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CALL LOANS.

The call loan is a form of transaction peculiar to Wall street, concerning which the uninitiated may be ignorant. Its name conveys by implication its character. There are essential details connected with it, which it may be worth while to explain. As a rule, money is never loaned in Wall street without security; and these call loans differ from time loans in that the former may be called in, or repayment of them demanded, without notice; while in the latter case repayment can only be demanded at the expiration of the specified time.

In the earlier history of Wall street, these loans were hedged about with many safeguards. For instance, they were generally procured from institutions, the strictness of whose requirements were readily complied with, in view of the assured safety of the collateral security deposited against the loans. In addition to the pledged security, a stock note was also given, which contained, besides its promissory obligation to repay the money borrowed, a clause authorizing the holder of the security to realize upon it in case of default in fulfilment of the obligation. A power of attorney usually accompanied the note attached to the certificate of stock or the bonds. Caution and prudence were then exercised in the manipulation of these loans, well suited to the slow going and plodding times of a quarter of a century ago, and which are looked for in vain in these more progressive days. Loans are now effected of thousands, hundreds of thousands, or millions of dollars by the mere deposit of collateral, with a memorandum accompanying the security reciting, in the most casual manner, the bare details of the transaction.

It will be seen that a large amount of mutual confidence is necessary in such transactions. Risks connected with them are reciprocal. The lender relies upon the borrower for the genuineness and authenticity of the collateral, while the borrower is obliged to confide in the lender for the safety of the margin or excess of security over the loan. This margin may vary from ten to twenty-five or even forty percent. of the loan. The largest margins usually attract timid lenders and influence them to be contented with a low rate of interest. Occasionally the lightning flashes with sufficient vividness into the dark recesses of Wall street to reveal the hidden mysteries which envelop some of these transactions. Lenders of money at low rates of interest with large margins of security, like the Netters, are able by simply rehypothecating these securities to appropriate or utilize a good share of the original margin. A

few such transactions serve to show up with what childlike confidence a vast amount of business in Wall street is actually done, and point to the readiness with which shrewd but respectable rogues can avail themselves of opportunities of defrauding credulous and confiding creditors.

The peculiarity of the modern method of dealing in call loans is the waiving of the promissory note. This custom grew out of the imposition of a stamp tax on notes during the war. This tax was an onerous exaction in Wall street, owing to the frequency with which these notes are changed, and the large amounts of money which they commonly represent. To avoid this taxation and to simplify and expedite their business, perhaps in exemplification also of the unbounded confidence which prevailed in Wall street during the inflation era, the method was adopted of depositing with the lender the bare collaterals with a simple memorandum.

As useful and economical as this system may have been in the past, and upon a rising market, it has little to recommend it in doubtful times like these, and upon a falling market. The method compels the lender to look exclusively to the securities pledged, having no reclamation in law upon the borrower if the securities fail to satisfy the loan. The law imposes an obligation upon the lender to keep himself whole out of the securities pledged. Failing to do so, and when the market price of the collateral stocks, or bonds, may decline below the amount of the loan, the lender has the option of selling them and realizing his loss, or of making them his own, and holding them for a rise. This specious and alluring form of transaction made, as it too often is, amid the hurry and rush of Wall street, has been the instrument of many and signal losses to men who imagined they were possessed of all the conservatism requisite for the preservation of money. Through sudden and rapid changes in market value, these collateral securities, so called, held by institutions and individuals, have shrunk out of all proportion to the amount loaned upon them. Under the circumstances, including, perhaps, failure of the borrower, no redress could be sought, and no restitution will be made to the lender.

We believe that loose and reckless methods of conducting business in Wall street are gradually undergoing reform, in response to the more conservative spirit of the times and the exactations of those who now have the handling of money. It will be well for the whole community when a more cautious spirit pervades Wall street. There is no detail of transacting business there that calls for a more complete regeneration than this one of call loans. The manner in which securities have been tossed around from hand to hand, like so many newspapers, and the carelessness and lack of security which have marked the acceptances of collaterals, have often involved capitalists in unnecessary risks and fostered a reckless and demoralizing spirit in the operations of the street.

