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THE PROSPECTS OF THE BUILDING TRADE.

Every well-wisher of this city must take a lively interest in the condition and prospects of the building trade. Activity in building denotes vigor and growth of the metropolis, whereas stagnation just as surely indicates decadence and retrogression. Indications abound on every hand that the long wave of adversity which has rolled over this interest has become thoroughly exhausted, and that from the present year we may look for more propitious signs if not for substantial encouragement for embarkations in this line. The conditions which present themselves to-day bear a marked contrast to those out of which was germinated the wild and reckless activity of the last great speculative era. The recuperative forces, which are now at work and which promise to reinvigorate and reinspire this noble calling, are all of the legitimate kind. The next great era of building activity promises to take its origin in a plane of low values, relatively if not actually the lowest that the city has known since it has taken on the dignity of a metropolis. In all but the most exclusively fashionable localities and along the most prosperous business thoroughfares, the price of land has fallen to nearly as low a level as that which prevailed twenty years ago.

The establishment of rapid transit and the prospect of an early resumption of specie payments are the potential factors of the new order of things which is likely soon to be inaugurated. The steady and pacifying effects of a specie basis afford a meet reciprocal for the great prospective demand for dwellings which is likely to grow out of the successful establishment of rapid transit.

We have exhausted the benefits and tasted the bitterest dregs of a scale of high values, and we come now to test the virtue and efficacy of low prices. In familiar words high prices invite competition, and, we may add, destruction; but low prices defy competition as well as invite a liberal demand.

An important element in the calculations of the building trade must necessarily be the prospective results of mercantile operations. The fact, however, that a moderate degree of building activity has been kept up during the past five years of unparalleled mercantile depression, would seem to indicate that the vigor of building activity is not strictly or entirely dependent upon commercial results. There is a forceful vitality in the growth of our metropolis, which finds its root in sources which either cannot be traced out or which are not apparent to the ordinary observer. It is saying nothing new to aver that the latent wealth of

New York—that which is ordinarily dissociated from and independent of mercantile revulsions—is the true germinating force behind many leading building improvements. Although the predominant sentiment and tone of business circles are those of gloom, uncertainty and trepidation, it may be easily determined that there are branches of business in this city, which are enjoying and have been partakers of a large share of success. The superlative advantage of a great financial and mercantile metropolis is that its impulses of prosperity are derived from a multitude of sources, and while some may be stagnant and unfruitful, others are sure to be glowing with warmth, and bristling with a healthful activity. If a discriminating and periodical census could be taken of the occupants of our most fashionable mansions, in probably no way could the waves of business prosperity and adversity be better delineated. While unfortunate members of our New York society withdraw to secluded abodes, the representatives of business success quickly step forward and take their places in the front ranks.

The two most serious problems which present themselves in connection with the revival of building are those of labor and taxes.

The greatest hardship that was ever inflicted on the building trade of this city was the enactment of the eight hour law, which so seriously disturbed the relations of employer and employed and which led directly and swiftly to a reaction in the condition of the mechanical classes, from the effects of which they are just beginning to recover. Wages like capital must ever be left under the controlling influence of the law of supply and demand. Probably no human device, and certainly no legal enactment can be framed for regulating the value of wages, or for establishing them upon any arbitrary level. During the dulness of the past few years, wages have become unduly depressed, sinking even in the case of first-class skilled mechanics to levels lower than those that prevailed before the war. Mason's and carpenter's wages at one dollar and seventy-five cents per day of ten hours, and laborers wages of from sixty cents to one dollar per day, cannot be taken as representing any normal standard. Already slight reactions have set in which have enabled mechanics to obtain a small increase of wages. Whether wisely or not, we would hardly venture to say, the leading mechanics have inaugurated a strike during the present season for a still greater advance, masons and carpenters claiming two dollars and a half, and other skilled mechanics claiming a proportionate advance. This movement is undoubtedly responsive to the outcropping of an enlarged demand for such services.

