FOURTH AVENUE. Fourth avenue enjoys the distinction, among

our leading avenues, of being the one that begins nowhere and ends nowhere. It gains its first importance as a spur of the Bowery, whence it derives no small share of the business element. But this favorable inception is quickly undone when the avenue becomes lost or swallowed up in the great retail mart of Union square. Here its mergence with the square is complete, and Fourth avenue is quite obliterated amid the confluence of different streets and avenues, until it re-appears again at the upper end of the square as Union place—a title bestowed upon it many years ago with a view of inducing fashionable residence occupation. In its new departure it is distinguished as the locality of the only Italian villas ever projected in continuous rows in this city, one of which has already fallen victim to the disuse and disfavor of this class of residence. At the corner of Eighteenth street one of these ancient landmarks has been recently thrown down preparatory to the erection of a fine specimen of the apartment system, the two types being representative of the earlier and later thought of New York. This section of the avenue also calls to mind the favor with which it was once regarded as the site of elegant and wealthy churches, no less than four principal church buildings being discernible within the range of a few blocks, to wit-the Unitarian Church of the Messiah, the Methodist Church of Saint Paul, the Episcopal Calvary Church, and Dr. Crosby's Presbyterian Church; and, to complete its religious tone and character, we have the imposing building of the Young Men's Christian Association, at the corner of Twenty-third street, and, on the opposite corner, in lonely isolation of construction, Art, the accepted handmaid of religion, has reared her peculiar temple. Above Twenty-third street the avenue loses its artistic and religious character uuder the malign influence of what was once the greatest railroad depot of the city. The strange infatuation which leads men to expect great results, in a business way, from proximity to a large depot should have received its quietus from the developments surrounding Twenty-sixth street. The smallest class of shops, inferior hotels, cheap restaurants and low drinking saloons are the principal characteristics of this location. and have stamped an indelible stigma upon the neighborhood, although here is cropping out a generous and public-spirited movement to improve the avenue in this quarter. The old building at the corner of Twenty-fifth street, once used as Turnure's livery stable, has been remodeled with excellent taste; the lower stories being used as an auction room, the upper stories as artists' studios. At the corner of Twenty sixth street

Mr. Ottendorfer is about completing a true model of the apartment system and one likely to become an architectural adornment to the neighborhood. The ultimate destiny of the Hippodrome block will go far to define and settle the character of this portion of Fourth avenue. At Thirty-second street in the face of the munificent liberality of Mr. Stewart displayed in the erection of a massive and sumptuous hotel, the true and lasting character of this avenue as the great railroad thoroughfare begins to define itself. At Thirty-third street the career of Fourth avenue is rudely and abruptly broken up by the high bluff over whose crown runs Thirty-fourth street, and under whose brow begins the famous piercing of the great Harlem tunnel, the wonder New York in the childhood of men who are now of middle age. At Thirty-fourth street the avenue takes on an entirely new and distinct character. The ideal of a choice residence location is for the first time realized, and from that point until its continuity is hopelessly lost and broken by the Grand Central Depot there is presented as striking and unique a development of the fashionable residence quarter as the city of New York can boast of, in continuous rows of costly mansions, unmarred by any eyesore, nuisance or invasion. Until quite a late period this portion of the avenue was destitute of attractions. The uncertainty as to whether the horse railroad would be run upon the surface or buried in the tunnel deterred builders from erecting private houses in any great number. When this problem finally was solved and the upper surface of the avenue was guaranteed against such intrusion, the happy thought of constructing a series of inclosed parks above the tunnel seemed to furnish the necessary magnet for drawing the wealth and fashion of New York to this quarter, and, eventually, conferred upon this avenue of vicissitudes its new, distinctive, and exceedingly popular name of Park ave-