When rates of money were high, at 7 per cent. or more, the call loan was a formidable competitor of the mortgage loan, although differing so immeasurably in character and security. Now, when the call loan interest, even with wild cat collaterals, is only a paltry percentage, the predominant desire is to avoid these mercurial and un-

stable Stock Exchange securities, and to invest money in good mortgages. Many who have been in the habit of cultivating the call loan in past years give a preference to depositing their money in the trust companies at the prevailing low rate of interest, rather than incur the extraordinary hazards of call loan securities for the sake of an additional fraction of interest.

Before the final culmination of the revolution, which financial and mercantile matters in this country are now undergoing, we venture to assert that investments will be esteemed and sought after in this order of precedence: 1st, prime mortgages; 2d, government stocks; 3d, trust company; 4th, call loans, and 5th, miscellaneous securities.

COMBINATION AND COMPETITION.

For more than a decade of years the business of this country has been adjusted to the gauge of organized and ramified monopoly. Enclosed within a Chinese wall of high protection, strengthened within by the illusory support of an irredeemable paper currency, presided over and fostered by a paternal government dealing out subsidies and land grants with a bounteous hand, the reaction and revulsion through which we have been slowly passing during the past five years reflect, unmistakably, the extreme artificiality and tension that have pervaded our previous business methods.

The potential example set by government in its enormous system of centralized monopolies was quickly copied by the masses of the people, and held to represent the true standard of business procedure. Organized rings or combinations were set up in all branches of trade. From the largest to the smallest, all schemes were formulated under this great co-operative system, primarily intended to plunder the many for the benefit of the few. In all classes of manufacturing, through all the ramifications of mercantile life, in all financial operations, in politics, in all developments of labor the paramount aim was to effect combinations designed to give one interest or class priority and superiority over kindred interests.

The weakness and falseness of this business policy are now being demonstrated and are likely to be impressed with such poignant emphasis on our people, that the very name of ring or combination is destined to be one of the most odious in the vocabulary.

It is difficult to tell which is most to be wondered at, the simplicity or the infatuation of the advocates of this method of combination. A body of principals representing allied interests, meet together and lay down certain inviolable rules of business procedure, the principle one being that the commodity in which they deal shall be held at an arbitrary price. This fixed price is in advance of the natural rate. For a while all the participants in this combination are happy in the consciousness of having suddenly added to their wealth. The more silly and shallow of them set to work immediately to adjust their business and family expenditures to their ideas of enlarged financial resources. Necessary wants in the community have to be supplied, and the movement may bear the appearance of success, owing to the imperativeness of the demand

for given products. But the special wonder is that the promoters of these combinations should fail to see that every advance in price, according to a well settled law of trade, necessarily limits the demand, each advance taking the product or goods which may be the subject matter of the combination out of the reach of the many, and reserving it for the exclusive enjoyment of the few.

It is a matter of simple retrogression, provided the price is advanced by combination to a high enough point, that the demand should be ultimately reduced to zero. The failure to comprehend and appreciate this obvious economical principle may be accounted for in the avowed purpose of many promoters of combination, to wit: to aim to do a small business at a large profit rather than a large business at a small profit. In the long run, however, the axiom is well settled, that the larger the volume the better the business. No business can continue to be successful that trades on a declining volume.

With rare exceptions the most noted combinations and rings of the past ten or fifteen years have been broken. The distress which has become almost chronic with us, may be attributed to the sudden but inevitable translation from a false system to a natural one. Nothing can be plainer to keen observers of business history than that competition, after all, is the life of trade; and competition is the very antithesis of combination. The methods of the one system are directly opposed to those of the other system. While combination aims to give the least service or product for the most money, competition aims to give the most service or product for the least money. Combination is slow, inert, luxurious, repressive and indifferent; while competition is alert, active, vigilant, projective and aggressive.

The destruction of the rings and of the ring principle of doing business, amounts really to taking the manacles off the hands of the business interests of the country. The good times, the prosperity and confidence which we are all so earnestly longing for cannot be expected to fully return until the tariff is readjusted to a rational basis of mere revenue production in keeping with the great monetary reform of the resumption of specie payments.

As illustrative and premonitory of the new status of business we see the evidence cropping out all around us of an intense and eager competition among manufacturers and producers of all kinds, and among merchants and financiers.