The steady influence of the gold standard is no where more required for the interest of all parties than in the regulation of wages. A fluctuating standard of currency, and consequently of wages, introduces the element of uncertainty into all the calculations of the master builder. Unexpected and excessive advances in wages work a serious hardship to a contractor, as an unduly depressed standard of wages does to a mechanic. The interest and well being of the two classes (employer and employee) are so directly connected that it becomes most desirable that a fixed and uniform level of wages, at least for a

given year or season, should be established. There is a possibility that the agitation of this question of wages may deter timid capitalists from embarking in building enterprises, and the forcing of any such condition would be certain to react upon the mechanic by lessening the demand for his services.

As the disposition seems to exist among employers to concede the rate of wages now demanded, to wit—two dollars and a half per day for the highest grade of mechanics, it is more than likely that this will be adopted as the prevailing standard for the coming season, and contracts will be gauged according to it.

With the adjustment of the labor question, there remains a solitary obstacle to a full and healthy revival of building, to wit—the matter of taxation. If one-half or two-thirds of the present taxation could be removed from real estate, by a reduction of city expenditures and by a distribution of some such share of it upon other objects, we would venture to prophesy a startling revival in the building trade that would extend promiscuously from the Battery to Harlem River, embracing the substitution of new and imposing edifices for old and dilapidated ones, and the covering of the immense area of vacant land that now disfigures the upper end of the island with new and comfortable homes. As it is, the unequal and oppressive burden of taxation that now rests on real estate acts as a powerful deterrent in the revival of this interest.

The building trade naturally divides itself into two branches, and we propose to consider the prospect of each of these separately.

LEGITIMATE BUILDERS.—The rank and file of the legitimate builders, those who execute work upon contract, have been lying in enforced idleness for many months awaiting the revival of business and a renewed demand for their services. This vast body of master and minor mechanics resembles a great army marshaled and equipped for duty and awaiting the word of command to advance into active service. There is no lack of mechanical genius in this city for executing the most varied and difficult tasks. That ability, however, waits patiently to be called into action by the inspiring invitation of the capitalist. Aside from the rumors which are floating about, of the projection of elaborate and costly private works, and aside from the numerous outcroppings of private orders which are already in course of execution, there are certain conditions which favor the hope of widespread and early employment for legitimate builders. The cheapness and plethora of money, which have become the chronic symptoms of this great money centre, cannot fail in time to have an effect in inducing capitalists to seek permanent investments in real estate. As the hope recedes of procuring high rates for money on call, or of obtaining solid securities that will pay a satisfactory rate of interest, the capitalist will be driven through sheer desperation to seek investments in real estate which will pay him a reasonable annual interest.

The scarcity of good mortgages and the discouraging prospect that this class of investment may be made the object of invidious and blighting legislation must in time have an effect in determining capitalists to give their preference to investments in improved property as the best

means of combating the demands of the tax gatherer. The moment the plane of rental valuations is clearly defined, and a reasonable expectation can be founded of a demand for hiring improved property, we are persuaded that good real estate in this city will be decidedly preferred to even the best securities, which pay but meagre returns in the way of dividends. As compared with fluctuating and uncertain railroad bonds or county bonds of doubtful legality no room for hesitation is afforded. The ownership of good New York property, capable of producing a well defined income, is recognized by shrewd and experienced men as the most valuable and reliable expression of wealth that the world can produce. The exceptionally low scale of prices at which land can be bought and improvements made, must present an irresistible temptation to the man of means to invest in building productions.

The law of gravitation by which large areas of vacant property are slowly accumulating in the hands of wealthy people is another consideration which points to an early and extensive revival of building. The unwillingness to relinquish property that has once been acquired unless at full prices must eventually determine the owners of such estates to seek to make them productive by improvements.

