PROFESSIONAL CHARGES AND PROFESSIONAL HONOR.

The tone of a community is said to depend upon the intelligence of the masses, but with equal certainty, we think, it may be averred that the intelligence of the masses depends largely upon the dignity, ability and purity of the learned professions. With all our boasted advantages of free education and the extensive diffusion of information among the people, it is certain that large numbers of our mercantile and manufacturing classes fail to attain the benefits of a liberal and enlightened education, and, in point of fact, are lacking in direct sympathy with it. The limitations and exactions of mercantile, manufacturing and mechanical callings seem to preclude the indulgence or gratification of any aspirations for a broad and comprehensive culture outside of the techniques of the particular sphere in which the individual's activity may be exercised. The system of subdivision into specialties, which seems to be so rapidly extending in all callings, favors this exclusion of breadth and substance in education, and the intellectual life of the most active workers in the community is gradually drifting into narrower and narrower grooves. To the great professions, such as law, medicine, divinity, journalism, architecture and kindred degrees, is conceded the privilege of enjoying a really wide horizon of intellectual view. The high discipline and broad culture belonging to the learned professions so exclusively are active forces for good or evil; for the highest good if devoted to noble purposes, but terribly productive of evil if superior knowledge and enlightenment are used to hamper the interests and antagonize the welfare of the dependent and comparatively ignorant classes.

It is a deplorable and unwelcome reflection that the learned professions failed to escape the malign and demoralizing influences of the recent period of inflation and extravagance, which worked such tremendous havoc in the lower spheres of finance and trade. There are not lacking in this community instances of financial madness on the part of clerics who have called their flocks to the assumption of staggering debts, which have, in the end, crushed and well nigh annihilated many a prominent city congregation. There are few heads of families in the middle or upper walks of life but know the terror of the fashionable physician and the magnitude of his annual bills. Architects, journalists and kindred professions have had their peculiar indulgences in fanciful and exorbitant charges. But, in the largest degree, we believe the questionable distinction belongs to the legal profession of having partaken of the fullest fruits of the prolonged era of expanded and speculative

values and charges. The public has been made familiar of late with some of the vagaries of professional charges in the attempted collection, by suits at law, of bills for single services representing the fabulous amounts of \$60,000, \$75,000 and \$100,000. It has been facetiously said of one profession that its diplomas are, in too many cases, merely legal licenses to kill. In the light of recent developments, it would seem warrantable to conclude of another that its diplomas are construed as legal licenses to rob.

The interests of real estate dealers and operators are intimately and vitally concerned in the proper administration of the legal profession. Scarcely a step can be taken, certainly no large or important contract can be entered into or consummated, without the assistance or advice of competent legal counsel. It is of signal importance to dealers to know that their interests when once confided to counsel will be intelligently and faithfully dealt with, and of no less importance that the charges for such services will be fair, reasonable and even moderate. It is provocative of serious apprehension and painful comment that the divergence and deflection of the legal profession from its primitive and well recognized standards of practice have been principally in the direction of a discreditable cupidity and a sordid and reckless overreaching after gain. There are no present indications of a lack of professional culture or a diminution of the intellectual status of the profession. On the contrary, efforts have been constantly made during the past few years to elevate the standard of requirements for admission to the bar. In cases that have come under our observation, the older and more respected members of the profession are the more readily contented with moderate fees, while it is the juniors and subordinates that have engaged persistently and heartily in the race for extravagant fees. But still, so largely and generally has this propensity for extravagant charges been indulged that the whole profession may be said to have been inoculated with the virus of a fatal poison. Counsel too frequently come to regard their clients as victims rather than as wards, and their estates as fit subjects for depletion—very much as the old style physician would regard the circulation of a fever-stricken patient.