Park avenue might have remained through time the modest peer of Lexington and perhaps the inferior of Madison avenue but for the fortunate circumstance that a few prominent millionaires, like James Brown and Jonathan Sturges, were so dilatory in vacating their down town residences that all the choice spots on Murray Hill were taken up before they began to prospect about for new residence sites. As recently as seven years ago these great magnates of fashion and commerce, being driven from their former homes on University place and Fourteenth street, by the invasion of trade, located the sites on Park avenue which are now adorned with their massive and elegant mansions. Such eminent examples could not fail to have a beneficial effect upon the further improvement of the avenue, and a fine field was here afforded for the indulgence of modern taste in dwellings on the part of belated To-day, Park avenue, and wealthy families. solidly built up, with the exception of the corner of Thirty-ninth street, presents a succession of imposing private dwellings and numbers among its residents exponents of the greatest wealth and the most elile respectability. The representative mansions are those of Jonathan Sturges and Commodore Garrison at Thirty-sixth street; of James

Brown and William Libby at Thirty-seventh; of A. H. Barney and C. P. Huntington at Thirtyeighth street; and Willis James at Thirty-ninth street. The residences of these gentlemen are of the most luxurious, elaborate and costly description. Mr. Huntington, the President of the Pacific road, has recently purchased two houses of full width and connected them together by openings in the partywall somewhat after the fashion of Wm. Butler Duncan's house on Washington square. Mr. Libby enlarged and remodeled the Bininger Clark house, giving to it a massive and striking exterior. The full influences of the Grand Central Depot on surrounding property have yet to be developed. The practical limit of Park avenue for residence purposes is found at Fortieth street, on which corner there is a model apartment building belonging to Boston parties. At Forty-second street all trace of Fourth avenue is completely lost in the gridiron or network of railroad tracks which converge at the Central Depot. The sidewalks of the avenue loom in sight again at Forty-ninth street, but no practical use of the avenue is gained until we reach Fifty-third or Fifty-fourth streets, and there the slightly depressed condition of the railroad track subjects the adjoining property to all the injury of an exposed steam railroad track quite as much so as if the tracks were laid upon the surface. At Fifty-sixth street the avenue takes on the character of a grand boulevard, and, though occasional openings occur in the tunnel, the road-bed is buried so far below the surface that the cars are almost lost to sight and hearing. From Fifty-sixth to Ninety-sixth street, a distance of two miles, the avenue presents a peculiarly grand appearance from its extraordinary width of one hundred and forty feet and from the really artistic manner in which its surface ha been graded and regulated, the stone pavement of the roadway being already laid as far as Sixtyseventh street. The problem of the final disposition of this part of the avenue must be near its solution. Any hope of a continued projection of private residences with a perpetuation of the fanciful name of Park avenue might as well be abandoned, for the reason that the breaks in the tunnel are sufficiently numerous to discourage this class of occupation. Wherever these breaks occur it is almost certain that the avenue lots will be -in fact, have already been-turned into street lots; or, if the avenue lots are improved as such, it will be with the stereotyped store and tenements of other leading avenues. The projection of several blocks of this class of building at points above Fifty-sixth street serves to clearly foreshadow the future of this avenue. No more attractive location could be desired for the development of medium class apartment houses. At the corner of Fifty-seventh street, Captain Tynker has erected a series of buildings named the Kensington, which thus far have outranked in public favor and successful renting more pretentious models that have been projected on the west side of the city. In building projections the struggle will undoubtedly be between this superior apartment building and the common store and tenement, and which will gain the final mastery will be a problem which time

alone can solve. At Ninety-sixth street the avenue descends abruptly and precipitately from the highest altitude of the island to the low marshes of Harlem plains. On the eminence of this bluff Mr. George Ehret, the brewer, is about erecting a costly city chateau. From this point until the depression of the railroad track sinks below the grade of the streets in Harlem the individuality of the avenue is practically lost or absorbed in the viaduct, the avenue lots being invariably turned into street lots, the gable ends of the houses resting on the avenue. From One Hundred and Sixteenth street to the Harlem River the avenue promises to become the leading business street of Harlem, and has already received building improvements of a costly and durable character, similar to those on the leading downtown avenues.