SPECULATIVE BUILDERS.—The undaunted and unflinching courage of our leading speculative builders is proverbial. The ardor, not to say the recklessness, with which they have pursued their calling in these hard and difficult times furnishes the ground for extended and timely comment. No small degree of wonder has been excited by the promptness with which many extensive blocks of new buildings have been marketed. A knowledge of their results satisfies us that the question of a market is altogether one of price and not of character or volume of demand. For more than a year past a steady and continuous demand has been exhibited for dwellings of the better class, which only suffered a slight interruption during the agitation of the silver bill. As soon as this menace to business was withdrawn buyers presented themselves again in goodly numbers. A few notable instances have occurred of successful building speculation during this period, but we regret to say that in many cases the builders have failed to realize the cost of their productions, owing to the unfortunate fact of their having paid too great a price for the land on which their buildings were erected. This high price in some instances has included a bonus for a building loan. In other cases, where the land had been purchased for cash, it has been found that the attempt to market such productions when completed was baffled by the high cost at which the work had been capitalized. As the mechanical portion was executed on the lowest plane of prices and wages, it would be idle for the builder to look for any further reduction of the cost in that branch of the work. To enable them to cater successfully to the prevailing demand for houses, it is necessary for them to secure their land at the lowest possible rates. The value of vacant property must hereafter be gauged according to results in the selling of improved property. The sales of improved property which have recently been made have realized prices rather above than below the average views of purchasers, and, hence, may be accepted as reliable expressions of the public sentiment in regard to the prices of houses. As the buying public are the ultimate arbiters of value, so builders are compelled to gauge their transactions according to the standards set up by house buyers. All the leading and active speculative builders have had more or less experience with the views of current house buyers. It will be worse than folly for them in future to capitalize their productions on

any higher planes of value than those indicated as the current ones during the present season. However unwelcome the prospect of a further reduction of values may be to the lot owner, it must be borne in mind that his interest conflicts with the twin interest of the builder and house buyer. Since the lot owner is left in the minority, the least he can do is to submit or else busy himself with the improvement of his own property. From our knowledge of affairs, we believe we cannot impress upon speculative builders too strongly the importance of seeking to acquire land at the lowest ruling rates, and above all to avoid any unnecessary outlay in the securing of building loans. Neat, comfortable and attractive dwellings are in good demand and may be readily sold at fair prices, and these prices may be considered large enough to include a satisfactory profit for the builder, provided he is not compelled to pay a disproportionate price for his land. The results of the past season, and we may say of the past year, afford reasonable encouragement for judicious and prudent operations of the speculative builder. They give the assurance that there is still an active demand for meritorious productions, and this demand seems to come from persons who are not seriously crippled by the times. The prevailing feature of this demand is that the buyer insists on acquiring property free from mortgage, and at a price which it shall be his privilege to strictly define. More than one-half of the current sales have been made to parties who have paid every dollar of the purchase price in cash, and are completely satisfied with the bargains which were made.

MARKET REVIEW.

REAL ESTATE MARKET.

On Tuesday last Messrs. E. H. Ludlow & Co. offered for sale by order of the executors of the will of the late Paschal W. Turney, several parcels belonging to the estate of deceased, but owing to the inadequacy of the bids made by the parties in attendance at the sale, only three plots were disposed of, as follows: two lots situated on the south side of Eighty-fifth street, 225 feet east of Tenth avenue, brought \$1,030, and the one quarter interest in the plot of ground with building known as Numbers 647 and 649 Tenth avenue realized \$8,000. At a sale held on Wednesday last, by order of the Receiver of the Clinton Savings Bank, the lot with buildings thereon known as No. 230 West Sixteenth street, was sold for \$15,000, and the five-story brown stone store and tenement house, known as No. 232 East Seventy-fourth street brought, \$5,000. By order of executors, Messrs. Muller & Son sold the six-story brick building and lot situate on the southwest corner of West Houston and Mercer streets (25x62.9) for \$30,000, and two lots on the southeast corner of the Grand Boulevard and Ninety-eighth street, for \$12,000. Mr. Harnett also disposed of the house with lot 18.9x100.5, No. 168 West Forty-seventh street, for \$14,000.