With counsel fees in general we have little to do, and care to have less to say, inasmuch as these are private individual concerns, interesting principally to the counsel and his client. In the interest of real estate dealers at large, we do feel called upon to criticize fully and frequently the subjects of professional charges in real estate transactions. These belong to our special province and affect not two individuals alone, but the hundreds and thousands who are accustomed yearly to embark in real estate ventures. It is to the prominent and influential members of the profession that we would address our expostulation and complaint. That the profession at large has unconsciously descended from the high plane upon which it was accustomed to stand, and has tacitly discredited those noble maxims of professional duty set up by Blackstone and Kent, will be freely and sadly admitted by older mem-

bers. All this might be accounted for as a legitimate product of the times in which our lot is cast, and ultimate recovery might be expected and confidently predicted. But there is a respect in which this evil example may have a lasting effect and perpetuate itself through still another generation. In every office in this city a generation of young men has been trained under the influence of erroneous and extravagant ideas, and under the still more pernicious influence of the predominant spirit of greed. The rule of conduct impressed upon their minds has been that compensation outranks honor and distinction, and to whatever extent these false conceptions have been adopted, so far has the next generation of the legal profession been contaminated and compromised. For the professional success and welfare of these rising young men—the counsellors of the future—it is desirable that a new code of practice should be immediately instituted, or that the old standard of honor before compensation should be restored. We know that the customary arguments advanced in favor of high charges, increase in the cost of living, demands of clients for more sumptuous and luxurious legal headquarters, and more exacting and devoted services in great speculative transactions, have all seemed to justify the expansion of fees; but the excuse and the provocation have both subsided, and the profession will consult its own dignity, honor and usefulness by readapting its scale of charges to the present altered circumstances of the people. As a proof that the rule of high charges is not being perpetuated or persisted in, we cheerfully give our testimony that in many of the leading offices in this city the fees exacted for examination of real estate titles and preparation of papers connected with real estate have been made of late perfectly satisfactory to clients who frequent those offices. In fact if we were called upon to give the information we should be compelled to say that the most careful examinations, together with the most moderate charges are to be found in the office of a firm whose chief is also a high officer of the Federal Government. We are well aware that in saying as much as this we run the risk of incurring the displeasure of the estimable and modest gentleman who presides over the real estate department of that office. It is eminently more than creditable to a profession when great learning and reputation go hand in hand with great forbearance in the matter of charges. This is no more than the ancient rule and practice, and one that however seriously departed from must again assert itself and become predominant in the most reputable and influential offices. The honor and good name of the profession are deeply concerned in this matter of the proper adjustment of legal charges. We shall fail in our estimate of its *amour propre* if there is any lack of effort on the part of leading and conservative counsel to regain the vantage ground already lost and to recall more youthful and inexperienced members back to those ancient and revered practices and rules of action which have so largely moulded and governed the professional careers of men now gray with age and covered with honors.

WALL STREET.

We have no expectation of being able to say anything new or instructive upon this well worn subject. A few reflections occur to us, however, which may fittingly appear in THE RECORD, without any charge of wandering from our chosen field. We are led to remark that the ideas, influences, and activities which are comprised in this term are immeasurably different from what they were twenty-five years ago. Then a small number of select members comprised the Stock Exchange, whose passports were good faith and a high sense of honor, and the ordeal of candidates for membership was a severe test of character. Then the slightest breath of trickery, or disreputable practice, was sufficient to blast a brokers' standing, and the whole organization was held up as a model of correct business deportment and fair dealing to the rest of the community. Its *enfantes terrible* numbered no more than two men, and they were Jacob Little and Nelson Robinson, giants of speculation in their day, whose schemes and operations, although grand enough for that period, would now be regarded as not above the average of moderate ventures.