The system which has paralyzed the energies of this country in the past and plunged us in the depths of financial misery, will be superseded by one which is calculated to revivify the business energies of the whole country and to induce a sound, legitimate and prolonged activity in all our leading interests.

All business calculations must be squared to this sound business principle whose authority is now asserting itself. The best physical and intellectual resources of the population will be evoked by competitive strife.

There are unmistakable signs, which it were well not to disregard, clearly pointing to a possibility in the near future of this country becoming the cheapest, and, consequently, the most desirable to live in of any country on the face of the globe. Already the prime staples of life are cheaper in price than they have been before in twenty years. With the equalization of rents, that prime factor of all economic calculation, we may expect the working out of the problem to be complete, and a most satisfactory one to all citizens. Competition will secure to this country that prolonged era of peace, plenty and prosperity of which combination only gave us the delusive symbols.

REAL ESTATE MARKET.

At the Exchange Salesroom, the following sales were held during the week: Mr. John T. Bernard Smyth sold the two four-story brick buildings, with lot, 24.3x100, No. 73 Avenue B, west side, 24.3 north Fifth street, for \$14,300, to Clara Adler. John T. Boyd sold the four-story brick house, with lot, 21x80, No. 14 Irving place, northeast corner Fifteenth street, for \$14,500; the four-story brown stone front house, No. 370 West Thirty-third street, south side, 19 east of Ninth avenue, was sold for \$8,900.

BUILDING MATERIAL MARKET.

BRICKS.—On the market for Hards, the situation does not greatly change, though if anything the tone is not quite so firm as last week. The general range of prices remains just the same as last quoted, but extreme figures are the exception, and under careful negotiation, desirable customers frequently obtained some little favors in order to hasten business. The principal difficulty appears to be in a slight excess of supply over demand at all times, and it is evident that the efforts of manufacturers have not as yet been successful in thoroughly adjusting the production to the outlet. So far as the city wants are concerned they are good, indeed it seems to be very generally conceded that more brick are going into consumption by a considerable amount at the corresponding time last year, but here the exhaustion of supplies stop, and to the want of other outlets dealers attribute their difficulties in gaining a better control of the market. With the exception of a few hundred thousand shipped from the yards on the river direct to the Provinces, there does not appear to be a single point calling for stock, and this makes a very material difference in the distribution. Pales are also in moderate and uncertain demand only, and somewhat nominal on value. Fronts have sold quite in proportion to other grades, but were not active. Supplies, however, are small, and prices rule firm on all qualities.

We quote Pale, @ M., \$2.00@2.25; Hards. Up-rivers, \$3.50@4.00; Haverstraw bay, \$1.00@4.50; favorite brands, \$4.75@5.00: Fronts, Croton—brown, \$7; dark, \$8; red, \$9; Philadelphia, \$26@28; Trenton, \$24@29.00; Baltimore, \$34@38.00. Yard prices, delivery included, \$2@3 higher on ordinary and \$5.00@6.00 on fronts.

GLASS.—Business does not show much general animation, but there is more doing, and the prospects favor an increase rather than any falling behind. The actual consumption throughout the country, it is said, promises well, and not many retailers have much of a stock or assortment to meet an increased call and must therefore make draft upon the accumulation in importers and manufacturers' hands. The latter has not been allowed to reach very full proportions, and holders must secure some advantage whenever demand sets in with any volume. A uniform system of quotations has not as yet been fixed upon for either domestic or foreign, and quotations continue nominal, but buyers are gaining no further advantages.

HARDWARE.—Business commences to improve somewhat, and the hopeful feeling among dealers, before noted, makes progress also. There is, however, no speculative feeling or inclination to expect a great and rapid increase of operations, but rather a natural and healthy growth based upon actual consumptive wants. These it is calculated will be pretty full this fall, and especially on standard goods in the way of builders hardware, etc. At the moment local wants do not appear very heavy, and the distribution is mainly on shipping orders, including a number from the South. On price lists no further important changes are announced since our last. A new feature in this trade will be the offering during current month of half a million gross of gimlet pointed screws at auction under orders from the American Screw Company.

