Offerings, however, are comparatively moderate, as care has been taken not to order stock forward too rapidly. We quote: Wholesale value by car load, at about \$75@80 7 $\frac{1}{2}$ M for the finest walnut; \$50@60 do. for common do.; \$35@40 do. for ash; \$38@40 do. for white-wood; \$35@38 for oak, and \$55@65 for cherry; \$55@65 for butternut, and \$35@40 for hickory.

Among the young dealers "nothing new" is about the stereotyped report. Those who talked "blue" before still develop an azure tinge in their conversation, and those who were inclined to take a more cheerful view of the situation make every little point tell in their effort to give the market the best look possible. To secure even an apology for courage, however, evidently requires a large amount of powerful whistling, and business is far from gratifying. Stocks in amount are ample, the assortment good, and if buyers "don't see what they want ask for it," it is pretty sure to be forthcoming. We have had our quotations carefully looked over again, and see no reason for change. While the inside figures are occasionally shaded somewhat, under certain special agreements, they show about as low as stock can be reached on the average, while the outside rates are asked and insisted upon for first-class stock. On the small invoices many buyers make up.

Among the recent lumber charters we note the following: A schr., 321 tons, to an Eastern port, coal, current rate, and from Point Wolfe, N. B., to Cork, for orders to east coast Ireland, deals, 73, 9d.; an Am. brig, 251 tons, same voyage and rate; a schr., 320 M saved lumber, from Brunswick to New York, \$6; one, 250 M do., from a Gulf port to Philadelphia, \$8, or New York, \$9; one, 200 M do., from St. Mary's River to Philadelphia, \$6; one, 250 M do., from St. Mary's River to New York, \$6 25; one, 180 M do., from Jacksonville to New York, \$6.50; one, 336 tons, hence to Fernandina, general cargo, about \$700, and back from King's Ferry, dry boards, \$6.25; one, 232 tons, to Bangor, \$200; one, 175 M lumber, from St. John, N. B., to north side Cuba, \$7 gold; one, 186 tons, from Jacksonville to north side Cuba railroad ties, 40c. United States currency; a schr., 360 M saved lumber, from Brunswick to New York, \$6; one, 180 M do., from Savannah to Washington, D. C., \$6; and a brig, 200 M do., from Cedar Keys to New York, \$9.

Later advices from Rio Janeiro (Jos. M. Wright & Co.) to April 25, report as follows:

Pitch Pine Deals.—A speculative demand arose in the beginning of the month, causing a slight advance in prices, viz.: 34@400@435/000 per dozen, 3x9x14, at which figures the market closes steady. We note sales within these limits of the cargoes: 224 M feet per F. H. Todd, 236 M feet per L. P. Mallory, and 282 M feet per Viking, all from Brunswick. Receipts, 1,197,634 feet.

White Pine Lumber.—Is steady and in demand, sales being made on the spot at 85rs., and of a parcel to arrive at 97rs. Receipts, 152,066 feet.

General Lumber Notes.

—The Bay City Lumberman's Gazette gives its regular weekly review of the situation as follows:

The past week has been unmarked by any events of more than ordinary interest. The weather has been remarkably wet and cold, and the feelings of everybody have been correspondingly dull. The rivers have continued at a stage of water, dissipating any fears which may have been felt regarding the drives, and from all directions comes the report of successful operations. This of course will not apply to logs which had gone on to river flats during the earlier floods, of which the quantity was very large. The summary of the amounts got into the various streams reveals the fact more and more plainly that the Michigan crop is decidedly short of last year's figures; but as we shall soon be able to give the figures of the different streams we refrain from further comment at present. The new stock does not, as far as we can learn, give promise of as rich a yield of upper grades as in years more favorable for logging; but in the depressed demand for the better qualities and more rapid sale of lower grades this will for once prove no detriment. A goodly number of buyers have been in the market, and prices are well sustained at \$5.50 for culms, \$11 for common, and from \$30 to \$35 for uppers. We hear of sales aggregating several millions of feet on private terms, which we would not feel much interest in giving the particulars of, without the prices, etc., as we do not care to give anything which will not be an index to our readers of the actual condition of the market. We give particulars of a few transactions in our market report. The general tone of the market from all directions is a decidedly dull one, owing no doubt largely to bad roads, keeping the consumers from moving the needed supplies. In our wholesale markets, indications point to prices being fully sustained, with a probable advance with the season. We think, from all we can gather from our intercourse with buyers and the tone of our exchanges, that there is a prospect for the consumption of a larger quantity of lumber than last year, whil-