This wide disparity of ideas measures the growth of the passion for stock gambling in this country. The Exchange now numbers a host of members of uncertain standing, and of limited acquaintance with each other. The business has developed itself into the character of the best organized, the most respectable, and the most alluring form of ventures at chance. It is representative of the modern method of transacting business or rather it has infused its spirit and practice throughout all business circles. Large risks, widely disproportionate to the capital employed—bold ventures, daring intrigue, intense absorption and rapid combinations and results. All the celerity which steam and electricity have conferred in quickening communications of thought and presence seems exemplified in the rapid interchange of the vast dealings on the Exchange. So predominate and overshadowing have become its influences in the city—and we might say in the country at large—that every extensive business has become assimilated in a greater or less degree to its methods and practices. The Bourses of Europe furnished, no doubt, the original patterns for our Exchange, but, in a truly American fashion, the pupil has outstripped the preceptor, and Wall street and the Exchange have become daily factors in European dealings. The prolonged and continued use of irredeemable paper money has familiarized the minds of our people with daily and hourly fluctuations, and the necessity laid upon all merchants of watching the gold indicator, has compelled them, unconsciously and almost irresistibly, to become participants in the movements of Wall street. At one time all business, however conservative or solid, partook largely of the gambling element. The demoralizing effect of this condition upon the minds of the whole business community will probably not cease to act until long after the premium on gold has been obliterated. The stock list and the money article have assumed a prominence in our affairs which was never known before, and many a merchant who would have avoided a broker's office as he would the house of Pat Hearn, finds occasional ventures at stock gambling necessary to the elasticity of his mind and the possible recuperation of his pocket-book. Many have gone into these stock ventures to cover up an unavoidable business loss, such as a bad debt or depreciation of goods. Many have sought thus to provide the means of superfluous luxury and display. The whole tone and morals of our local community have become contaminated with the atmosphere of the Stock Exchange. Among the brokers themselves a show of honor and correct dealing is maintained as a qualifica-

tion for Exchange membership, but it is more than suspected that their dealings with the public diverge widely from the correct line. Investigations but recently instituted were calculated to divulge peculiar practices of stock brokers. In fact, the occasional outside operator is left wholly at the mercy of his broker, who encounters a formidable temptation to "cook" the accounts to suit his own interests instead of those of his customer. It is idle to inveigh against these practices. Where men are disposed to be dishonest, and have no monitor but their own conscience, it is difficult to impose reliable safeguards. Repressive measures of legislation will scarcely succeed in curing the mania for stock-gambling. The losses of the last few years have done much to reduce its intensity and fascination. The deplorable feature about it is, the attraction it holds out to persons of moderate means, and to persons acting in a fiduciary capacity. Every defalcation of individuals and corporators that has taken place within the past ten years is more or less closely identified and associated with dealings on the Exchange. Experience and reflection suggest that outside of the chief operators who have the power to regulate the market to suit themselves, a large share of the patronage is derived from a class of people who use money in these transactions that is not their own, hoping for profit and concealment. After the full chapter of these losses and their resultant defalcations has been finally written the proper reaction from this gambling mania will no doubt set in, and our merchants and their clerks will dread to incur the stigma and odium of any association with Wall street or its processes. The reach of its influence is by no means confined to this city, although sufficiently active and patent here. The telegraph brings distant cities and villages in close contact with the brokers office, and there is little doubt but that many an unlucky venture has darkened the career of business men living at a distance, and thrown deep shadows over what were once comfortable and happy homes. The reaction which is now in progress will not be complete until Wall street is relegated to its normal and legitimate functions, and the gambling spirit which it has done so much to propagate and foster has been entirely extirpated from the minds of American business men.

A recent episode proves that the spirit of reform is not dormant, even within the walls of the Stock Exchange and among its members. Mr. Hartshorne does well to assert his independence of and contempt for modern operators and their methods, even though his speech be bitter and his action energetic. No worthier representative of the *ancien régime* survives, of its purity, rectitude and spotless honor in business transactions than this same gentleman, Jimmy Hartshorne, as we well remember him, a mere lad, twenty-five years ago, perched on a high stool at the desk in Genin & Lockwood's old office, in Hanover street, cyphering out calculations in stocks, which would have puzzled older heads. His path to eminence and wealth has been the old and beaten one—not the devious and sinuous windings of modern practice. It is full of good omen for the future of the Stock Exchange when its best members fearlessly criticise and condemn the crookedness of modern speculation.