No other avenue in the city is likely to experience such a checkered career, pass through so many mutations of service, and be adorned with such a variety and diversity of improvements.

BROKERS AND THEIR CUSTOMERS.

A commonly accepted theory of the brokerage business is thus stated: To secure a list of properties to rent or for sale and authority or employment for offering the same, to advertise these properties occasionally in the daily papers, and then to sit quietly in a snug and well appointed office awaiting the applications of customers. Beyond issuing permits for the examination of properties, the broker is not supposed to exercise his labor or ingenuity. The columns of THE REAL ESTATE RECORD are then carefully scanned, and, when information is thus obtained of the sale or renting of the property in question to any customer whose name appears on the broker's permit book, then a demand is made upon the owner for the payment of a commission. In case of refusal, proceedings at law are instituted for its recovery. This method, or theory, of conducting the brokerage business represents the maximum of dignity but the minimum of usefulness, and its practice, when concurred in, is apt to be full of disappointments and discourage-

There is another theory of the business quite as largely practiced and adopted as the one just described, to wit: that of eschewing altogether the luxury of an office or business head-quarters, and, relying entirely for the consummation of transactions upon the intelligence, energy and alertness of the broker himself. In short, the broker is supposed to be upon the war path continually, and relies upon his brains and heels with a sublime indifference for the conventional accessories of business. The title usually applied to this class of brokers is that of "curbs," or "curbstone brokers." While the category represents largely the talent and efficiency of the profession, it can hardly be said to represent any of its dignity. It may be said to represent the maximum of usefulness and the minimum of ease. These brokers are untiring, unremitting, indefatigable. They ply their calling in season and out of season, and with creditable success.

We are not prepared to commend, exclusively, either of these methods of prosecuting the business. The one is too stolid and lifeless to merit either approbation or success; while the other partakes too largely of the gypsy element to command the unqualified confidence of the community. They represent the antipodes of action in the profession. We think a careful blending of the two courses of action would be attended with more satisfactory results. If brokers could harmoniously combine their interests in pairs, the mingling of these two elements of business procedure might be successfully accomplished. That

is to say, while one was enjoying the luxury and repose of the office, the other might be canvassing the public. Such an arrangement would represent the true ideal of the business and be more than acceptable to the patrons of such an office, while its results could scarcely fail to be most satisfactory to the brokers themselves.

It is not however so much with the brokers that we have to deal at the present time. We merely offer these prefatory remarks to introduce some comments upon the patrons of brokers to afford a foundation and perhaps an explanation of our criticisms. A broker's patronage, unlike that of any other profession, is, in the majority of cases, totally unreliable and ephemeral. This arises from the fact that purchasers and renters of houses and applicants for loans rarely appear oftener than once in the market. Hence they lack experience with the customs and casuistry of the trade and fall into wilful or unavoidable errors, oftentimes to the serious injury and detriment of the brokers themselves. After having obtained a permit, and perhaps having started a negotiation with one broker, they thoughtlessly take permits and have interviews with various other brokers with regard to the same property. As they are aware that the seller by custom pays the commission, they look upon these various brokers as so many agents of the one seller. They hold themselves to no moral accountability in the matter of their dealings with the respective brokers, imagining that they have a perfect right to negotiate with the particular one that happens to suit their fancy, without any reference to order, of priority or precedence. There are statutes, however, and a whole body of decisions governing the relations of broker, principal and customer, that are conclusive upon the principal whatever the ultimate action of the customer may be.

Thoughtless or wilful customers are apt to occasion unpleasant and entangling legal complications between brokers and a given principal in the matter of commissions. For instance, where the information concerning a house is taken from one broker and perhaps further information from a second, and the resulting transaction finally closed with a third broker, there is abundant material here furnished for a serious and scarcely remediable misunderstanding seventuating in a series of law suits.