LATH.—The market has undergone little if any positive change since our last. Supplies were not quite so plentiful, but the recent comparatively free distribution satisfied the necessities of the majority of dealers, and demand also remained within narrow limits. Here and there a buyer could be found however, and latterly one or two seem little anxious inducing a somewhat hopeful feeling among receivers though \$1.30 per M. was the highest rate we heard mentioned up to the present writing.

LIME.—The market is quiet and unchanged. A fair amount of stock is being used, but buyers only operate to the extent of their actual and immediate consumptive wants, and there is no inducement to bring forward supplies in any greater quantity. Former prices are ruling all around, and are steady, but the figures too low afford much satisfaction to the producer. Agents for State lime tell us they are finding a very good distribution on orders from the interior, which are supplied direct from the kilns.

LUMBER.—The general market appears to be about steady, and while the movement shows no positive increase the indications are a trifle more encouraging. Now that the pressure of coastwise offerings is somewhat reduced, and the principal interior markets are found to be holding with a pretty stiff grip, buyers commence to feel around a little more, and if not anxious, are sufficiently interested to locate and even in some cases to secure a sort of refusal on desirable parcels of goods. The outlook on foreign account is also more promising, and while the ordinary run of orders for small parcels "to fill," etc., continues, we hear in addition of negotiations pending on full cargoes for Cuba, Port Spain, etc. Trade in Southern lumber is at present unfavorably influenced by fears of yellow fever. In regard to general supplies the belief seems to be that there will be enough, but we find a few of our leading dealers quietly picking up and stowing away desirable parcels of hemlock, and looking for more. Choice black walnut is also likely to be scarce according to reliable advices from the interior.

Eastern spruce remains in about the same general

situation. Demand is not free or quick, and more frequently offerings have to seek a buyer than buyers are to be found on the look out for supplies. The amount coming to hand, however, is not allowed to reach very large proportions and thus keeps rates even, except on such variations as may arise on a difference of credit allowed. A "cash down" customer has many advantages at present. We quote at \$10.25@11 for random, possibly \$11.25@11.3712 for choice lengths in small cargo, and \$12.00@13.00 for specials, the extreme for extra difficult.

White pine is in fair stock, and we understand that some of our dealers, either personally or through their agents, are occasionally picking up at the primary points such parcels as may be well adapted to add to the accumulation for winter use. The present distribution, however, is by no means liberal one, and as a whole our market has a dull tone, with nothing very encouraging on home account, and the foreign call still a little dubious. Two or three orders for full cargoes from the West Indies this week, however, give dealers greater hope. In a general way about former rates are named, but they have more or less nominal basis owing to close competition. We quote at \$15.00@17.00 per M. for West India shipping boards; \$20.00@21.00 for South American do.; \$15.00@16.00 for box boards; \$17.00 for do. wide and sound; and timber to order at \$30.00@40 per M.

Yellow pine is not finding many fresh sales at the moment on any outlet. On local account the demand is especially moderate on all the ordinary consumptive outlets, and specials are rarely ordered, while for foreign markets the sales are irregular, and on too close a limit to be entirely satisfactory. Not many vessels can be secured for the Southern voyage at the moment. We quote random cargoes at about \$18.00@22.00 per M.; ordered cargoes \$22.00@21.00 do.; green flooring boards, \$20@21 do.; and dry do. do. \$24@23. Cargoes at the South, \$14@15.50 per M.; hewn timber, \$7.50@14.

Hardwoods are without much animation, and the market void of interest. Now and then an exporter makes a small and cautious bid, and occasional orders come from home sources, but the outlet from both foreign and domestic account is not sufficient to make any great impression on the present very fair accumulation. Values remain as before, but tend to strengthen on choice black walnut. We quote at wholesale rates by car load about as follows: Walnut, \$77@85 per M.; ash, \$33@36 do.; oak, \$25@40 do.; maple, \$30@35; chestnut, 1st and 2d, \$33@35 do.; tulip, \$18@20 do.; cherry, \$15@17.50 do.; white wood, 16 and 18 inch, \$25@27.50 do.; and do. inch \$33@35 do.; hickory, \$35@39 do. for Western, and \$10@15 do. for good near by stock.