MARKET REVIEW.

REAL ESTATE MARKET.

The sales other than judicial, made at the Exchange Salesroom were as follows: A. H. Muller & Son disposed of the two-story brick buildings and stable, with two lots each 25x75, situated on the southwest corner of East and Delancy streets, for \$17,000. and Scott & Myers offered several lots on St. Nicholas avenue, Tenth avenue and One Hundred and Fifty-

seventh street, for which the best bid received was \$32,500. The noteworthy transactions under foreclosure proceedings included a sale of the five-story brick store, known as No. 233 Broadway, for \$45,700, the liens on which amounted to about \$96,000, and a sale of four four-story brick dwellings, with four lots on Seventy-seventh street, between First and Second avenue, for the sum of \$18,000, the liens affecting the property amounting to \$5,725. The four-story store, with lot 23.5x78, on the southwest corner of Fourth and Twenty-ninth street, the mortgage foreclosed on which was a second mortgage amounting to \$3,600, and all liens thereon reaching about \$29,000, was sold to Samuel Adams, for \$27,571.

An important private sale has been negotiated by R. V. Harnett for the account of August Belmont, who has disposed of thirty lots on Eighth avenue, Seventy-second and Seventy-third streets, for \$280,000 cash. We are informed that these lots have been purchased with a view of making first-class improvements thereon, upon the completion of the Rapid Transit road to Eighty-first street.

The published list of foreclosure sales for the coming week is somewhat lighter than usual. The vacant block bounded by Third avenue, Fourth avenue, Ninety-eighth and Ninety-ninth streets, the mortgages on which amount to \$120,000, will be sold on Monday next, and on Tuesday Mr. Harnett will offer for sale, under a decree of foreclosure of a mortgage amounting to about \$11,200, eight vacant lots on Seventy-first street between Avenue A and B.

Some of the plans filed with the Superintendent of Buildings embrace buildings of an important character. On Fifty-seventh street near Ninth avenue, five five-story brown stone flats will be constructed at an estimated cost of \$50,000 each. Five four-story brown stone tenements will be constructed on the Southeast corner of Lexington avenue and Eighty-fifth street, and on Seventy-ninth street between Second and Third avenues, four four-story brown stone houses, and at No. 29 Greene street, one four-story iron store will be erected.

The Down Town Club purpose making extensive alterations at Nos. 50 and 52 Pine street, at an estimated cost of \$20,000.

BUILDING MATERIAL MARKET.

BRICK.—Common hards continue in very good demand, but have scarcely been so active as last week, the storm probably interfering with the movement to some extent. On prices we make some slight additions to former figures, and at the revision the tone is firm, though without special buoyancy, and a

full bid generally finds sellers ready to meet it. No particularly new features are developed that we can discover since our last. There is still some talk about a possible scarcity, and supplies have not come to hand in sufficient quantity to cause a surplus, yet pretty much all wants are for the present satisfied, and buyers fail to give evidence of alarm, or a desire to take hold with freedom, in anticipation of the future. The push to get work under cover has in a measure subsided, and consumption has a tendency to contract somewhat for a while, as there is not much new starting to afford an outlet in the ordinary run of building operations, though the railroads will probably afford dealers an opportunity to dispose of fair amounts of stock for some time to come. The weather is now a factor of some importance, and should we have a protracted cold spell, the position of sellers will be somewhat strengthened. On Pale brick there is a very fair market, at somewhat firmer rates, and really good stock is worth about \$3 7/8 M, with a rather quicker sale. Fronts are moderately active and ruling about steady, with no very large amount of stock offering.