Several important foreclosure sales have been held since our last report, full details of which appear below.

Under private contract O'Reilly Bros. have sold to Dr. Frank Abbott, of No. 12 West Nineteenth street, house and lot No. 22 West Fortieth street (18x95x100.5) for \$35,000. Lynde Bros. have sold to Lawson B. Bell, one of the new houses on the south side of Fifty-fourth street, between Fifth and Sixth avenues (20x65 x100.5) for \$33,000.

It is reported that R. Schoonmaker has sold to E. Oppenheimer parcel of land north side Fifty-seventh street, between Fourth and Lexington avenues, 40x100, for \$12,000. Oppenheimer has resold to W. A. Croft, builder, for \$15,000, with a loan of \$12,000. The cash price of this parcel is at the rate of \$7,500 for a full lot. The adjoining lots were sold in 1875, (T. F. Neville to Brian McKenna), for \$11,500 for a full lot, showing a decline of just \$1,000 per lot.

Thirteen plans embracing twenty-five buildings, were filed with the Superintendent of the Department

of Buildings during the week ending June 6, the estimated cost of which is \$192,900. The notable buildings to be erected are a five-story apartment house, at No. 129 East Seventeenth street; one five-story brick warehouse at No. 144 Nassau street, by Banks, Bros.; six four-story brick stores, at the corner of Second avenue and Thirty-eighth street, and six three-story brick dwellings on One Hundred and Eleventh street, between Third and Fourth avenues.

BUILDING MATERIAL MARKET.

BRICKS.—Since our last report receivers have had a pretty hard market to deal with, and found it impossible to prevent a decline on values. The check to the demand occasioned by the holiday and the miserable condition of the weather resulted in a very full accumulation afloat, and this week opened with what even with a good business would have been considered a full supply, an advantage buyers were not slow to improve, and refused to negotiate except at a concession. A short trial convinced sellers that resistance would only briefly postpone the decline, and the necessity was therefore accepted under which prices went off until \$5.25 became the actual selling rate for the best Haverstraws, and "Up Rivers" did not exceed \$4.50 per M. This shading drew out a somewhat larger number of orders, but did not quicken the demand into positive animation, and no important recovery took place except possibly on really fine cargoes, for which about 13% more per M. was in some cases obtained. A great many of the offerings show the effects of stormy weather, being rough, washed, etc., and on these naturally it has been necessary to grant the greatest favors. As we write, sellers seem to be hopeful that the market has seen its worst, and a steadier tone must soon be infused. Much, however, will depend upon manufacturers who thus far appear to have been producing freely and shipping as rapidly as their stock was ready for market, giving a surplus of supply over demand which the best management of receivers cannot counteract. There is a good prospect for the sale of a large number of brick this summer on ordinary building wants, with additional calls also likely

for consumption in the extension of the elevated railroads; but buyers cannot be induced to anticipate their wants, and offerings must be regulated accordingly. Pale Brick have been simply nominal, at about \$2.00 with an occasional small sale at \$2.25. Nobody appeared to want the stock, but holders would not shade the above rates. Fronts have been in moderately active demand, and remain steady on a basis of about former quotations. The export call is moderate, but still a little is doing, and we learn of charters for St. John of a schooner of 105 tons at \$2.15 from Haverstraw, and one of 122 tons at \$2.25 from Cold Spring.

Yard prices, delivery included, \$2.25@\$3 higher on ordinary and \$5.00@\$6.00 on fronts.

CEMENT.—On domestic the market continues unsettled, but without evidences of gaining much positive strength, the amount of the offerings fully balancing the outlet, and always a little to spare, looking up extra orders. As usual of late our local consumption affords comparatively little relief, but demand for shipment to home dependent points continues to take out a goodly amount of stock. Prices without important alteration. Foreign continues in some demand on local account, but the principal outlet is on interior orders of which the number is fair and from a variety of points. Supplies hold out well, and values remain easy on about the general range for some time current.