Shingles continue dull and unsettled as a rule. Some few export orders came in, and odd lots are distributed on home account, but the demand is scarcely proportioned to supply, and sellers vary more or less in fixing cost, making quotations somewhat nominal. Cypress are selling at about \$6 for saps and \$9 for hearts; pine shipping stock \$4 for 18 inch and Eastern sawed grades at \$2.50@4.50 for 16 inch as to quality and quantity. Machine dressed cedar shingles quoted as follows: For 30 inch \$16@22.25 for A., and \$23.75@33.25 for No. 1; for 21 inch \$15@16 for A., and \$16.75@23 for No. 1; for 20 inch \$15@16.50 for A., and \$11.25@15.75 for No. 1.

Yard dealers vary somewhat in their reports, but all are doing more or less business, and in a small way the market may be written fairly active. The season is not one of activity at the best, and but little improvement is expected for several weeks. On prices the tone is quite irregular owing to the dozens of influences being upon retail operations, but our figures are adjusted as near as may be to cost of stuff as jobbed out in small lots from yard.

GENERAL LUMBER NOTES.

STATE.

The Albany market is reported by the *Argus* to August 6th as follows:

In pine lumber the general trade throughout the District has been good for the season; some houses report a very active trade, their sales covering some round lots at full prices. We do not make any change in our quotations. The receipts have been light, the aggregate so far this season for the first time showing lower figures than we had a year ago.

In coarse lumber the trade has been rather quiet. From New York there is some inquiry, with every indication of an active demand from that quarter as the season advances. There is not any material change in quotations.

Freights from Bay City to Tonawanda are quoted at \$1.12@1.25 per M. feet. From Tonawanda to Albany they are \$2 per M. feet, an advance of 20¢ per M. feet during the week. From Oswego to Albany at \$1.40 per M. feet. From Ottawa to Albany \$2.75 per M. feet.

The receipts of lumber at Chicago from January 1st to July 27th are 499,768,000 feet against 428,355,000 feet for a corresponding date a year ago. The shipments, \$30,583,000 feet against 273,215,000 feet.

The receipts of lumber at Buffalo for the week by lake are 2,292,000 feet; by rail, 52 car loads. The shipments of lumber from the opening of navigation to August 1st, 1876, were 22,874,200 feet; in 1877 they were 33,701,500 feet, and in 1878 they were 42,410,409 feet.

The receipts at Oswego for the week 2,421,000 feet; the shipments by canal 3,402,000 feet.

THE WEST.

The *Lumberman* and *Manufacturer* has the following on the prospects:

The lumbermen of the Mississippi Valley are, beyond all question, the most mercurial set of men in the business. They are liable to cut the strangest business antics of any set of men on the footstool. Last spring, in anticipation of the shortage which would occur in the supply of logs, they put up the price of lumber about \$3 per thousand, and roundly and loudly asserted their ability to maintain it, and now, with one-half of the season gone, and the crop many scores of million feet short of what was calculated upon when the advance was made, and when stocks are depleted and cannot be replaced, they are taken with a sort of "buck ague," and are bound to sell off the little on hand at such figures as are offered or can be begged. There is probably not 40,000,000 feet of dry lumber on the wholesale market north of Clinton, in all the great lumber region, while the supply of green lumber bears but a small proportion to last year's production, and unless some great calamity shall fall upon the country to stop the demand, will be wholly inadequate to fill the orders of the West. The crops have been injured in a part of Minnesota and Iowa, but there is an enormous surplus of grain, the proceeds of which will be invested in improvements requiring lumber, making it an entirely reasonable proposition that more of this commodity will be needed in the next twelve months, west of the Mississippi, than ever was consumed before in the same length of time.

The *Northwestern Lumberman* has published the following statement of the stocks of manufactured lumber at the principal distributing points in the Northwest on July 1, as compared with the same day last year:

A Saginaw letter published in the *Northwestern Lumberman* contains the following:

There have been but few dealers from abroad in the market, the transactions for the week, so far as I can ascertain, not exceeding 10,000,000 feet. The market exhibits no features of note, the sales reported being at \$5.50 for culms, \$11.00 for common and \$26.00 for the three grades of uppers. Of the transactions reported 3,000,000 goes to Toledo, 2,000,000 to Albany, and the balance to Erie and Dayton. There is not likely to be any change in quotations before the fall trade opens, and as the outside markets appear to be pretty well stocked, it is doubtful if manufacturers will be able to more than maintain present quotations, although there is not much discussion now as to the shortage of the cut on the river, which is generally conceded. The movement by water continues quite brisk, considering the low freights.