yet the season will not be marked by any material advance, or any general heavy demand in excess of former seasons. More lumber has already changed hands in the Valley than for many years at the same date, and it may be said that the dry stock is exhausted, while probably one hundred millions of the green has already been contracted, or otherwise withdrawn from competitive influence on the market. We have heard it asserted that not more than 250,000,000 more could be said to be open for purchase during the season. The productive capacity of the Saginaw River has been reduced during the past five years, through the burning of the mills and the virtual withdrawal of others, to the extent of from 150 to 200 million feet, there being no less than twenty-seven mills to be classed in this category, against four new ones to take their places. This large producing capacity will, in the main, never enter into the calculation of the mill capacity of the river. It is, therefore well, in speaking of "full stocks" to bear in mind this vast reduction in productive resources and comprehend that a full stock means "for the mills which remain in operation." New logs have been moving on the rivers, and more and more are daily starting up.

The market reports of the *Lumberman's Gazette* are as follows:

BAY CITY, Thursday, May 18, 1876.—With a fair attendance of buyers during the week, the dull, wet weather seems to have militated against many heavy sales, although we hear of several. The green stock is attracting attention at present, the dry being pretty much out of the market, although some small lots may yet be picked up. Mr. Cooley of Buffalo has, since our last report, purchased as follows: Of Assignees of Grant & Saylor estate, 130 M at \$5.50, \$11 and \$32; of N. B. Bradley & Co., 180 M at \$5.50, \$11 and \$30; of Watrous Bros., 190 M at \$5.50, \$11 and \$30; of Pitts & Cranage, 100 M at \$5, \$10 and \$30 (coarse), at At Sable; of Charlton, 300 M at \$5.50, \$10.50 and \$32; also 450 M lath at \$1.50, and 150 M shingles XXX at \$3.10. L. L. Culver has sold to Ohio parties 500 M at \$5.50, \$11 and \$30. Hill Bros. to ——, a cargo (quantity as per capacity of vessel) Chippewa stock; from Malone's mill, at \$6, \$12 and \$32; Cleveland Saw Mill and Lumber Co., of A. Bailey & Co., 2,000,000 feet Rite River logs, delivered at Bay City, at \$11; same of B. Chapman, 600 M Au Gres logs, at \$12. Among the p. t. sales (we are desired to withhold names) we note 1,000,000 feet of lumber to Eastern parties, at full market rates; 500 M. to same parties, same quotations. Several other sales have come to our knowledge of which we are not free to give particulars.

CHICAGO, May 16, 1876.—The lumber docks have been very well filled for two days, but buyers are inclined to hold off in anticipation of heavier receipts, and, if possible, lower prices. On Saturday 3 or 10 cargoes only were offered, and less than half of this amount was sold, and on Monday there were about 35 cargoes in the market, and very little life exhibited, or eagerness to take hold at prevailing prices. There is little anticipation now of a short supply, and buyers are taking hold accordingly. Cargoes could be quoted about as follows, and prices weak:

BUFFALO, May 13, 1876.—Buffalo harbor is emphatically open, and the port full of vessels, but as yet very few of the arrivals are of lumber-laden craft. A week of fair weather has just closed. The demand for cargoes has not been large, yet a fair trade has been done by wholesale dealers. We learn of numerous shipments, and some sales to arrive. Syracuse parties purchased 500 M. about 300 M. of which is to arrive. We hear of sales to Rochester, Utica, and Troy dealers. Prices for cargoes range from \$8, \$13.50, and \$34 to \$9, \$15, and \$36, by Michigan inspection, the latter being for dry, choice stock.