HARDWARE.—The distribution of supplies is not active, and occasionally the market shows a pretty dull tone, but more especially so on outlets toward interior points. The local wants are on the whole fair for the season, and exporters keep up a very good call for goods. Stocks and assortments hold out very well, without becoming excessive, with dealers offering readily to desirable customers on a basis of about former rates. A price list for the Family Vise has been published as follows: No. 1, plain japanned, 1 1/2 in. jaw, \$6.00 per doz.; No. 2, do., 2 in. jaw, \$7.50 per doz.; No. 3, ornamented, 1 1/2 in. jaw, \$7.50 per doz.; No. 4, do., 2 in. jaw, \$9.00 per doz. There is much irregularity on cast Butts again, including japanned, and the evident tendency is toward a lower range except possibly japanned with silver acorns.

LATH.—A moderate shading has been made since our last, with sales down to \$1.50 per M., but we can hear of nothing below this, and, as we write, the tone seems to be a trifle firmer again with some dealers talking \$1.55 per M. as a likely price, especially on small lots. The demand is not over liberal or general but as the forwarding of supplies has been judiciously managed the exhaustive capacity of the market was not overtaxed.

LIME.—We find no change in the situation. The supply and demand of all kinds appears to very nearly strike a balance, and this prevents a surplus accumulation pressing for sale, but at the same time no actual scarcity is shown, and sellers thus far have been content to accept former rates.

LUMBER.—Our general lumber market continues free of the least sign of speculative feeling and pretty much all the demands developed have the basis of actual and early wants. While few of these are very large at the moment there appears to be rather more of them and a steady going trade from day to day commences to move a fair amount of stock. Quite a number of builders have so far progressed with their work as to reach the point of actual consumption of lumber, and others are opening negotiations against the requirements of operations already in hand, or soon to be started. The supply on hand has thus far been found about equal to the calls made upon it, but is by no means large or any too well assorted and additions have been found necessary by some dealers though the inclination seems to favor the policy of purchasing as little as possible and making old stocks go as far as they will. From exporters the inquiry continues fair, as a rule, but shows some irregularity according to available freight room or the necessity for filling vessels that have unemployed capacity. This, however, is least noticeable on West India shipments, from whence many orders come direct and positive.

Easter Spruce comes forward to a fair extent on contract, and many of the reduced accumulations are now for the time being filled to very good working order. Random parcels not particularly plenty, however, and desirable bills find sale without much difficulty on a basis of about former rates, the average tone ruling steady. Sales of specials at present are moderate and buyers crowd hard for easy terms.

We quote at \$12.00@\$13.00 for random, possibly \$13.50 for choice lengths in small cargo, and \$13.00@\$14.00 for specials, the extreme for extra difficult.

White Pine remains about steady on all grades but the market without particularly brilliant features. On home account there is not much demand, but apparently a light stock available, while from shippers the call is met by a balancing offering of most grades wanted. This keeps matters about uniform, though the buyer has a little advantage now and then, where figuring is close and a slight shading will place an invoice. The amount on hand is very fair and pretty well assured to present wants. We quote at \$15@17 per M. for West India shipping boards; \$20.00@\$21.00 for South American do; \$15@16 for box

boards; \$17 for do. wide and sound; and timber to order at \$30@40 per M.

Yellow Pine continues under delivery on previous contract to a fair extent, and there is also more or less being forwarded to dependent points from the same base of sale. New business, however, is moderate and confined principally to cargo or two for shipment from Southern ports, or possibly a call for flooring boards, or siding from stock in first hands here. There is a prospect that a pretty full sale of this class of wood will again be made to the elevated railroad companies during the present season. Receipts from the Southern ports since January 1st amount to about 31,750,000 feet. We quote random cargoes at about \$18@21 per M.; ordered cargoes \$22@24 do; green flooring boards, \$20@21 do; and dry do. do, \$20@23. Cargoes at the South, \$14@15.50 per M; hewn timber, \$7.50@14.