It is difficult to instruct the public upon the proper method of dealing with brokers, and the instruction if given would be so rarely serviceable that there is little inducement to offer it. On account of this unreliability of brokerage custom, enterprising brokers are apt to concoct schemes of speculation on their own account, which they can manipulate and control in their own offices, or they frequently aim to accomplish their object by forming groups or rings of speculators, who will employ their special and exclusive services. Since the subsidence of real estate speculation this method has been lacking in practicability, although it once afforded a reliable and lucrative business to many offices that flourished prior to the panic of 1873. This system, like the management of special estates, confers upon the calling of the broker the dignity of a stated and regular business.

The charge of estates and collection of rents constitute the most reliable and available staple of the brokerage business, but one that would be scarcely mentioned in point of lucrative results in comparison with the one we have just outlined.

Another grievous fault and offence of customers is that of imputing to brokers, as a class, and sometimes to special individuals among them, an amount of odium that they cannot reasonably or fairly be said to deserve. Whatever sins of omission or commission made be laid to the

broker's door, and for which he may justly be held answerable, there is a large proportion of his alleged offences which grow out of the ignorance and unfairness of the customers themselves. who seek to screen their own inexperience and want of intelligence, by imposing unmerited blame upon the broker. The custom so commonly indulged in on the part of the public of assailing the brokerage profession, of characterizing the brokers themselves with all sorts of opprobrious epithets, and an almost chronic habit of betraying the rights of brokers, have together done more to demoralize and degrade the calling than any acts of the brokers themselves. The surest way to make a man dishonest or untruthful is to constantly apply to him the epithets that denote those qualities. In like manner the brokers have become so accustomed to hear their profession improperly characterized that they tacitly consent to the adoption of a lower rather than a higher standard of trade morality. It rests largely with the public to properly define the relations of brokers with their principals and to inspire the former with a praiseworthy and exalted professional tone and spirit in their complicated and often vexatious duties.

MARKET REVIEW.

REAL ESTATE MARKET.

The general market for the week has been quiet with few reported sales, and business at the Exchange presented few interesting features. In connection with the judicial sales, however, it is remarked that the bids made during the week approximated, in a great degree, to the amount of the liens affecting the property, and in some instances exceeded the amount of the mortgage. The premises known as No. 135 West One Hundred and Ninth street, between Third and Fourth avenues (18.9x100.11), the liens on which amounted to about \$4,850, realized \$5,000; and the store known as No. 793 Second avenue, between Fortysecond and Forty-third streets, the mortgages on which amounted to about \$9,400, were struck down for \$8,900. Two vacant lots on One Hundred and Forty-seventh street, 475 feet west of Seventh avenue, brought the full amount of the mortgage, amounting to \$2,900; and the premises on Sixty-fourth and Sixty-fifth streets, between Eleventh and Twelfth avenues, the liens affecting which amounted to about \$11,600, were bid up to that amount; the four-story brick dwelling, with lot (25x102.2), situated on Seventy fifth street, 100 feet west of Second avenue, was sold for \$9,475, the liens thereon amounting to \$9,600. At an executor's sale to close the estate of Henry Barnett, deceased, the house, with lot, No. 43 Eldridge street, was sold to John Donnelly for \$7,450, and No. 34 Norfolk street_was purchased by the same buyer for \$5.125.

The important recorded conveyance made during the week was that of Hugh Smith and Catharine Bradley to Jay Gould, by which the premises situated on Broadway and Sixth avenue, between Thirty-third and Thirty-fourth streets, were transferred in consideration of the sum of \$540,000, subject to one-half part of the mortgage thereon, amounting to \$300,000. Mr. Pedro Mora, Jr., has also taken title to the four-story brown stone house with lot (22x108), between Sixty-second and Sixty-third streets, known as No. 847, for which he paid \$55,000. Two vacant lots situated on Eighty-fourth street, and two on Eighty-fifth street, 350 feet east of Ninth avenue, have been conveyed to William H. Scott for the sum of \$18,000.