—A correspondent of the *Northwestern Lumberman* writes as follows on the Ottawa lumber trade:

OTTAWA, Ont., May 15, 1875.—"Misfortunes never come singly." The Ottawa lumbermen find this to their very great sorrow. Following up three years of very severe depression in the trade, and at a time when everything looks gloomy for the future, there has come a spring flood, the like of which has never been seen on the Ottawa. The late severe snow storms in March, followed by incessant rains ever since, have so swollen the Ottawa and its tributaries that it is higher at present than it has ever been known to be in the memory of the oldest inhabitant. Thousands of feet of lumber broke loose from the docks and went sailing down the river. On either side, mile after mile of great lumber piles ready for shipping are to be seen half submerged in water, and only kept from floating off by their great height and weight, with the addition of strong hawsers which have been strung out in the more dangerous places to snub them.

There are very few sales being made. Buyers who

come in from the East want to buy on time; the lumbermen, suspicious of everybody, refuse to sell except for cash or on very short dates. The Eastern men are constantly talking Michigan lumber at them, shaking their heads and prophesying ominously that they will be extremely sorry when the Michigan lumber comes in and crowds Ottawa entirely out of the Vermont and New York markets.

The Ottawa men look ruefully at their vast piles of lumber. There is no place to pile, the mills are shut down in consequence of the accumulated stock, and offers of six to seven dollars per M for shipping culs; but they refuse to sell, and "freeze" to the lumber like martyrs.

And now another trouble has come upon them. So much of the lumber has been submerged for several days that a very large percentage of it will blacken when the water subsides, and a residue of fine sand will stick to it that will make it very objectionable to plasters. This, of course, will depreciate it very considerably in value, so that, to use a cockney expression, the Chaudiere men may be said to be "down on their luck."

E. B. Eddy, the far-famed match-maker, appears to be the only man who is utterly reckless of coming events. He has demoralized the market by selling shipping culs at \$7 to \$7.50 per thousand.

The Quion boom (pronounced Quio), an immense chain boom about forty miles from Ottawa, broke last Friday night, and let loose 150,000 saw-logs belonging to different firms. The receipt of the news at this city created the wildest excitement, and an immense gang of men were sent to capture the logs, as it was feared that, if they reached the Chaudiere booms, the latter would burst and allow half a million of logs to escape into the Lower Ottawa. The men succeeded so well on their mission that before Saturday night, with the aid of tugs and driving boats, the logs were driven into different bays on the river and secured; thus a danger of great magnitude was averted.

The mills at Ottawa are still firm, notwithstanding the terrific strain they are undergoing. The underpinning and frame-work of these buildings are master pieces of the mid-wright's art, as few mills in Canada would have stood such a test.

The last quotations for Ottawa lumber are as follows: Stocks from a good run of logs, with the culs out, \$15@16. Shipping culs, \$8.50@9. Freights to Burlington, Whitehall and New York are very cheap, the Yankees having cut our Ottawa forwarders nearly out of the trade, in consequence of the rascally interpretation of the United States authorities of the Washington treaty, by which they prevent Canadian vessels from navigating the New York canals, while Yankee bottoms have free use of the Canadian canals. There is a very general opinion prevalent among Canadians at present, which is anything but complimentary to the honesty or *bona fides* of Uncle Sam in treaty making.

—A correspondent of the *London Timber Trades' Journal* writes from Quebec as follows:

The quotation in a recent issue of the *Timber Trades' Journal* from the circular of the Quebec firm, wherein it was stated that some manufacturers at Ottawa had, during the past year, shipped their deals from Montreal, served as a pretext for the *Chronicle* (printed in the first-named city) to publish an article in which the conduct of those residents who said aught in disparagement of the Fortress City, or enlarged on the merits of the rival port, was denounced with unusual bitterness. The editorial attack elicited a reply from the offending firm (Messrs. Carbray & Routh), who, while repudiating any intention to disparage Quebec further, asserted that Ottawa deals can be shipped at a lower rate from Montreal, and gave figures to justify their statement. The extract copied into your columns is simply a fact borne out by the Customs' returns, and it is, to say the least, presumable that the parties who made the shipments found some advantage in doing so. There is nothing extraordinary in such a circumstance, except that it should provoke any controversy. The foreign reader might note the fact as a sign of the times; but he would hardly infer that Quebec, which has been for so long a period the great emporium of the timber trade of Canada, was on the eve of being displaced by an aspiring rival, and that its old-established mercantile houses could be suddenly jostled aside. Making every allowance for the soreness caused by the rapid rise of Montreal, it is a matter of regret that the guardians of Quebec interests in the press should advocate a policy so unsound as that of hushing up or attempting to make little of the efforts which other localities are putting forth to attract a share of the lumber trade. The course of commerce is not influenced by sentimental preferences. Buyers will patronize the market in which they can obtain the best terms, and Quebec can defy all competitors so long as its merchants can show the foreign trader that he will not advance his interests by dealing elsewhere. It is possible, however, that I do your contemporaneous an injustice, and that his aversion to the spread of such intelligence as has been aul to exist only to its passing through any other channel than his own columns, since quite recently he published a "communicated" article commenting on a fact which, if not due to exceptional circumstances, may vitally affect the future trade of this port. It appears that a Quebec firm has been able during the past winter to send 2,000,000 feet of deals from the mills at Ottawa to England via rail to Portland, and thence by sea, at less cost than the same goods could be forwarded by the St. Lawrence during the summer months. This result is principally attributed to the fact that the harbor and loading charges at the American port are much lighter than they are at Quebec—a statement of the gravest import, and one that should engage the earnest attention of local shippers. It is possible that, owing to the absence of other freight, the Grand Trunk may have been more than usually accommodating as to terms during the past season; still the precedent is an important one, and the advantages that would accrue both to the shipper and the home merchant, through be-

ing able to maintain regular transactions during the entire year, are too manifest to allow it to be supposed that strenuous efforts will not be made to attain so desirable a result. Under any circumstances the experiment furnishes another illustration that the commercial activity of the age will not be restricted by traditional routes; hence the necessity of every business centre that would maintain its position avoiding being lulled into a feeling of false security.

—We have the *London Timber Trades' Journal* to May 13, 1876, from which we obtain the following:

LONDON, May 12, 1876.—The American shippers appear to entertain the idea that a great trade will be done, both at home and abroad, during the present season, and consequently, by the latest advices from New York, the values of pitch pine out there show a marked improvement. Prices, however, on this side do not exhibit a corresponding advance, as the markets are well supplied with both sawn and hewn timber, while the demand is very quiet, even for balks of large average, so that under the circumstances any pressure will cause a decline in the quotations here of any but the very first-class goods. With regard to the Baltic trade, the feeling that prices are to be ever so much lower before the summer season passes is spreading among importers, though what they base their calculations upon it is hard to determine; but as the impression now seems pretty general, there must be some foundation for its origin. It cannot be denied that there is a plethora of stock at the shipping ports, as both from America and the Baltic we understand stocks are not heavy, while as yet the cold, unseasonable weather has kept back the spring shipments to this country, and therefore the demand may be said to be still unsatisfied.

[NOTE.—Exactly where *The Journal* obtained the idea of a "marked improvement" on the values of pitch pine we are at a loss to understand. Our dealers and shippers would be only too well pleased to discover something of the kind, and it would afford us much satisfaction to be called upon to make such a record.

—The *Journal's* Glasgow correspondent writes under date of

MAY 10, 1876.—On Thursday, the 4th inst., at Yorkhill Timber Wharf, a fresh cargo of St. John, N. B., spruce deals, per Anchor Line steamer India, was exposed to public sale by Messrs. Edmiston & Mitchells. The prices realized ranged from £7 to £8 18s. per St. Petersburgh standard. A few lots third quality Quebec pine deals, last year's importation, brought from £8 18s. to £10 6s. per standard. On Tuesday, the 9th inst., the same brokers exposed to public competition a cargo of Tabasco mahogany, ex Olif, and a cargo of Mexican (Minatitlan) mahogany, ex Ayr, the import of Samuel Lett, Esq., Liverpool. About 150,000 pieces in all—or say two-thirds of both cargoes—were sold, prices for the Tabasco wood ranging from 5d. to 1s. 8d., and for the Mexican from 4d. to 9½d. There was a good attendance and fair competition at both the above-mentioned sales.