Hardwoods are said to be in better export demand again, but some dealers incline to the belief that everything they report will at once revolutionize the entire trade and, therefore, they refuse information. Nominally (under the circumstances), there is a better demand, induced, so rumor says, by easier terms, and we report it for what it is worth. We quote at wholesale rates by car load about as follows: Walnut \$7.65@8.50 P.M.; ash, \$33@36 do; oak, \$35@40 do.; maple, \$30@35; chestnut, 1st and 2d, \$30@35 do.; do. culls, \$18@20 do; cherry, \$45@55 do; white wood, 1/2 and 3/4 inch, \$25@27.50, and do. inch \$33@35 do.; hickory, \$25@30 do, for Western, and \$10@15 for good near-by stock.

Yard trade has been fair in many sections of the city, in others rather dull, but rarely are dealers to be found who distribute with any freedom on fresh orders, the supplies going out in this way being of very light character. Supplies and assortments are good enough for the wants of the market, and terms not exacting toward desirable customers.

The Albany Argus reports as follows: The receipts of lumber are large; larger we presume than was anticipated by the trade. The market since our last report has been quiet. Prices are unchanged but are weak. Stocks are ample and are well assured.

SAGINAW VALLEY.

Lumberman's Gazette Office:

BAY CITY, Monday, June 3, 1878.

The lumber market in the Saginaw Valley is now in a very quiet condition. About all the dry lumber on hand has been disposed of at good prices, and this year's cut is not yet in shipping condition, so that there is very little demand for lumber at the present time. We hear of a few sales being made during the past week at former quotations. Manufacturers do not look for much trade during the next sixty days, as the time is now close at hand when the farmers in all parts of the country will be busy with their harvesting, and the consequence will be that no building will be done until the farm work is finished. Lumber dealers will undoubtedly stock up early this year for the fall trade, and we look for an active market along about the first of August. The prices still rule firm, and manufacturers seem determined to hold their stock in preference to shading prices in the least. Dealers here in the city report an active car trade, orders coming in as fast as they can be filled. The shingle trade is good and prices steady as quoted.

The shipments of lumber from the river during the month of May just closed have been brisk, although freights have been so low as to make it unprofitable for boat men to handle the same. The amount shipped is but little in excess of that handled during the same month last year, yet the season opened so much earlier that the excess in the shipments from the river for the season is nearly 70,000,000 over that shipped to June 1, 1877.

The Lumberman and Manufacturer as follows:

MINNEAPOLIS, MINN., May 30, 1878.

All things work together for good to those who have got lumber on their yards and back-bone in their bodies. Trade continues large when the amount of lumber on hand is taken into account, although it has been interfered with by the recent heavy storms which have swept over Iowa, Illinois and Wisconsin, and demoralized the roads. Freight discriminations have also effected the trade of the Valley unfavorably.

In the matter of the drives nothing of importance has occurred. The logs on the upper Mississippi are running into the Minneapolis booms and are all out to within a few million feet left on the brooks.

On the St. Croix nothing has been accomplished toward getting out the Snake River drive, which for three weeks has been wind-bound in the dead water above Cross Lake. The St. Croix Falls jam has been picked out, and is safe in the booms. The Apple River logs are also driven in. The other drives are making indifferent progress. The St. Croix has now probably 40,000,000 feet in.

There is nothing doing on the Chippewa, Black or Wisconsin rivers, and cannot be until there is a serious rise. Several of the mills on these streams have shut down for want of logs, and others will be compelled to in a few days.