Messrs. Duggin & Crossman have filed with the Superintendent of the Building Department plans for the erection of ten first-class dwellings, four of which will be built on the northwest corner of Madison avenue and Fifty-fifth street, four on the southwest corner of Madison avenue and Fifty-sixth street, and two on Fifty-fifth street, near Madison avenue. One plan has been filed for the construction of twenty-five three-story brick dwellings at One Hundred and Eighth street, between Second and Third avenues. It is reported that Mr. Arnold, of the firm of Arnold, Constable & Co., has about completed arrangements with the well-known builders, James Webb & Son, for the second of an imposing structure on the corner of

Fifth avenue and Eighty-third street, the plans and specifications for which have not yet been filed.

BUILDING MATERIAL MARKET.

BRICK .- On common hards there is a very natural tendency to talk the market firm at this season of the year, and sellers' limits, as a rule, are kept up to a full level, with additional strength gained, through comparatively light supplies coming to hand. Matters, however, are not remarkably promising or buoyant, and extreme views can scarcely be realized, except in occasional instances on an extra attractive ters, however, are not remarkably promising or buoyant, and extreme views can scarcely be realized, except in occasional instances on an extra attractive offering, or under a momentary pressure, compelling buyers to secure a cargo quickly. Direct consumption has fallen off somewhat, and will tend to a further diminution rather than increase for some little time to come, and for yard accumulation the call is evidently smaller and less anxious than had been calculated upon. Many dealers have refrained from touching their stocks so long as they could find a cargo affoat, and, with the reduced distributive wants, and the river giving no signs of an early closing, there seems to be no necessity for pilling away anything more just now. Work on the elevated railroads continues to afford a very fair outlet for stock, without which the consumption would be very small. Supplies at the yards at points of production are comparatively full, and while many vessels are hauling off there is enough still on the route to bring forward all the stock the market will be likely to use so long as water communication remains open. About \$5.50 is the average top rate on Haverstraws, though some very choice lots have done a trifle better. A few odd lots of Jerseys came in, and are quoted at about \$4.25 (#4.50 per M. Fronts without much activity, but a fair movement in small lots of the choice qualities is occasionally heard of.

CEMENT.-The market for domestic retains a pretty firm position, and, while the reaction in favor of producers this fall was not so great as customary, of producers this fall was not so great as customary, there is a natural advantage for the seller, growing out of the season. Buyers, therefore, do not make any special effort for concessions, or hold off when they really desire a supply, and show resistance whenever there is any indication of an attempt to force them to pay an advance of any magnitude. About \$\frac{3}{2}\$ is quoted, but probably purchases could still be made a trifle lower. Foreign is not very active at the moment, and no very heavy call is expected until after the turn of the year. On good first-class brands holders appear to be steady in their views, but competition is sharp, and, on the ordinary run of stock, a close, careful buyer can occasignally secure comparatively easy terms.

HARDWARE, -- The general market continues quiet, and void of many features of positive interest. Outof-town orders came only from near-by sources, and of-town orders came only from near-by sources, and are requiring merely small invoices to fill out assortments against current consumption, while the local wants prove moderate all around. Dealers and manufacturers, however, are about ready, or have in some cases actually commenced the taking of inventory, and this must continue for two or three weeks. On prices, we hear of nothing new at the moment. Cast butts, locks, &c., are in the old, irregular condition—indeed so much so as to prevent any positive quotation, but most other styles of builders' hardware rule about steady, and the revision of price-lists, it is said, will not give buyers many advantages.