There has been rather a brisk demand for some time past for Quebec waney boardwood; several parcels of ordinary quality have been cleared out at auction on account of the scarcity of first-class wood. Current rates at Greenock: Quebec waney boardwood—prime quality, 2lin., 2s. 5d. per cubic foot; good ordinary, 18 to 19in., 1s. 10d. to 2s. 1d.; second-class quality, 19½in. average, 1s. 9d. to 1s. 10d. Red pine, ordinary quality, 40ft. average, 1s. 8d. per cubic ft. Good 40 to 50ft. average wood is inquired for, but no stock in hand. Oak—Several parcels have changed hands at from 2s. 6d. to 2s. 9d. per cubic foot; a fair demand expected for good new timber. Birch—A few sales have been made of 14 to 15in. average at from 15½d. to 17d. per cubic foot; large squares in demand.

METALS.—COPPER.—Ingot has sold to some extent, but holders were rather forced to press sales, and prices naturally ruled easy. We quote at about 21@21½c. cash for Lake. Manufactured not very active, but selling a little more freely, and prices firm. We quote: Yellow metal sheathing, 20@21c.; do. bolts, 28@29c.; nail, 21@22c.; braziers' copper, ordinary sizes, over 16oz., per square foot, 32c.; sheathing copper, over 12oz., per square foot, 36c.; bolt copper, 32c.; old copper, 16@20c., as to quality. IRON.—Scotch pig iron has sold with a trifle more freedom, but mostly at easy rates, and the stocks came forward fast enough for all wants. We quote at \$27.50@31.50 as to brand and quality. American pig has sold with greater liberality, and on this fact some of the companies endeavor to advance cost, but buyers are found to withdraw on any intimation of higher figures. We quote: No. 1, \$22@23 per ton; No. 2, \$20@21 per ton; forge, \$18@19 do.; and mottled and white, \$16@18. Rails also sold to a more liberal extent, and for early deliveries manufacturers are firmer, though no positive advance can be quoted over former figures. We quote at \$43@45 per ton for new 56lb iron; steel rails, \$65@66 per ton; street rails, \$47@49 per ton of 50lb and upward, and \$70@75 for steel; old rails at \$22@25 per ton. Scrap iron dull at \$29@31 for No. 1 wrought. Manufactured iron is held for full rates. LEAD.—Foreign is not often called for, and the position remains nominal at 6½@7c. gold. Domestic in better demand, part speculative, and a shade firmer, at 6½@6¾c. gold. The manufacturers of lead steady. Bar, 9c.; pipe, 9½c.; and sheet, 10c., less the usual trade discount. TIN.—Pig again in very good request, and the cost has increased, closing firm. We quote: Straits, 18½@18½c.; English L and F, 17½@17¾c.; English refined, 17½@18c.; and Banca, 22c., all gold. Tin plates in good jobbing demand, and steady at former rates. Spelter still held at 8c. currency, but selling slowly, and now and then shaded somewhat. Zinc

fairly active and steady at 8½@9c. gold in lots from store.

NAILS.—The demand has shown no unusual vitality, and the tendency of buyers is still to confine their orders to immediate and actual wants. In this way, however, a very fair amount of stock changes hands, and the tendency toward a better tone before noted has generally resulted in an advance. The offerings are small and very well under control. We quote: 10d. to 60d., common fence and sheathing, 3d. keg, \$2.85@3.00; 8d. and 9d., common co., 3d. keg, \$3.10@3.25; 6d. and 5d., common do., 3d. keg, \$3.35@3.50; 4d. and 5d., common do., 3d. keg, \$3.60@3.75; 3d. and 4d., light, 3d. keg, \$4.35@4.50; 3d. fine, 3d. keg, \$5.10@5.25; 2d., 3d. keg, \$5.90@5.95. Cut spikes, all sizes, \$3.10@3.25. Floor, casing and box, 75c. above the same sizes of common. Finishing \$1 above, and fine finishing \$1.25 above.