We quote Pale, \$3 M, \$2.50@3:00; Hards, Up-rivers, \$4.25@5:00; Haverstraw bay, \$4.75@5:50; favorite brands, \$5.75@6:00; Fronts, Croton—brown, \$7; dark \$8; red, \$9; Philadelphia, \$23@27; Baltimore, \$34@36.00. Yard prices, delivery included, \$2@3 higher on ordinary and \$5@6 on fronts.

GLASS.—Upon no outlet has the demand assumed such proportions as to infuse a really active or encouraging tone to business, and the market is still dull. Importers in the majority of cases continue to make quite a surface show of confidence, and asking and quoting rates are on a basis of full former figures, but the desire to sell is in reality exceeding the demand, and the opportunity to secure a good customer is not often allowed to pass, if moderate concessions alone stand in the way of successful negotiation. Domestic is reported from dull to active by various dealers, and this irregularity probably gives a fair idea of the market. The activity, however, in many cases, is found to be merely a temporary run of small orders, and the tending of the average business is to take somewhat smaller proportions during the next few weeks. Supplies and assortments are fair as compared with the present demand.

HARDWARE.—Some demand is shown for holiday goods, both on interior and local accounts, but for the ordinary run of stock there is a quiet market all around, and not many features of decided interest. As the revision of price lists progresses manufacturers and dealers discover some very narrow margins over the current cost of production, but competition is close, and the temptation to cut under, should too high a range be decided upon so great, that the probabilities are against any material advance. There is, however, a continued strong effort being made to overcome the irregularities so long existing on certain leading lines of builders' hardware and if possible bring prices into some sort of shape through which a margin for profit can be secured by the manufacturer. Present stocks are moderate and not likely to be much increased until after inventories are taken.

LATH.—Sellers have not gained much advantage since our last, and scarcely realized the full expectations entertained. Some demand prevailed, but dealers managed to check any show of anxiety, and generally refused to bid above last week's figures, especially as they found a supply available about equal to the calls made. Receivers still refuse to admit adverse influences of more than a temporary character, but we hear an occasional grumble over the weather, which has remained so open as to admit of shipments from many points which were calculated upon to be by this time shut off. The local call, too, has been overestimated, or rather the anxiety of buyers does not take the form expected, and the relief obtained from other dependent points has alone prevented an uncomfortable accumulation in first hands. As we close, the rate current appears to be somewhat uncertain, but \$1.65 evidently extremes, and rumors of sales at lower figures.

LIME.—A uniform tone continues, with the feeling a little steadier naturally, though up to the present writing we hear of no quotable change on prices. Arrivals have been fairish, and about all found a place as they came to hand, buyers at this season being less inclined to hold off when desirable stock was available. Shipments of State lime are now over from the kilns, and the offerings come from such accumulations as have been made.

LUMBER.—The market continues to show a pretty steady tone all around, and the selling interest may reasonably expect to retain the bulk of advantage for the next four or five months. While there is no actual scarcity of any description of goods that we can learn of, the accumulations are by no means large and the holders who control them will in all probability be enabled to carry with ease even on a show trade, and should the winter distribution happen by good luck to exceed present expectations the chances are decidedly favorable for a healthier condition of affairs. We notice that most of our exchanges and especially those from the primary markets write in a cheerful vein over the close of business for the year though in some cases fears are expressed that the lumbermen may through this be stimulated into getting out too many logs, and thus in a measure neutralize the effect of the year's operations which seem to have nearly adjusted supply and demand. We are told that among the Canadian lumbermen preparations have been made to cut liberally for the English mar-

ket on the impression that supplies from the Baltic will run short. Our local consumption is about as usual, slow, cautious, and moderate with the old tendency to handle a class of supplies requiring the smallest outlay of dollars. On foreign account the movement is fair, the West India orders proving the most regular and certain, though considerable stuff is understood to be wanted for South America, and some orders for the East India market and Europe, the latter special selections.