The following from the *Lumberman and Manufacturer*:

MINNEAPOLIS, MINN., Aug. 1, 1878.

All interest now centres in the wheat crop of the Northwest, and the rumored and known damage to the crops has had a bad effect on all branches of business. The heavy storms reported in different localities have undoubtedly destroyed a vast amount of grain, and the damp, warm weather of the month has reduced the quality of nearly all the grain crop.

In the lumber trade, the sales continue fair for the season of the year, and large, considering the stocks. The Black river drive amounting to 35,000,000 feet, which came into the booms on the late rise, has set many mills going again; but on the other hand, all the mills on the Chippewa, except the Eau Claire Company's, are shut down for want of logs, and the Wisconsin river mills are nearly all idle for the same reason: to say nothing of the mills along the river to St. Louis, which up to this time have done very little and are largely idle now. The decline in yard and cargo prices at Chicago, consequent upon large receipts and bad news from the West, is noted elsewhere, but is so slight that it ought not to effect western trade or prices. At St. Louis a correspondent reports trade light and unsatisfactory, but no decline in prices and little shading. Hannibal is stiff on prices, and is getting short of stock. Many leading articles can scarcely be found in the city. Hannibal will be among the first of the large western markets to fully realize the shortage from lack of lumber. Clinton shows a bold front to Chicago, and will probably stop most of the trade on its lines at the river, and would all of it if the railways gave her an equal chance. In the Northwest the exciting topic is the proposed abandonment of St. Louis, Hannibal and other lower river points by the Chippewa lumbermen, and the shipping of their lumber direct from the mills to the southwest by car. A variety of opinions are expressed as to what this will amount to. We express ours elsewhere under the heading, "Changing Base," and commend the remarks to the careful attention of the trade. Saginaw and Bay City seem to be doing a splendid business, considering the supply, nearly all her lumber going east, none to Chicago worth speaking of.

During the past week a number of buyers have been in the market, and perhaps 15,000,000 to 20,000,000 feet changed hands, and at fair figures. A sale of 2,000,000 feet by Charles Green is reported at \$6, \$12 and \$28, and also two by Barringer & O'Donnell, one of 1,500,000 to Eastern parties, at \$6.25, \$12.50 and \$28, and another of 2,000,000 at \$6, \$12 and \$28. Luther Gordon sold 500,000 to Rochester parties, part of which was for \$6, \$12 and \$26, and the balance for \$6.50, \$13 and \$28. J. F. Rose bought of Sanborn & Bliss, for Erie parties, 400,000 for \$5.50 and \$11 for culms and common, and we learn of the sale of a number of small lots of coarse lumber at \$7.50. We note a sale of 300,000 to Chicago parties and 300,000 to Eastern parties, good lumber, at \$5.75, \$11.50 and \$27. THE EAST.

The old, old story. Supplies disappearing and Maine lumber soon to be numbered among the things of the past. A writer at Bangor, Maine refers to the season's operations as follows:

"All the logs in the booms or sure to come during the season, with a few unimportant exceptions. The whole amount is about 100,000,000 feet old and new logs, very few being old. The stock is mostly spruce, some 10,000,000 feet of hemlock and as much pine, most of which is small sapling, to be sawed alive for box boards. This is about half of the average stock on the Penobscot, the yearly average for the last 40 years having been about 260,000,000 feet. Prices are below their natural level—as low as before the war—a condition caused by slow and lasting panic, general depression of business and cessation of building. In the 18 years since 1860 the population of the country and the natural demand for lumber has increased 50 per cent., and the amount of spruce standing in 1860 in the United States, and in those parts of the Dominion that help to supply our markets, has diminished 50 per cent. So the natural level of prices for spruce lumber, based on natural demand and supply, should stand \$3 to \$5 per thousand higher than at present, and with returning general prosperity in a few years we shall be able gradually to advance prices correspondingly and maintain them permanently, and we have no overstock to retard this result."