OILS.—From all quarters the demand continues moderate; and the general market is still in a dull and unsatisfactory condition. Prices are difficult to decide upon, and are more or less nominal, but the tendency still favorable to buyers. Linseed, about 54@56c. per gallon; lard, 80@85c. for No. 1, and \$1@1.03 for winter made; olive, \$1.18@1.23; crude cotton seed, 41@43c.; and refined summer yellow do., 50@52c.

PAINTS.—There has been a fair and rather better jobbing business, with the demand of a comparatively general character. Stocks hold out very well, but are not abundant, holders refuse to urge business, and the feeling on prices is about steady. We note recent sales of vermilion at 79½@80c. for American quicksilver; 90c. for China; Persian scarlet at 15½c. for F. W. D.; Venetian red at 1½c. for English, 2c. for crown dry, and 7c. for do. in oil. Indian red at 5c. for R., 6c. for C. Y., and 10½c. for Grace's super; ochre at 1¼@1½c. for French, 4½c. for crown golden washed; 4½c. for Grace's washed, 7½c. for Chinese, all gold, and 1½@1½c. currency for Bermuda single washed. Orange mineral at 11½@11½c. gold for English. Paris green at 2c. in bulk, and 2½c. in cans for strictly pure. Drop black at 10c. for English, and 10c. for crown powdered; China clay at \$18@20 gold, to arrive; whiting at 65c. for common, and 85c. for gilders. Oxide zinc at 8½c. gold for L. Z. O., 9c. for red seal V. M., and 11c. for green seal. White lead at 10½@10½c. gold, and 12@12½c. currency for B. B. ground; the smaller sizes still running scarce; Paris white at \$1.80 gold for crown. Western glue, 10@35c., not many lots above 20c., and patent dryer at 5½c. gold. We quote: Sandpaper (B. ALBANY LUMBER MARKET.

[From the Argus of May 24, 1876.]

The quiet which has reigned throughout the district since our last report is placed to want of stock and a full assortment thereof. Buyers have kept away until we have new receipts, which are still light, but which after this week will be free, and the district will be found to be well stocked and a reasonable activity prevail; indeed, yesterday and to-day several buyers were in the market. Sales are reported of several round parcels to arrive.

It may be regarded as settled that dry lumber will remain firm at present prices, the supply thereof being light at all points. Much, however, of the feature of the market will depend upon the demand; on an accumulation of new sawing prices may fall off somewhat, but only to recover themselves in the fall. That the retail yards are lightly stocked is pretty well assured. This will tend to steady the market until the fall, to be followed by an active trade.

The demand for coarse lumber is fully up to the receipts; stocks are light, and receivers shipping from hand to mouth.

The trade of the district so far this season has been in excess of that of the more recent preceding ones. As evidence thereof, we are told that the wharfage collected from lumber vessels during the month of April was within \$40 of being equal to the amount collected in April and May of the years 1875, 1874, or 1873. The shipments direct to Philadelphia have been more than usually free.

A firmer market is reported at Saginaw in common pine, with sales at a slight advance. The consumption of the lower grades of pine has largely increased throughout the country, while of the upper qualities it has fallen off.

From the Ottawa, where the freshets have carried away much valuable lumber and great damage has been done to piers and docks, no further damage is expected. A lumberman of much experience gives it as his opinion that some of the Chaudiere mills would not resume work until the first of July next, for the reason that it will be unsafe to interfere with the booms, etc., until the water had further subsided.

The receipts at Albany by the Erie and Champlain canals, from the opening of navigation to May 23, were, of boards and scantling, 10,649,400 feet; of shingles, 538 M; of staves, 158,700lb.

The receipts at Oswego for the week were 5,558,000 feet; freights to tide-water, \$2 1/2 M. The receipts at Buffalo for the week were 1,254,000 feet and 37 car-loads; freights to Albany, \$2.70@2 1/2 M for soft wood, and \$3.70@3 1/2 for hard.