Eastern Spruce does not appear to have changed greatly from the position last noted. The demand is a little irregular and receivers cannot always strike a customer in just the proper mood to handle offerings quickly, but patience and careful management generally succeed in placing desirable cargoes to good advantage and values may be considered as holding their own very well, so far as business goes. Arrivals are moderate and reports speak of but few cargoes en route. We hear of a few specials taken this week favorable answers having been received in response to telegrams asking if sawing could be done. We quote at \$12.00@13.00 for random, possibly \$13.50@14 for choice lengths in small cargo, and \$13.50@15.50 for specials, the extreme for extra difficult.

White Pine remains steady and on the stocks here holders are not disposed to negotiate unless buyers are willing to accept a basis of full valuations. This does not merge into an attempt to force an advance, but is simply the natural result of the season which tends to inspire confidence among sellers. We do not hear many good words said for the local demand beyond a fairish sort of business on small orders, but faith in the shipping call is strong and bonded stocks are considered good property. Just at the moment the export call is a little slack, however, and no very important sales have of late been made. We quote at \$15.00@17.00 per M for West India shipping boards; \$19.50@20.50 for South American do.; \$15.00@16.00 for box boards; \$17.00 for do., wide and sound; and timber at \$16.00@18.00 per M.

Yellow Pine is not very plenty in first hands, indeed we hear of no accumulation here seeking a market and there is not much expected to arrive in the way of random cargoes. This affords base for a continuation of steady values, and most sellers look for full former rates. Some estimates are being made on specifications of stuff wanted here in time for spring work. Export orders are a little irregular but dealers retain faith in the call from this side of the ocean. We hear, however, an occasional expression of doubt over the European prospect. From local sources at the close calls for dry flooring boards are making at full figures. We quote random cargoes at \$18.50@22 per M; ordered cargoes, \$22@24 do.; green flooring boards, \$21@23 do.; and dry do. do., \$23@24. Cargoes at the South, \$14@16.50 per M; hewn timber \$7.50@14.

Hardwoods are without change so far as reported. Not much if any stock comes here seeking a market in a wholesale way and manufacturers are making rather light engagements for through shipment, but really desirable supplies are moderate and sellers at no point are inclined to make any shading. We quote at wholesale rates by car load about as follows: walnut, \$7.50@9.50 per M; ash, \$33@36 do.; oak, \$35@40 do.; maple, \$30@35; chestnut, 1st and 2d, \$30@35; do. do., culms, 18@20 do.; cherry, 43@75 do.; white wood, 1/2 and 5/8 inch, \$25@27.50 and do. inch, \$33@35 do.; hickory, \$25@30 do. for Western, and \$40@50 for good near-by stock.

Yard business appears to be very good, all things considered. No dealer is so busy but what he could attend to a considerable increase of custom without difficulty, but numerous small sales and some deliveries on contract keep considerable stock moving when weather permits, and as the cash system is largely insisted upon, there is a fairly healthy undertone. Prices are without radical change but tend to firmness all around.

Lumber from Fernandina, \$6.25; a Schr., 250 M. Lumber, from Jacksonville to the Sound, \$7.00; a Schr., 200 M. Lumber, from Jacksonville to New York, \$7; a Schr., 200 M. Lumber, from Jacksonville to Philadelphia, \$6.75; two Schrs., from James River to New York, Pine Wood, \$3.25; a Schr., 260 tons, from the Mexico Gulf coast to New York, Mahogany, private rate.

GENERAL LUMBER NOTES.

The *Lumberman's Gazette* has the following:

BAY CITY, Friday, Nov. 30, 1877.

The present week about closes the manufacture of lumber on this river for the season of 1877, and generally speaking, most of the mill men are in a satisfactory state of mind, not so much on account of the season having been a profitable one, for it has not been very much so, but that present prospects indicate that stocks on hand will command fairly remunerative figures if sold during the winter or upon the opening of navigation. There have been some few sales made of lumber which will be held over, and rates are stiff at quotations. The amount on docks which has been sold is considerable, and in our next issue we shall probably be able to give the figures of the same.