METALS.—COPPER.—Ingot continues to sell moderately, as buyers operate only for immediate wants and cannot be induced to anticipate. Prices about as before and steady but without buoyancy. We quote at 16@16 1/4 for Lake. Manufactured Copper quite dull and irregular with no seller giving the combination rates, it is thought if an opportunity to sell is secured. We quote as follows: Brazier's Copper, ordinary sizes, over 16oz., per sq. foot, 26c. per lb.; do. do. do. do. 16 oz. and over 12 oz. per sq. foot, 28c. per lb.; do. do. 10 and 12 oz. per sq. foot, 30c. per lb.; do. do. lighter than 10 oz. per sq. foot, 32c. per lb.; circles, less than 84 inches in diameter, 29c. per lb.; do. 84 inches diameter and over, 32c. per lb.; segment and pattern sheets, 29c. per lb.; locomotive fire box sheets, 26c. per lb.; Sheathing Copper, over 12 oz. per square foot, 29c. per lb., and Bolt Copper, 29c. per pound. Inox—Scotch Pig has a slow jobbing distribution without much change on the general run of values. We quote at \$22,000@24,00 as to brand and quality. American Pig is very dull and without signs of improvement, and another effort is being made to eat down production as the only means to balance the situation. We quote at \$17.50 @19.00 for No. 1 per ton, \$15.50@17.50 for No. 2, and \$14.50@15 for Forge. Rails find rather a light and uncertain demand at the moment and are somewhat nominal especially on iron. We quote at \$32 @23 for new iron, and \$42@44.00 for steel at the mills. Old Rails, \$17.50@18.50 per ton; scrap, \$19.50 @21.00. Manufactured iron selling slowly without quotable changes on values. Common Merchant Bar can be had in round lots at 1.7c. and refined at 1.9c. but for ten-ton lots from store, 1.8c. and 2c. are respectively insisted upon. Common sheet, 3c., and best R. G. American, 4c. from store. **LEAD—Domestic** Pig has sold with some freedom, concentrating the stock and giving holders advantage to insist upon higher rates. We quote at 34@35c. currency. The manufacturers of lead are quoted: Bar, 5c.; Pipe, 5c., and Sheet, 6c.—less the usual discount to the trade; and Tin-lined Pipe, 12c. Block Tin Pipe, 40c., on same terms. Tin—Pig is in large stocks and light average demand, with the market weak on all grades. We quote at 17@17 1/4 for Banca, 133@14c. for Straits, 14 1/2@14 1/4c. for English Refined, and 14@14 1/4c. for do common. Tin plates continue to sell steadily, on jobbing orders to a very fair extent and command former rates. Spelter is quiet and scarce and firmly held at 44@45c. Sheet Zinc in average trade demand and about steady at 54@56c. for domestic.

NAILS.—An irregular demand has prevailed, one day quick, and the next almost at a stand still, and the influence was not beneficial upon the market. Manufacturers and dealers, however, endeavor to keep the supply down, and prevent any further shrinkage on cost. We quote on a basis of \$2.25@2.30 net for 10d to 6d.

OILS.—A fair Jobbing trade has been doing in standard grades, and about a uniform line of cost, but the general wholesale market has rather a dull and uncertain tone. Linseed oil is quoted at 56@58c. from crushers hands.

PAINTS.—No change worthy of extended note since our last. Wholesale movements are slow and uncertain, but in a jobbing way a fair amount of stock goes out, and secures about former rates.

PITCH.—A moderately active trade doing on the regular run of orders, but the market without spirit and values nominally unchanged. We quote at \$2.00 @2.12 1/2 per bbl. for city delivered.

SPIRITS TURPENTINE.—The demand very fair on the jobbing and retail market, and values steady. Wholesale dealings have been a trifle more active at somewhat irregular values, but sellers manage to retain most of the advantage. We quote at 28@31c. per gallon according to quantity of stock handled.

TAR.—Business has been moderately active, and has covered about the usual selections, both as to quantity and quality. Supplies fair and owners parting with them at former rates. We quote at \$2.12 1/2@2.20 for Newberne and Washington, and \$2.25@2.37 1/2 for Wilmington.



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
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