Prices are not affected by any of these apparently important matters. Chicago and the river towns from

St. Louis to Minneapolis are engaged in debating whether they can maintain prices on lumber which they have not got, and cannot by any possibly get, in 1878. A few leaning to the opinion that they cannot, and the majority fully impressed with the idea that if they had the lumber they could sell it.

Minneapolis continues to maintain her price list, which is a little above the other Northwestern markets on certain grades or sorts, while she is lower on others. It is probable that their differences will soon be adjusted, in some way, by the parties.

Chicago market piece stuff advanced 25 to 37½ cents on Monday, but if it was advanced 37½ dollars it would hardly effect outside markets, as yard prices would continue the same.

FOREIGN.

The London Timber Trades Journal as follows:

LIVERPOOL, May 22, 1878.

There is little change in the condition of the wood market here, notwithstanding the deplorable state into which this country has been plunged by the war between labor and capital in the manufacturing districts, for as all transactions have been limited to the supplies necessary for satisfying immediate or pressing wants to complete contracts in hand, the same limited state of affairs still continues, and prices for dealers' quantities are unchanged.

In the open market, low qualities of goods are offering at reduced prices, and cargoes of some descriptions of timber, &c., can be bought at lower prices than have ruled during any previous part of the year. On the other hand, the stock of pine wood of all descriptions continues to diminish, and prices are consequently stiff for these kinds, as the stocks on hand are very small.

Spruce deals and battens show a slight decrease in value; but some dimensions are scarce and still command high rates, as will be seen from the returns below.

GLASGOW, May 22, 1878.

There are no arrivals into Clyde to report during last fortnight. For many years past we have been accustomed to receive in the early spring an abundant supply of St. John, N. B., deals, through the regular Anchor Line steam traders to Glasgow. This year, however, has been an exception, for up to this date there has not been any import, so that missing these large cargoes the yards here now present an extremely bare appearance. Indeed, from the quantity removed during the last few weeks, the depot is now nearly empty of deals. This might seem to give great encouragement to importers, but it is necessary to be guarded, for it will be a considerable time before our building trade can revive from its present languid and depressed condition, many tenements in the city and outlying districts still remaining untenanted. A large cargo of broad Wisconsin pine deals recently arrived was sold here by auction to-day by Messrs. Edmiston and Mitchells. There was a very good attendance of buyers, and the lots were readily taken up.

OILS.—Business is variable, but not often very free, and the market as a whole has a dull tone. Supplies are not allowed to accumulate freely, but there appears to be no scarcity against ordinary calls. We quote: Linseed, about 58@60c. per gallon; lard, 55@57c. for winter; 51@53c. for No. 1, and 45@50 for No. 2; crude cotton seed, 35@40c., and refined summer yellow, do., 49@51c.

PAINTS.—There has not been quite so much doing of late. More or less call is made for the leading grades of stock but buyers evidently do not handle more than they require for early consumption, and refuse to indulge in any purchases that will have to be carried for more than a few weeks. In a wholesale way the operations are also small on both domestic and imported goods and dealers are prone to complain of the condition of trade. The supply shows good quantity and assortment and terms are easy, very much so in some cases, but these facts are no attraction to buyers who are without immediate use for supplies.

PITCH.—A quiet, slow sort of trade is doing, confined in the main to orders on immediate positive requirements and to satisfy this the supply is fair in both quantity and assortment. Prices vary a little according to size of order, &c., but preserve about the former general range. We quote at \$1.87 1/2@2.12 1/2 for city delivered.

SPIRITS TURPENTINE.—Demand not very active in a jobbing way, but still most dealers manage to keep a little stock moving and to the ordinary outlets. The offering only fair, and prices have hardened somewhat, closing firmly at 29 1/2@33c. according to quantity of stock handled.

TAR.—Supplies continue to about balance the calls made, and sellers gain no very great advantage. Further concessions, however, have not been considered necessary, and in a jobbing way the position is steady. We quote at \$2.65@2.15 for Newberne and Washington, and \$2.10@2.25 for Wilmington.