There are a few mills running yet, but the cold change in the weather will probably cause them to shut down in a few days.

Reports from the logging camps in this part of the State are unfavorable as far as lumbering operations are concerned. The roads are in a terrible condition and work is much impeded thereby.

The shipments for the past week have been a little over 6,000,000 feet from the whole river, and a few more cargoes to go on barges now loading will finish the year's business.

The *Gazette's* Chicago correspondent of November 30 writes: The extraordinary and unprecedented stormy and rainy weather has continued and retarded the movements of stock to such a degree that cargo prices have been unsteady, and possibly in some cases shaded a little, but all, on account of the impassable condition of the streets and the impossibility of handling stock as rapidly as the exigencies of the case require. Probably the oldest inhabitant of the West does not remember a time when the roads throughout the whole country were in that almost impossible condition so early in the fall as they are now. A complete embargo on commerce is the result, and few lines of trade suffer by this state of things as lumber does, for it is bulky and heavy, and as the roads are now, it is simply impossible to handle it.

The corn crop of the whole West is still in the field, with every indication of its remaining there all winter, until the ground is frozen hard enough to bear up a team. This fact alone has retarded the lumber trade very much, for farmers usually, as they haul their corn to market in the fall, load back with lumber, and the money they would get for their corn—could they get it to market—would enable them to pay their debts and lay in their winter supplies, a part of which is always lumber. Still, notwithstanding all these drawbacks and hindrances, lumber is yet good property, and if any weakening has been experienced it is on account of the impossibility to handle and manipulate, as the season and the bareness of the market requires.

The scarcity of private and public dock room in this city has added to the perplexities of the case, until it is to be hoped that another season will see this remedied.

The *Gazette* has the following: The season thus far, on account of the mild weather rendering the roads so soft, has been most unfavorable to a very vigorous prosecution of logging in this part of the State. In some camps, operations have been wholly suspended, and at others the men have been employed in running out logs of last season's cut. The weather for the past few days has turned cold, but it will take severely cold weather for some time to freeze up the roads and the water in the woods in order to enable logging to be done to advantage. Below will be found reports from various other lumbering sections.

The Grand Rapids *Eagle* of Nov. 29 says: Some of the lumbermen and the press of the State have feared that because of the present favorable prospects of the lumber trade, there would be an undue activity in putting in logs this winter, and that the present encouraging tendency would be overcome by a continued glut of the market by over-production. If there were any danger of this, the weather thus far seems likely to prevent it. But little snow has fallen yet, and loggers cannot do much without plenty of good sleighing. Old residents are of the opinion that the coming winter will be an open one, and that we shall not have as much snow or as many weeks of sleighing as we had last year. Lumbermen are not discouraged at all yet, but they do not expect many contractors to put in a larger stock of logs than they have contracted to.

A prominent lumberman of this city, a gentleman fully conversant with lumber interests, asserts that the press reports of the prospective cut of logs this winter have been greatly exaggerated. He asserts that not over 300,000,000 feet of logs have been contracted to be cut on the Muskegon river and its tributaries this season, or rather less than the average cut of the past four years. Press reports have placed the totals at 400,000,000 feet, or thirty-three per cent. more. He is confident that a similar exaggeration has occurred in the reports of other sections of the State.

With a favorable winter, logging operations on the

Menominee river will exceed those of last winter. All of the companies will put in as many logs as they did last winter, and some of them more. The large amount of pine timber land burned over this season will also serve to increase the supply, it being necessary to cut over all of it which the owners desire to save. With what is left over from this season, the amount available for next season, with a favorable winter, will not fall short of 170,000,000 feet.—*Herald*.

The Mississippi River Logging Company do not expect to handle more than half as many logs this winter as last. They handled 150,000,000 last winter, and a large portion of them are lying in the streams yet. On the Chippewa waters, W. T. Price will cut over 20,000,000, but will put in some in Clark county. From all the facts gathered, the log cut this winter is estimated at not over two-thirds as great as it was last winter, when it was 250,000,000 feet.