LATH.—We continue to hear some very positive expressions of confidence among the receivers, and an immediate and sudden jump of prices "away above" current rates is the ordinary prediction. Limited offerings and an anxious and exhaustive call are calculated upon to produce this result when it is

reached. In the meantime, buyers do not appear to have much to say, or to take any great interest beyond parcels required for immediate necessity, and the demand so long expected from many of our local dealers has either not came at all, at such modified form, as to fail entirely in affording the anticipated stimulus. Indeed, if anything, the tone at the present writing is a little slack, and while \$1.65 is the average quotation, there has probably been sales at 5c, reduction. Cargoes en route have been detained, and some receivers are fearful they will all come in together. together.

LIME.—The demand continues of moderate volume and quite irregular in tone, but compared with the amount of stock available is exhaustive, and nothing amount of stock available is exhaustive, and nothing from current arrivals accumulates unsold. Indeed, most, if not all, of the cargoes due are disposed of before arrival, and with the very natural reduction of shipments at this season of the year, the market is about bare of stock in first hands. Values, in the absence of recent sales, are nominally unchanged, but new buyers would, no doubt, be compelled to pay an advance. State lime has been in fair request, and prices tend to harden, especially on common.

LUMBER.-The "season" may be considered as closed on the general wholesale market, and little closed on the general wholesale market, and little of interest likely to be developed until toward spring. A few arrivals seeking sale may be expected accordingly from coastwise points, but so far as at present indicated, most dealers have taken in pretty much all the stock they intended, and the falling off of supply is neutralized by the diminished wants of trade. We find a wide difference of opinion as to the amount of lumber on hand, compared with last year, but the weight of opinion seems to favor a smaller total. Indeed, some of the extreme views assert that caution has been carried too far, and that before the next regular season opens, even allowing for a limited consumption intermediate, the wants of the market will be so pressing as to form base for decidedly better bids. High prices, however, have seldom failed, during the past few years, to draw supplies from some point, and frequently of quite unexpected volume, and at the same time have largely curtailed consumption, not only on the article of which we now write, but on every kind of merchandise on the market; and this result has proven a serious counter-action to the expectations of "short crop" and "short stock" theorists. Our local consumption at present is small and irregular on all outlets, and confined mainly to the completion of contracts. There is, however, more or less show of animation on the shipping call still, and at steady rates, with dealers apparently confident that they can find a good market on this outlet all winter.

Eastern Spruce has not much a market at this season, or rather no dependence can be placed upon the market. The arrivals are small and irregular, even with the best of calculations, owing to the changeable weather, and the demand is also very erratic. LOCAL ASSESSMENTS-NOTICE TO PROP-ERTY-OWNERS.

FINANCE DEPARTMENT-COMPTROLLER'S OFFICE. NEW YORK, Dec. 10, 1877.

The Comptroller of the City of New York hereby gives notice to the owners of property liable to assessment for local improvements for the expense of which assessments were confirmed prior to the passage of an act of the Legislature entitled "An Act relating to the payment of assessments for local improvements in the City of New York," passed April 17, 1877, that the provision of law contained in the first section of said act authorizing the payment thereof in three annual installments, and reducing the rate of interest thereon from 12 to 8 per cent. per annum, expires, by limitation, on the 31st day of December, 1877, to wit.:

"All assessments for local improvements in the City of New York, confirmed prior to the passage of this act, except as provided in section four of this act, may be paid by the person liable to pay the same in three equal installments, as follows: The first in-

stallment on or before the thirty-first day of December, eighteen hundred and seventy-seven, the second installment on or before the thirty-first day of December, eighteen hundred and seventy-eight, and the third installment on or before the thirty-first day of December, eighteen hundred and seventy-nine, with interest at the rate of eight per cent, per annum thereon. But nothing in this section shall prohibit the person liable to pay an assessment from paying the whole amount of such assessment in one payment, under the provisions of law in force prior to the passage of this act."

Under this statute the privilege of paying such assessments in installments, at a lower rate of interest, will cease and determine on the 31st day of December, instant, if the first installment is not paid on or before that day, and the whole assessment will be payable in one payment only, at the rate of twelve per cent. per annum, from the date of confirmation.