Big Rapids lumbermen are expecting to secure a large number of logs during the coming winter, and many of them have an unusual number of men at work in the lumber camps.

On the Peshtigo river the Peshtigo Company will get in their usual stock, and it is probable that jobbers and outside lumbermen will operate considerably more extensively than last winter. The cut will be considerably larger than last winter.

On the Oconto river the cut will probably be somewhat smaller, two of the companies calculating to reduce their cut somewhat. North of there the cut will be about the same as last winter, except on the Ontonagon river, at which place it will probably be larger.

OILS.—There is about the usual demand for the various leading styles, and the market is as active as can be expected for the season. Prices show occasional signs of irregularity on the wholesale market, but the cost from jobber's hands does not greatly vary. We quote: Linseed about 60@61c per gallon; lard, 65@67c for No. 1, and 55@58c for No. 2; crude cottonseed, 48@51c, and refined summer yellow do, 55@56c.

PAINTS.—Demand does not show much animation, from any source, and buyers as a rule are in an indifferent mood, beyond such parcels as may be required for immediate necessities. This, however, is but natural for the season, and holders express no great disappointment. The assortments on hand contain about all the regular styles, but are not large in quantity and few additions are intended for the present, as there is little probability of a revival of business until the spring trade commences to set in. Values remain about as before, and, being already figured down to a very low margin, buyers are not likely to gain many advantages. There appears to be a very good general trade doing in glues, but enough stock offering to meet the demand and sellers accepting former rates.

PITCH.—About the same general features are current. The inquiry varies occasionally from a fair

volume into a pretty dull tone; but taken altogether the amount of stock disposed of is equal to the average, and a steady tone is preserved on values. We quote at \$2.12½@2.37½ for city, delivered.

SPIRITS TURPENTINE.—Business has been moderately active, and confined in the main to small trade orders, and values were a little weak. At the close, the feeling was somewhat unsettled, with quotations standing at 33½@35½ as to quantity of stock handled.

TAR.—The market remains about steady, and sellers have slightly the best of the position. The advantage, however, is not sufficient to admit of any addition to values of a decided character, especially as the demand is cautious and buyers are easily frightened by the advance is talked of. We quote at \$2.12½@2.30 for Newberne and Washington, and \$2.37½@2.75 for Wilmington.

an end in a day or two, unless it be to forward some timber lots that may find a purchaser, leaving the stock of pine lumber to be wintered over in the district much smaller than was generally anticipated. Quotations are unchanged but firm.

Coarse lumber is unchanged in price, and has been freely shipped. The stock of hemlock to be carried over will be very light; of spruce there will be an ample stock.

The excess in the receipts of lumber by canal over those of 1876 will not reach the figure we spoke of early in October, viz., 50,000,000 feet; but the excess will be over 40,000,000 feet. How far this excess has been compensated for in the decreased movements eastward by rail, in consequence of the low freights by canal, we have not any means of ascertaining.

Advices from the Ottawa country are to the effect that the cut of logs this winter will be light.

The movement of loggers in Michigan is much interfered with by warm weather and high water, so much so as to put a stop to the usual mode of transit in the woods, adding to delay and increased cost in cutting.

The receipts of lumber at Oswego during the week were 2,269,000 feet against 1,600,000 feet for the corresponding week last year.

The receipts at Buffalo for the week were 1,456,500 feet by lake and 54 car loads by Lake Shore Railroad; against — feet by lake, and by rail 58 cars for the corresponding week last year.

At Chicago the receipts from January 1st to date are 1,016,500,000 feet, against 1,004,900,000 feet for a corresponding period in 1876. The shipments, 546,413,000 feet against 415,734,000 feet.

The shipments of lumber from the Saginaw valley to Nov. 30 were 547,738,000 feet, against 456,487,000 feet in 1876.
